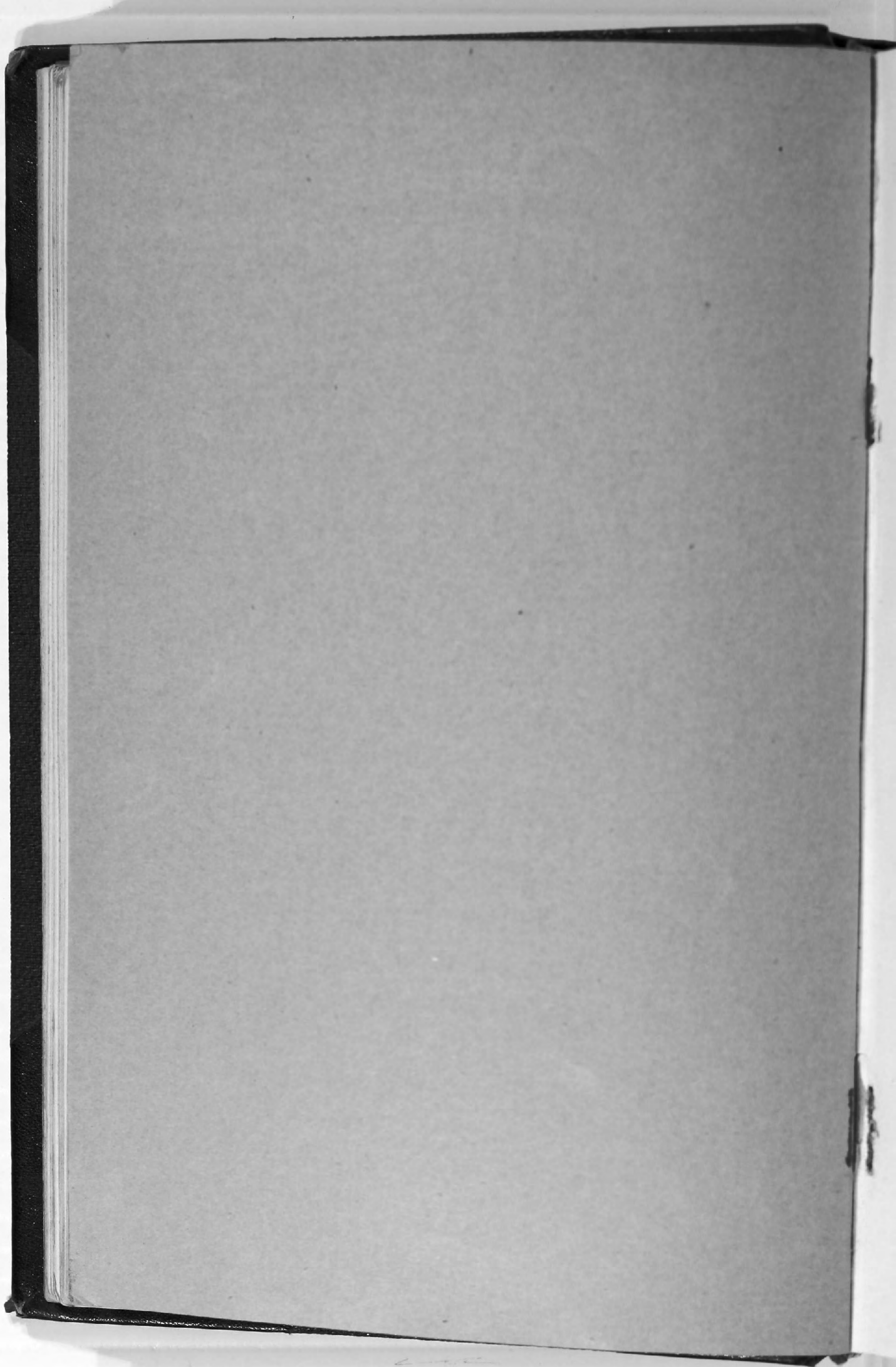

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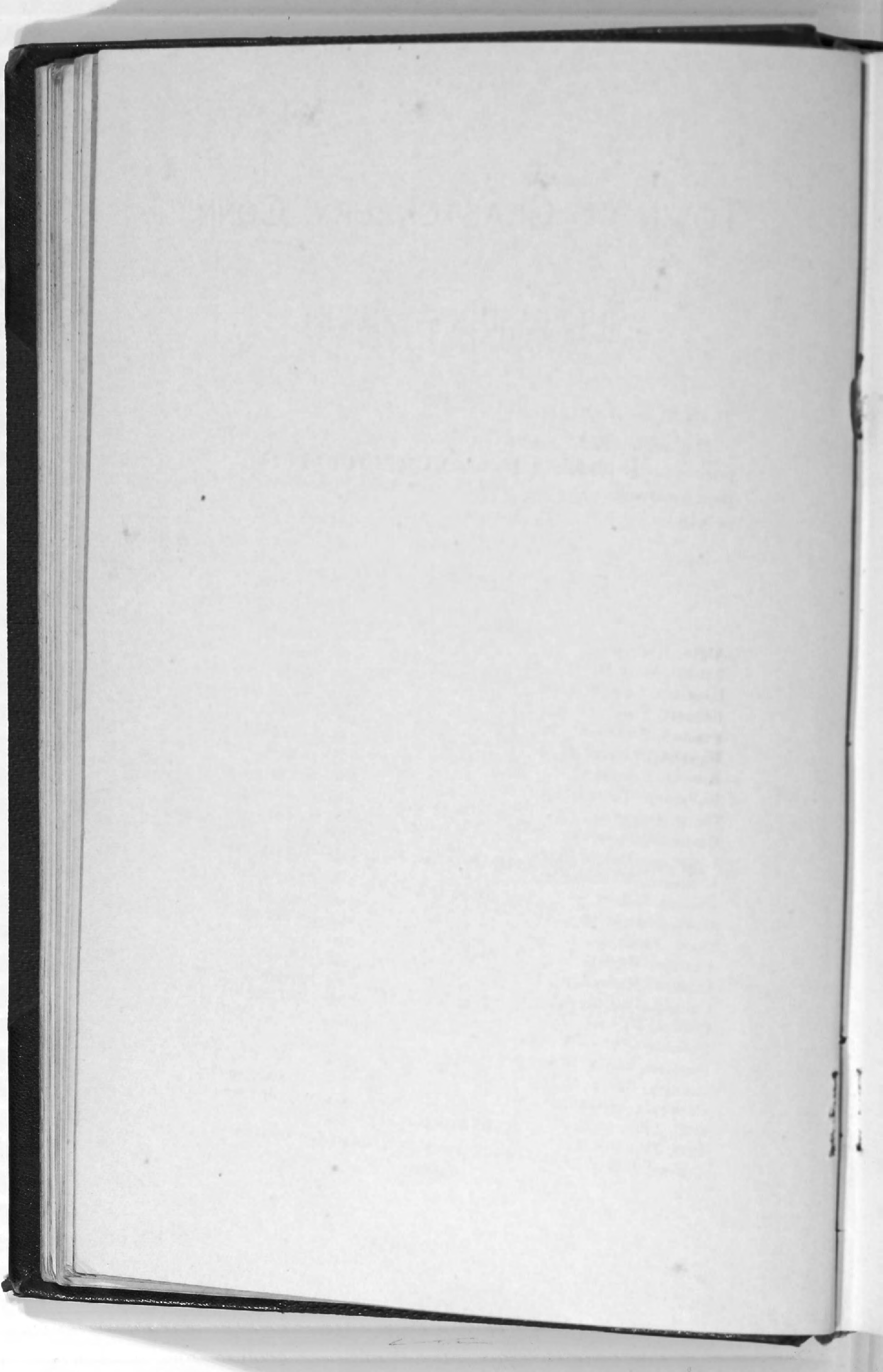

The second or winter term shall begin on the first Monday of January, and continue twelve (12) weeks; and after a two-weeks vacation, the third or spring term shall begin, and continue eight (8) weeks.

REPORTS OF THE ACTING SCHOOL VISITORS TO THE BOARD.

Districts Nos. 1 and 5.

District No. 1, *Naubuc*. Miss Mattie Willard taught the graded department with fair results. The primary department had Miss Mattie Brown for their teacher, and very good school work has been done.

District No. 5, *Addison*. The teacher, Miss Mary J. Robinson, has taught for a number of years in this district. A first-class school for the past school year.

WILLIAM H. GRISWOLD, A. S. V.

Districts Nos. 2, 3, and 18.

District No. 2, *Center*. Two schools have been maintained in this district. Mrs. Geo. R. Hale has had charge of Room No. 1 for another year, making six years of continuous work. The scholars show the advantage of having the same teacher. Mrs. Annie O. Nichols taught the fall term in the upper room. As the academy was to begin the same time as our winter term, it was expected only one school would be necessary, and Mrs. Hale had charge of all the scholars for three weeks, when it was thought necessary to divide the school, and Miss Rose A. Hopkins was secured and finished that and the next term, fitting several for the academy.

District No. 3, *Green*. Miss N. R. Robinson of Hebron taught here during the year, pleasing some. Being an experienced teacher, she had no trouble in the management of the school. The average was 21.

District No. 18, *Williams*. Miss Mattie P. Winchenbaugh taught here this her second year, having a smaller school, too small, we thought sometimes, for a school; her work was comparatively light.

Districts Nos. 4, 7, and 10.

District No. 4, *Old Church*. This work has been conducted throughout the year by Miss Isabella K. Hubbard, of Cobalt. Good work has been done, and the people have shown their appreciation of Miss Hubbard's services by a re-engagement.

During the vacation extensive improvements have been made in the school building. This school has maps and globes, and now a small but choice library of eleven volumes, placed there the beginning of the present year. A few more blackboards might be used to advantage.

District No. 7, *Taylortown*. Only four visits were made by the undersigned to this school, it being cared for by the other visitor from this part of the town during the first term.

The teacher here, Miss Florence J. Hollister, has had much experience in teaching. Capable, thoughtful, painstaking, and not shut up to books, she is a teacher whose services might be coveted in any of our schools.

Nearly a whole set of new maps have been purchased for this school the past year; also Webster's large dictionary and several choice volumes have been added to its library. The school has prospered.

District No. 10, *Nayaug*. This school has been in charge of Miss Susie M. Thompson, of South Glastonbury, who has held this position now four terms in succession. Miss Thompson loves the work. The school has prospered, and her services have again been secured. Through her efforts a nice little sum was raised for library and other purposes.

Two good blackboards took the place of the old ones, and the eighteen choice volumes, making a good beginning for a library placed in the school, are an evidence in part to her endeavor. These, with a Webster's large dictionary, make a good array for the year. Extensive improvements have been made in the school building during the vacation.

Two visits were made to No. 6, which was under my charge at the beginning of the year; Mrs. E. D. Miller, teacher; as usual, was pleased with Mrs. Miller's work.

The New Franklin Series of Readers placed in the schools the past year were largely, if not entirely, acceptable, so far as heard from.

Districts Nos. 6, 8, and 9.

No. 6, *South Center*. The school of this district has been taught the whole school year by Mrs. Edward D. Miller, a resident of this town, who has had a large experience in teaching, and is engaged to teach the present year; so it shows her work has been acceptable. The annual enumeration in October was only 45 — one third of what it was five years ago. The falling off is due to the stopping of the mills in the village. The register shows as many scholars as were enumerated.

No. 8, *Matson Hill*. The school of this district was taught the whole school year and the year previous by Miss Sarah T. Brainard, a resident of this town. Miss Brainard's work was well done. Number registered was 14.

No. 9, *Twine Mill*. The school of this district was taught the whole school year by Mr. George H. Carrier, a resident of this town and a teacher of this school for two years, which shows his work was appreciated. The attendance was good; number registered was 62.

The winter and spring terms were taught by Miss Lucy L. Carrier. That there was faithful and thorough work done is evidenced by the very satisfactory progress made.

The School of Higher Grade.

This school began the 5th of January last with Miss Jennie A. Pratt as teacher. Miss Pratt had successfully conducted a private school in South Glastonbury for several years, fitting a number of pupils for entrance to Hartford High School, of which she herself is a graduate. An arrangement was made by which her schoolroom was to be enlarged and in part refurnished, to accommodate without additional expense to the town, she to receive \$280, the amount voted by the Joint Board for twenty weeks of the school. Miss Pratt performed her part with faithfulness and acceptability. Thirty-four pupils attended the school, all the surrounding districts being represented, most of them largely so, thus relieving the various schools and opening the way for better work among the younger scholars — an important matter — and any thoughtful person visiting the school, familiar with school matters and with the real needs of the older and more advanced pupils of our districts, could but see the importance of such an institution, so conveniently located, and could scarcely do less than earnestly desire its continuance.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF
SCHOOL VISITORS.

Our first meeting was held, Oct. 30, 1890, as the annual meeting, also to perfect the enumeration. There were present W. H. Griswold, Rev. Marcus Burr, A. A. Babcock, Julius S. Hollister, and H. E. Loomis.

The Board organized by electing Wm. H. Griswold as chairman, and H. E. Loomis, secretary. The resignation of Leon Backer was presented, and Geo. C. Andrews was elected by ballot to fill vacancy for one year.

The Board then passed the usual votes concerning the duties of all, and appointed each member as an acting school visitor.

The enumeration, as reported by district committees, was then considered, and the result is found in table of statistics.

The meeting then adjourned to meet Dec. 1, 1890, to consider changes of text-books.

The second meeting was held according to adjournment, Dec. 1, 1890, when it was voted to change readers; the meeting adjourned for two weeks in order to examine books and receive prices.

The third meeting was held Dec. 15, 1890, when it was voted to adopt "The New Franklin Readers" for use in our public schools.

The fourth meeting was held June 9, 1891, with the Selectmen as a Joint Board; all present except Mr. Weir. Deficiencies were then voted the 1st District of \$14.56, and the 9th District, \$5.38. The appropriations were then considered and the recommendations for each district were the same as last year. See table of statistics.

A motion was made by Rev. Marcus Burr that we recommend four hundred dollars for a private school in South Glastonbury, but was lost by a tie vote; after which the Joint Board adjourned, and the School Visitors held a session, and it was then voted that we postpone any change in arithmetic and grammar for one year.

It was then voted to allow each teacher one day in each term to visit schools. Also to make the day after Thanksgiving a holiday, closing school Wednesday night of Thanksgiving week for the week. Meeting then adjourned.

At the close of the school year the board is constituted as follows:

Geo. C. Andrews and H. E. Loomis,	term expires,	1891.

In reviewing our work again for another year, I see no great reason for congratulations. Our schools are smaller, yet none are discontinued; eighty scholars, doing district school work, under sixteen years of age, have left them, and attended the Academy, or the "School of Higher Grade," in South Glastonbury; yet our appropriations are the same as last year, and between three and four hundred dollars more than they were three or four years ago. It is discouraging to our teachers. Ask one of experience to take a school where the average attendance is between six and twelve, and reply is sure to be, "I would rather have a larger number." But what is the remedy? Only this: first gather the scholars, twenty at least; then have a school where it will be convenient to the majority, and assist the others. Distance is no objection when we want a good thing. Two come nearly eight miles every day to attend the Academy.

The Board have given up public examination of teachers, and left it with each committee appointed in different sections to decide the qualifications of the several teachers; this is an old way and a *poor* way, as there can be no uniformity in the requirements in different sections of the town. The districts are more indifferent than usual, four districts having failed, from one cause or another, to appoint any committee, to wit: Nos. 3, 6, 14, and 18, thus leaving it with the Board to appoint; and they, not finding it an easy matter to find any one to take the office and perform its duties, have in two instances engaged the teacher.

The Joint Board, in 1890, appropriated \$90 for library purposes; and the School Visitors have had the spending of that amount, and an equal amount from the State; the result is, that *every district*, for the first time since the legislature granted the privilege, has had useful and valuable books, maps, or apparatus added the past year.

The Academy commenced in Jan., 1891, and had winter and spring terms. At the same time the private school taught by Miss

Jennie A. Pratt for several years in District No. 6 was made more convenient for a large number, and made free by appropriating \$280 for 20 weeks to Miss Pratt. The table of statistics shows the attendance in both schools, their ages, and the districts from which they came.

The larger districts contribute liberally in numbers, while the smaller districts, except Nos. 11, 13, and 15, reported as sending none. We are disappointed in not being able to show any financial saving to the town, also in loss of so many scholars from our schools, who are still doing district-school work; but the one may be avoided by having no more schools than are needed, and the other by raising the standard of admission, so that it will be in *fact* an academy or high school.

In order to receive the greatest benefit from the Academy, in the near future the School Visitors should systemize our district work, grading each year's studies, with examinations frequent, regardless of age; thus make all districts do the same thorough work, which would lead to the Academy, and it would soon become second to none of its kind.

The tables of statistics may be dry reading, but are well worthy of some attention. You will notice one column of moneys received from the State for library purposes. An equal amount is supposed to have been raised by district or town. Please look into the district library and see what you have to show for double the amount in that column.

We have changed readers during the year, and, in the opinion of some of our most experienced teachers, have gained much. We should also change arithmetics and grammars; the latter has been in use nearly thirteen years — a very complete book, as it was once estimated; but one might as well teach his child the watchmaker's trade in order to tell the time of day as to learn to talk and write correctly by committing 250 to 500 pages of rules and exceptions and other possibilities of the English language. Several works, more simple and better adapted for use in our schools, have recently been published, any of which would be more acceptable.
