NOTE. — The Selectmen believe that there are now a very few dogs over four months old, yet unregistered in this town. Those

delinquent will please attend to the matter at once, as the law is imperative upon dog-owners in this matter.

II.

Votes relating to highways passed at the adjourned annual town meeting held October 26, 1886 :

Voted, That the Selectmen purchase a road-machine of some approved pattern for the use of the town.

Voted, That the Selectmen purchase a team or teams for town purposes.

Voted, That the control of all the highways of the town be placed in the hands of a committee of the following named citizens, viz.: George C. Andrews, Nelson S. Bailey, Arthur M. Brainard, John Tenner, Isaac Broadhead, James O. Griswold, William Warner, and Charles Shipman, who shall serve for one year without compensation : said committee to have power to employ a foreman or highway surveyor, who shall work, or cause to be worked, all of the roads of the town. All the work to be done under the general direction of or by consent of said road committee.

Voted, That some permanent improvement in the way of grading and hardening, either by stone or gravel on our main highways of travel, be done each year.

Voted, That a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars be appropriated for the special improvement of the highways for the ensuing year.

III.

By-law in relation to the conduct of annual town meetings, and the duties of certain town officers therein named, passed at the adjourned annual town meeting held October 26, 1886.

Voted, That the by-laws of this town passed in town meeting, October 28, 1878, be and the same are hereby amended and added to so as to read as follows, to wit :

A by-law relating to the conduct of the annual town meetings in the town of Glastonbury, and the duties of certain town officers as therein specified :

SECTION 1. At the annual town meeting held on the first (1) Monday of October in each year hereafter, the following town

officers shall be voted for, as is by statute provided, by ballot fairly written or printed on one piece of paper; to wit:

Two (2) Registrars of Voters.

Four (4) Assessors.

Three (3) Board of Relief.

Two (2) Auditors.

Two (2) School Visitors, and any vacancy that may occur in said office.

Three (3) Selectmen.

A Town Clerk.

A Town Treasurer, and Treasurer of Town Deposit and School Funds.

A Constable, and Collector of Taxes.

Four (4) Constables.

Six (6) Grand Jurors.

A Sealer of Weights and Measures.

Three (3) Agents of Town and Deposit Funds.

The ballot-box for the reception of such votes shall be opened at the commencement of said annual meeting at eight (8) o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be closed at five (5) o'clock in the afternoon of said day, when the votes shall be counted, and the result declared by the Moderator in open meeting.

SEC. 2. The annual town meeting, held on the first Monday of October in each year, shall be adjourned, after the declaration of the result of the ballot, to and until the third Monday of said October, at ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon.

SEC. 3. At said annual town meeting, it shall be the duty and it is hereby required of the selectmen and auditors of the preceding year, to make and present a classified report in detail of the expenditures of the town, so far as orders have been given therefor, for the year preceding up to but not including the previous fifteenth (15th) day of September, together with an estimate of the town expenses for the ensuing year; and also an inventory of town property; and a recommendation of the amount of taxes required, in their opinion, to be levied to meet said expenditures, and any other town purposes, for the ensuing year. The town treasurer and treasurer of the town deposit and school funds shall also make and present his report for the same time, as hereinbefore provided. And the board of school visitors shall submit their report, and the recommendations of the joint board. All

said reports shall be printed and circulated at least five (5) days before said annual meeting, and shall be consolidated in one pamphlet for distribution. All other reports shall be presented and read in open meeting. The minor town officers shall be chosen and elected at said adjourned annual town meeting.

SEC 4. Any amendment or change in the foregoing rules and regulations may be made at any town meeting, on notice having been given thereof in the warning for such meeting; but no such change or amendment shall be and become operative until the next subsequent annual town meeting.

SEC. 5. The selectmen are hereby directed to meet at the town clerk's office from two (2) until four (4) o'clock in the afternoon on the last Saturday of each month for the purpose of examining all bills against the town and drawing orders on the town treasurer therefor; and the town treasurer is hereby directed to be at the town clerk's office from three (3) o'clock until (5) o'clock in the afternoon of each of said days for the purpose of paying town orders; except during the month of September in each year when said selectmen and treasurer shall meet on the fourteenth day of said month.

REPORT OF THE ACTING SCHOOL VISITORS.

District No. 1, NAUBUC.

The upper or graded school has been in charge of Miss Josie A. Litchfield. She has taught with fair success. The primary department was under the care of Miss Helen Wadsworth, an experienced teacher, and good work has been done.

WM. H. GRISWOLD, A. S. V.

Districts Nos. 2, 3, and 18.

District No. 2, *Center*. Miss F. J. Hollister has taught in the higher department, with nearly the same average attendance as last year. Mrs. Geo. R. Hale has continued in the primary department — the attendance larger and more regular than last year. The much needed repairs and improvements in this room have been thoroughly done, and with everything new the room presents a very inviting appearance. One change I would suggest, viz.: a raised platform under the seats for the children's feet; they are not able to touch the floor while sitting, which is more than uncomfortable, *it is harmful*, and we hope the parents will see that this fault is remedied. Two good schools have been taught in this district for the whole of the school year, and the improvement made was all that one could reasonably expect.

District No. 3, *Green*. Miss Ellen M. Gates taught the fall and winter terms, and Miss H. J. Bunce the spring term. Miss Gates was a beginner at the work of teaching, and like many beginners had to try different plans and methods, and really learn more the first term or two than the scholars. Miss Bunce had one term of experience in the 17th District, and while not successful, we have no doubt but that it will be valuable in future attempts.

District No 18, *Williams*. Miss Mary A. Kingsbury taught the fall term, and Miss Fanny E. Burr the winter and spring terms. This school has not made the improvement during the past year

that we would like to see, as Miss Kingsbury had had but little experience, and Miss Burr none. Too much time was lost in finding out what can be done and how to do it.

Remarks.—For the future we see signs of improvement, and are encouraged, for, with only very few exceptions, teachers are beginning to feel that they must do more than ask book questions, and that they need some preparation for teaching. Committees are taking more care in their selection of teachers, and the Joint Board shows a willingness to give deserving districts more money that they may keep the good teachers; and now let parents see that their children attend regularly and the whole number of days required by the new law,* then the scholar's work will be continuous, with no lost lessons.

District No. 4, OLD CHURCH.

The school in this district has been taught the entire year by Miss Mary A. M. Alexander of East Hartford. This lady is quite an accomplished teacher, very methodical and painstaking. Unfortunately during the winter she was attacked with diphtheria, and was obliged to leave her school a week or two. In the spring term the measles made their appearance, and the school was closed for some time; so that when I visited it the last of the spring term I found it closed. This was an episode in a school where we expect great good.

JNO. W. HUBBARD, A. S. V.

District No. 5, EAGLEVILLE.

The school in this district has been in the care of Miss Mary J. Robinson for the past four (4) years. She has taught the past year with her usual good success.

WM. H. GRISWOLD, A. S. V.

District No. 6, SOUTH CENTER.

The fall term of this school was taught by Mrs. Edward D. Miller, and the balance of the year by Miss Emma Shipman. Both

* The new law requires double the attendance, *i. e.*, twenty-four weeks, or 120 days, for children under 13 years; but for children between 13 and 14 the same, *i. e.*, 12 weeks, or 60 days.

these teachers are residents of the town, and the latter a resident of the district. Wherever they reside, they are ornaments to the profession of school teaching. They are natural educators; they could not be poor teachers if they tried, any more than the majority could possibly make good ones. I do not wish to be selfish, but I sincerely hope they may "keep school" near where I live as long as they and I live. The latter is employed for the current year.

The citizens of this district have, at last, made the long needed improvement, in thoroughly repairing their school-house both inside and out, and now that it is completed, I do not believe the most penurious person will object to pay the proportionate share of expense.

JNO. W. HUBBARD, A. S. V.

District No. 7, TAYLORTOWN.

The school in this district has been taught by Miss Clara Clark of Portland, the whole school year. The number of attendants was quite small. I think Miss Clark gave general satisfaction as I heard no complaint. During this vacation the district has been to a good deal of expense in fixing up the school building, which speaks well for its citizens.

A. A. BABCOCK, A. S. V.

District No. 8, MATSON HILL.

The school in this district has been divided into three terms of twelve weeks each. Miss Grace Hills of East Hampton, taught the fall term, having taught the spring term previous. Miss Fannie M. Watrous taught the winter and spring term, having taught twelve terms in this district with good result. The attendance in this district is improving, and there is a better outlook than there has been for some time.

A. A. BABCOCK, A. S. V.

District No. 9, TWINE MILL.

The school in this district was interrupted by a change of teachers. The committee expected to procure the same teacher that had taught the year previous, but could not. The fall term was taught by Miss Georgie Elliott of New York, who did not give the

best of satisfaction. The winter and spring term was taught by Mr. Frank Clark, a resident of the district. I made but two visits to the school while he was in charge, but from what I can learn, he gave good satisfaction. This school celebrated Arbor Day, by setting out trees and fixing the grounds, which was a day well spent. Hope the other districts will fall in line another year; it is a day we all ought to take an interest in.

A. A. BABCOCK, A. S. V.

District No. 10, NAYAUG.

The school in this district has been taught by Mrs. Clara F. Roe, who is a resident of the district, the whole year. She has been engaged for the ensuing year.

A. A. BABCOCK, A. S. V.

Districts Nos. 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, and 17.

The schools under my care have been kept thirty-six weeks, all that the law stipulates. Twelve different teachers have been employed with varied talents, skill, knowledge, and experience, from the twenty-fifth down to the first or trial term. With such varied talents, skill, knowledge, and experience, corresponding results have followed. There cannot be an upper without an under, an effect without a cause; even a curse, causeless cannot come. So in the routine of another year of school, the usual things have happened, with here and there an episode to lead some people to exclaim "Is it possible!"

The schools in districts Nos. 12 and 16 have been kept by the same teachers during the year. Both have been good schools, and excellent work has been done. The teacher of the former was Miss Effie B. Curtis, of the latter, Mrs. Mary D. Treat. The other five schools have been under the care of ten different teachers. No. 11 under that of Miss Jennie I. Hall, and Mrs. W. I. Goodale. The school has been small, but the few in attendance have been very highly favored in their instructors. No. 13 under Mrs. Nellie S. Hollister, and Mr. Lafayette Bosworth, both old teachers. No. 14 under Miss Mattie M. Buell, and Mr. Willis N. Bailey. No. 15 under Miss Ellen M. Hills, and Miss Mary A. Kingsbury. No. 17 under Miss Ellen S. Bunce, one of the finest educated of all our teachers, and Miss Anna Shattuck. This has been the most.

difficult school to manage in the list. Miss S. by a resort to the birch has done something to bring it into an orderly condition.

In these schools the irregularities of attendance have been about as usual, and will, I suppose, continue so to the end of time. Barnacles will find a home on the ship's keel, and unless removed by a thorough scraping, will not fail to retard her speed through the water; so irregularity in school attendance is one of the most serious impediments to the progress of the pupils. The remedy to a large extent lies with the parents. If they insisted upon punctuality, the results of our school work would be vastly more encouraging. They do not see the need of it, as a rule, and so allow their children to stay at home, if they express a desire so to do.

School work, however, can never be tabulated. It is not possible to ascertain it in a string of recitations, cut and dried for the occasion. These are not to be despised; they have their place. They show that the mill has been running, and that grain has been put into the hopper, yet they are ephemeral, and will be forgotten. The unseen work will remain. The question quite naturally arises, viz.: What has this and that teacher done toward making the pupil a true man or woman? Has the true art of thinking and reasoning been inculcated? There is a magnetism continually going forth from the instructor, which insensibly moulds and shapes the raw material of childhood and youth, into the coming man or woman. We earnestly desire that the instruction our children receive shall be such as to develop in them all the perfection of which they are capable. In every child there exists the germs of a perfect person, and it is the office of education to favor and direct the growth of these germs. These twelve instructors have done something in this direction, and for this we would thank God and take courage.

In concluding my report I am anxious to say a word about *apparatus* and *Arbor Day*.

In the seven schools under my care, may be found the latest editions of Webster's Unabridged, and Lippincott's Gazetteer. These are primal helps. Also outline maps, cyclopædias, histories, especially American, and other useful books. Two new globes, several clocks, and other helps. The reference books and all the other books have been added since my connection with the Board. Some old sets of outline maps should give place to new ones. It is in vain to urge upon the districts the importance of these things

in our annual reports. It will not procure them. The Board of Education must see that it is done. The acting visitor in the town of Ashford, in his last report, urges the importance of reference books, globes, outline maps, etc., saying that in so far as he knows, there is not a district in his town that has a single one of these articles in a fit condition to be used.

The district committees are changed from year to year, and as a rule; do not see the importance of these things, and only in exceptional cases will it ever be done by them.

Arbor Day.—The object of this day was carried out to some extent in all the districts in this part of the town. Every school-room was more or less decorated; some with excellent taste and a healthy variety.

Good outside work also took place in cleaning play grounds and in tree setting. In No. 14, six fine trees were planted with suitable guards; in No. 15, seven; in No. 11, several; in No. 12, three, and in No. 16, three. In No. 11, an arbor was erected over the teacher's desk, the parents and others were invited to a literary entertainment, which was greatly enjoyed by all. Thus this new day received among us a healthy baptism.
