All such grades and extensions to be adopted and adjusted to the proposed grade and layout for the South Glastonbury extension of the Electric Railroad, by the Hartford and Wethersfield Horse Railroad Company, and as given by said Railroad Company.

## REPORTS OF THE ACTING SCHOOL VISITORS TO THE BOARD.

---

### Districts Nos. 1 and 5.

District No. 1, *Naubuc*. Miss Mattie L. Brown of Talcottville taught the graded school for the past school year.

Miss Helen E. Wadsworth has had the care of the primary department.

District No. 5, *Addison*. This school has been taught by Miss Mary J. Robinson for the year. The same teacher as taught in the district last year.

### Districts Nos. 2, 3, and 18.

District No. 2, *Center*. Mrs. Geo. R. Hale taught again in room No. 1, with much the same results as in former years. The upper room was, for the greater part of the year, in charge of Miss Mattie Winchenbaugh, who had previously taught two years in the 18th district. She worked hard, and was especially successful in interesting and helping the younger scholars, in her room. She was succeeded in the spring term by Miss Jennie Edwards of East Hampton, L. I. Miss Edwards was only able to stay for a few weeks, but in this time she gave promise of making a successful teacher. Mrs. Hale had charge of all the scholars during the last two weeks of the year.

The schools were considerably depleted, during a part of the year, by sickness.

District No. 3, *Green*. Miss Flora Thompson of South Glastonbury taught the school here throughout the year. She maintained much better order than her predecessor had done. There was a fairly good attendance, and the scholars made some advance.

#### Districts Nos. 4, 7, and 10.

**Districts Nos. 6, 8, and 9.**

District No. 6, *South Center*. This school has been in charge of Mrs. E. D. Miller the whole school year. Mrs. Miller is a resident of South Glastonbury, and has been a successful teacher for several years previous, and is engaged for the coming year. The attendance is good and the scholars seem to make good progress.

District No. 8, *Matson Hill*. This school has been in charge of Miss Lucy Shipman the whole school year. Miss Shipman is a resident of South Glastonbury. This was Miss Shipman's first effort at teaching, and is engaged for the coming year, so it shows her work was satisfactory. The number of scholars are increasing every year. The teacher and the inhabitants of the district should make some move in the way of procuring a National Flag to float over the schoolhouse, which almost every district in town has.

District No. 9, *Twine Mill*. Two schools were maintained for the entire school year in this district. Mr. William R. Purple of Springfield, Mass., taught the higher grade for the fall term. This district seems to be up to the times in improvements.

The enrollment for the winter term was about 25; the average enrollment for the three terms, about 18.

Instruction has been given in the branches common to the other schools, and in several others besides.

The advantage of such a school, which the more advanced in the various districts could attend, has been plainly apparent.

Miss Pratt has had large experience, excellent advantages, and is a superior teacher. The School of Higher Grade has been well conducted.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF  
SCHOOL VISITORS.

*Our first meeting* was held October 15, 1892, with the Selectmen as a joint Board, to hear a petition from District No. 9 for an increased appropriation, and to consider the recommendation of an appropriation for teaching singing in the schools. Mr. J. W. Purtil, committee, presented the petition from District No. 9, stating that the district had added another room to the school-house, and employed a second teacher, the enumeration being 74, and the number of scholars registered 65.

It was voted to recommend an additional appropriation of \$300.

It was also voted by ballot—four votes being for and three against—to recommend the appropriation of \$180 for the purpose of teaching the principles and reading of music in our schools; this amount to be divided into three equal parts and divided among the three sections of the town. The joint Board then adjourned and the School Visitors held a session.

The Board organized by choosing A. A. Babcock chairman and S. H. Williams secretary.

It was voted that all the schools in town should meet on the morning of Friday, October 21st, and have an appropriate celebration of Discovery Day, and that teachers might dismiss the schools at noon. The meeting then adjourned for one week—until October 22d.

*The second meeting* was held according to the adjournment, but the returns from the districts not being all in, it was again adjourned until the 12th day of November.

*The third meeting* was held November 12th, when the same rules were adopted to govern the Board of School Visitors as had been used the previous year. Rev. M. Burr and A. A. Babcock were given the charge of the School of Higher Grade in South Glastonbury. The enumeration was considered, and the result is to be found in the table of statistics. It was voted that the secretary should cause to be printed some copies of the "Rules for the Schools" on cardboard. This was afterwards done.

*The last meeting* was held June 20, 1893, with the Selectmen as a joint Board. There were present: P. H. Goodrich, Charles

Bell, David Hollister, Selectmen ; A. A. Babcock, Rev. M. Burr, Wm. H. Griswold, J. S. Hollister, W. I. Goodale, School Visitors.

Deficiencies were voted — to the 1st district, \$35 ; to the second district, \$35, and to the 12th district, \$2.50. Appropriations for the 18 districts were recommended, as will be found in the last column of the table of statistics, amounting to \$6,205. It was also voted to recommend the appropriation of \$200 for the Glastonbury Free Academy for the ensuing year.

Two motions were made, naming different amounts, that we recommend an appropriation to continue the teaching of singing in our schools, but they were lost by votes of 5 to 3. The meeting then adjourned.

The schools have for the most part kept on the even tenor of their way, with little change from previous years, as will be seen in the reports of the Acting School Visitors. The most radical change has been in District No. 9, where the school building has been enlarged to make two rooms, and two schools have been maintained during the year. This necessitated an additional appropriation of \$300.

Fewer of the enumerated children of the town have attended school during the year than during the year previous ; those registered in the schools of the 18 districts and in the School of Higher Grade at South Glastonbury being 84 per cent. of the enumeration ; while in the year 1891-'92 there were 88½ per cent. The average attendance for the two years is singularly alike, for 1891-'92 being 57.1 per cent., and for 1892-'93 57.9 per cent. of the whole number registered. We might draw the conclusion from this that the publishing in the last report of the attendance of each scholar has had but little good effect.

There was one new departure during the year, this being that singing was taught in all the schools in town for from fifteen to twenty weeks. This has proved, however, to be a very spasmodic beginning of what seemed to be an excellent thing. The members of the School Board were of different minds as to its success and the advisability of its continuance. So it has been laid upon the shelf before a thorough test of it had been made.

The town this year, as heretofore, has helped to support two schools of a higher grade. On page 7 will be found the report of the committee of the Board that had charge of the school at South Glastonbury. The school at the Academy has not been quite so large as it was the year before. The following report tells briefly the attendance and progress :

"The Academy had, the past year, three terms,—a total of thirty-eight weeks. The number of pupils enrolled has been 63.

"The daily average attendance in the fall term was  $94\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. of pupils attending ; in the winter term,  $88\frac{7}{10}$  per cent. This record is even better than the good report of last year.

"Very successful and profitable work has been done by the pupils during the year. The Academy is providing for the older pupils of the town just the advantages for higher study and training that are needed.

"No change has been made in the requirements for admission since the fall of 1891. The fact that several applicants have recently failed to meet the requirements shows the need of more careful attention to good preparatory work."

The attendance at the two schools, showing the number of scholars over and under 16, was as follows :

This includes two scholars at the Academy from out of town.

The table of statistics, which follows, shows clearly the cost to the town, and the attendance upon each of the schools, except the Academy. It will be seen that in some of the districts the average attendance has been extremely small.
