REPORTS OF THE ACTING SCHOOL VISITORS TO THE BOARD.

Districts Nos. 3, 17, and 18.

District No. 3, *Green*. This district was fortunate in securing the services of Miss Jane C. Covell for the entire school year. This was only accomplished by several people subscribing generously, as the usual wages paid by this district was no inducement. Miss Covell gave them good return for their money, and all the children made good progress.

District No. 17, *Neipsic*. Miss Minnie M. Spaulding, of Falls Village, taught the fall term. She was well qualified, — a graduate of the Normal School, — and worked hard early and late, and did all she could for the scholars; but she worked too hard for her strength, and she refused to try it for the winter term. Miss Jessie M. Cone of Thompsonville taught the winter and spring terms. She too is a graduate of the Normal School, and her work as a teacher is equaled by few and need be excelled by none.

District No. 18, *Williams*. Miss Mattie P. Winchenbaugh of Hyde Park, Mass., taught the school year in this district. It was her first experience as a teacher, but she made so much of a success in satisfying the needs of the scholars and the wishes of the parents that she is engaged for the present year.

The undersigned School Visitor would submit the following report for the past school year to the Board of School Visitors:

District No. 4, *Old Church*. This school, throughout the year, was taught by Miss Florence J. Hollister of South Glastonbury. Miss Hollister is a teacher of extended experience and exceptional ability, and her school has given good evidence of her devotion to its best interests.

District No. 6, *South Center*. Mrs. Edward D. Miller of South Glastonbury has had charge of this school for the year. Mrs. Miller is a teacher of large experience, and seems a favorite in this district, which she has served various terms before. The discipline of the pupils, and their general attainments, show conscientious and pains-taking endeavor.

District No. 10, *Nayaug*. This school was in charge of Miss L. Louise Snow of East Hampton, for the fall term, who was succeeded by Miss Maude A. Burns of Milford, for the winter term; who was succeeded by Miss Susie Thompson of South Glastonbury, for the spring term. There is reason to believe that none of these young ladies have labored in vain.

In the early part of the school year one visit each was made to three of the schools still in my charge from the previous year, viz.: Nos. 7, 8, and 9.

Later these were put in charge of Mr. William J. Flood.

MARCUS BURR, A. S. V.

District No. 5, *Addison*. The school in this district has been taught the past year by Miss M. J. Robinson, making twenty-eight terms she has taught in the district. The school desks have been revarnished, and put in good shape for use.

Our committee has, during the past year, improved the school grounds, and set out some good shade trees.

Reports from Districts Nos. 11, 15, and 16.

District No. 11, *North Street*. The school in this district has been in the care of Mrs. Wm. I. Goodale for the entire school year.

District No. 15, *Northeast*. Miss May E. Tracy of South Manchester taught eleven weeks of the winter term and the fall term. She did well for a beginner. Twenty one names on the register during the year.

District No. 16, *Buckingham*. In this district Mrs. George A. Treat has taught the school year. The school room has been papered, and a few pictures on the walls making it seem homelike, and any one will find it a pleasure to hear her scholars recite their lessons.

WILLIAM H. GRISWOLD, A. S. V.

In accordance with the usual custom, our Annual Sectional Report of schools is herewith presented.

Districts Numbers 7, 8, and 9 were by mutual agreement placed under our supervision, and were taught by the following teachers during the entire school year.

Number 9, or *Twine Mill District*, by Mr. George H. Carrier, a native and resident of this town, and graduate of the Suffield Literary Institute at Suffield, Conn.

Number 8, or *Matson Hill District*, by Miss Sara T. Brainard, also a native of Glastonbury.

Number 7, or *Taylortown District*, by Miss Ethel L. Clarke, a native of Portland, Conn.

Owing to an epidemic of diphtheria, the *Twine Mill District* school was closed for several weeks during the Fall Term, and a great falling off in attendance throughout the year was the result.

The other schools were kept for the full term of weeks, and the general attendance was fair. We note with pleasure an increased membership in the *Matson Hill District*; 14 names appearing on the roll during the last school year. This is by far the largest registration recorded there in a number of years. There has been no change of teachers made for the Fall Term of the opening school year, in any of the schools within this jurisdiction.

Matters have progressed smoothly, and as far as we have been able to ascertain, there has been no reason for complaint from any source. Parents and pupils, in the main, appear to have been well pleased with the teachers, the progress that has been made, and the general management of the several schools.

Districts Nos. 12, 13, 14.

No. 12, *Wasuc*. Miss Churilla E. Leete, a graduate of the Normal School at New Britain, had the care of the school in this district for the whole of the school year, and something has been done in the way of education. Report of Districts No. 1 and 2, by Leon Backer, not handed in. *Secretary.*

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF SCHOOL VISITORS.

The Board of School Visitors for the past year consisted of Rev. Marcus Burr, Leon Backer, Wm. J. Flood, Wm. H. Griswold, Julius S. Hollister, and H. E. Loomis, each being an acting school visitor.

We have held only two meetings during the past year; the first was our

Annual meeting, held October 28, A. D. 1889, all being present. The board organized by electing Wm. H. Griswold as chairman, and H. E. Loomis as secretary, and the usual votes defining the work and duties of each acting visitor were passed. As the time for enumerating the children had been changed from January to October, it made it convenient to examine and perfect the work at this meeting, which saves the expense of an extra board meeting in February, when it has usually occurred. The number in each district will be found in the table of statistics. Our second meeting was the

Joint Board Meeting, held June 10, 1890; the School Visitors were all present. The Selectmen were represented by P. H. Goodrich and L. A. Weir; absent, Samuel Hollister.

The Joint Board organized by electing P. H. Goodrich as chairman and H. E. Loomis secretary.

Deficiencies were voted for the past year as follows:

To District No. 2, \$200.00	To District No. 3, \$39.25
“ “ “ 15, 16.20	“ “ “ 17, 10.83
“ “ “ 18, 7.25	

The needs of the several districts for the ensuing year were then considered, and fifty-seven hundred dollars was found necessary to carry on the schools, and so voted. See table of statistics.

It was also voted, that if the number of scholars was so large in Districts Nos. 6 and 9, that it was thought best by the visitors to have a second school, to allow seven dollars per week for all expenses.

The Board also voted to appropriate ninety (\$90) dollars for library and apparatus, which will give ten (\$10) dollars to each district, to be expended as the law directs. See Chapter 17, Public Acts, passed January Session, 1889.

It was unanimously voted to recommend the following votes to the town for their adoption, to wit:

VOTED, That the terms and vacations of the school year shall hereafter be as follows: The first or *Fall Term* shall begin on Monday nearest to the first day of September, and continue sixteen (16) weeks.

The second or *Winter Term* shall begin on the first Monday of January, and continue twelve (12) weeks, and after a two weeks' vacation, the third or *Spring Term* shall begin, and continue eight (8) weeks.

VOTED, That we recommend an appropriation of not exceeding five hundred (\$500) dollars each, for the support of not more than two schools of higher grade, at different places in the town, provided suitable rooms and conveniences be furnished free of expense to the town, and approved by the Joint Board of Selectmen and School Visitors.

The Joint Board then adjourned.

A meeting of the School Visitors was then held, and as it appeared that a large number of the teachers were to be continued for the coming year, it was voted to omit the public examination.

The subject of some changes in our text books was before us, but as it was after six o'clock, it was thought best to consider that at some future meeting.

At the close of the school year, the Board with their term of office is as follows:

In reviewing the school work for the past year, it is in a great measure like other years — good work, well done, and an advance made in some schools. In some others they may be said to hold their own, for the same scholars went over the same lessons, with hardly any new ideas gathered, still others seem to have made nearer a failure. In view of this situation, when the question is asked us, "Have your schools improved during the past year?" we cannot say "yes" without some qualifications. We all know that interested committees and parents, with well qualified teachers,

will make good schools anywhere; if any of these are lacking the school suffers.

There has nothing been done to have better attendance. It may be that the town will find it necessary to appoint one or more special constables, and pay them for looking after those who do not attend school. It is possible that the Legislature will require the scholar to reach a certain proficiency, rather than a certain age, as the limit of attending school. Whichever or whatever is best, let us do it, for something needs to be done.

There is no uniformity or improvement this year in spending the school money. The bills for fuel and incidentals vary from 35 cents to \$1.30 per week — see districts Nos. 2 and 13. While we know that teachers' wages should vary according to ability and experience, it is difficult to understand why wood, coal, chalk, brooms, etc., should cost so much more in one district than another.

The recommendation of the Joint Board to appropriate \$500 for schools of higher grade, was made with the idea that it would, with a small tuition fee, meet the wants of the larger scholars of the town, and make it possible for them to continue their studies beyond the advantages of a district school. Since that meeting an endowment has been promised, by two of our very generous citizens, of \$20,000, and \$5,000 additional by one who was formerly a resident of this town, which will make the school free to our scholars. Yet as two experienced and well qualified teachers will be needed from the start, it would be a good vote still for the town to appropriate \$500, until it shall be self-supporting, and we are of the opinion it would save nearly if not quite that amount from our regular appropriation.

Seven districts have received their appropriation of five dollars each from the State this year. Only one-half have reported any money received, or any purchases made. This is very uneven to say the least, and for the coming year it will be wholly in care of the School Visitors, as an act of the Legislature of 1889 gave them the authority to take charge of it, and we hope that *every district* will have books and apparatus that will be helpful in the school work. I have varied the table of statistics somewhat this year, giving what I could on one page; this, with the list of teachers for the present fall term, completes the report, and all is

REPORT OF THE CLERK OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

To the Town of Glastonbury :

The Board of Health for this town, comprising the Selectmen and Justices, and the physicians legally made members thereof, held their annual meeting, as required by the statutes of this State, and the notice of the Town Clerk, on Wednesday, October 9, 1889. John H. Stevens was chosen President, Henry C. Bunce, M.D., Health Officer, and William S. Goslee, Clerk.

A special meeting of the board was held, on legal notice given, on the 30th of the same month, which was quite fully attended by the members. At said meeting, after full discussion, the following rules and regulations in relation to the public health were adopted, which, with a regulation previously made by said board, were ordered to be printed and circulated and posted, to wit:

No. 1. No pile of manure shall be allowed to remain near any dwelling-house, or on or near any highway in this town, more than three days after a complaint in writing, signed by some responsible person or persons, shall have been presented to the health officer, stating that the same is a nuisance, except upon permission in writing from said health officer.

No. 2. No person shall keep or maintain upon his premises, at any time, any privy, water-closet, cess-pool, sink, drain, or other like receptacle, except in a cleanly and inoffensive condition.

No. 3. No person shall throw, dump, or deposit any filth, garbage, decaying animal or vegetable matter, which may become prejudicial to public health, upon any vacant lot, highway, park, or public place. This does not preclude the proper use of fertilizers.

No. 4. No person sick or convalescent from any malignant, infectious, or contagious disease, or who lives with a family so affected, shall attend any school or public gathering in this town, except upon the presentation of a certificate from some reputable physician stating that there is no danger from such attendance.

No. 5. Every physician who shall have prescribed for or attended any person having the disease of small-pox, scarlet fever, diphtheria, typhoid fever, typhus fever, Asiatic cholera, or yellow fever, shall *forthwith*, after ascertaining the nature of the disease, report, in writing, to the health

officer the name, age, and address of such person, with such other information as required by the blanks furnished for that purpose. Every attending physician shall also report, in writing, to the health officer the name, age, and address of every person who shall have died of any of said infectious diseases, giving the specific name thereof, within twelve hours after he shall have been informed of such death; this report to be *in addition* to the certificate of death required for the Town Clerk.

No. 6. There shall be no public funeral of any person who shall have died from small-pox, scarlet fever, measles, diphtheria, typhus fever, typhoid fever, Asiatic cholera, or yellow fever, without the permit of the health officer, and subject to such sanitary orders as he may prescribe.

The following regulation was passed in October, 1888:

No privy vault, cesspool, or reservoir, into which a privy, water-closet, stable, or sink is drained, except it is water-tight, shall be established or permitted within four hundred (400) feet of a well, spring, or other source of water used for drinking purposes, without the written permission of the Board of Health, based upon the advice of the health officer or health committee. The entire contents of such privy vault, cesspool, or reservoir must be removed, when necessary, and not deposited in or on the surface of the ground within at least four hundred (400) feet of a well, spring, or other source of water used for drinking purposes, without the written permission of the Board of Health, based upon the advice of the health officer or health committee.

☞ The *willful* violation of the rules and regulations of the Board of Health is an offense against the statutes of the State, subject to certain prescribed penalties therefor.

In many respects it has been a remarkable year for the prevalence of contagious diseases. The health officer has not only done his duty in investigating the cases as they have occurred, but has also issued several orders having reference to the prevention of infectious diseases, and the safety of the public health. He has been assisted in all these matters by the resident physicians, but has reason to think that out-of-town doctors have not been as careful as they should have been in making their report. We presume it has been the result more of ignorance of the law, and our regulations founded thereon, than of any willful neglect. The clerk by the direction of the board has, at considerable expense, prepared the proper returns to be made to the health officer, required by paragraph 5 of the foregoing rules.

The health officer reports, that during the year ending September 15, 1890, there have been reported to him as follows :

He also expresses the opinion, that there have some cases of death occurring from the above-named diseases that have not been reported to him.

So far as possible he has caused regulation No. 6 to be observed, relating to public funerals of persons dying of infectious diseases.

We desire to call the attention of our sextons to the fact, that they are not allowed to open graves for the burial of any persons without a permit from the town clerk of *this* town. A *removal* permit issued by the town clerk of any town does not of itself authorize the burial in another town.

By reason of a more general appreciation of the powers, use, and responsibility of the board, and especially of the health officer, there have been many more calls than ever before for the exercise of their statutory duties. They and he are public officers, and what they do must be done in the light of day. Hence, it has been considered proper not to take notice of or act upon information contained in anonymous letters or communications, but any information conveyed in a responsible method, or from a responsible source, has been promptly attended to and the complaint thoroughly investigated without fear or favor.
