REPORTS OF THE ACTING SCHOOL VISITORS TO THE BOARD.

Districts Nos. 1 and 5.

District No. 1, *Naubuc*. Miss Mattie L. Brown of Talcottville has taught the entire school year in the higher grade.

Miss Sarah Hayden of Essex taught in the primary department during the fall and winter terms, and Miss Jennie Cuzner during the spring term.

District No. 5, *Addison*. Miss Mary Robinson has taught the school in this district for several years. An addition of several volumes, about thirty, has been made to the school library the past year.

WM. H. GRISWOLD, A. S. V.

Districts Nos. 2, 3, and 18.

District No. 2, *Center*. Both teachers have been the same as last year,—Mrs. Geo. R. Hale in the lower room and Miss Ethyl Clark in the upper room. The results of the year have been about the same. A few cases of scarlet fever in the district had the effect of almost completely emptying the schoolrooms, during the last month of the fall term. With that exception, the attendance has been very good, especially during the spring term, when as many as twenty-four in each room were present every day.

District No. 3, *Green*. Miss Lucy Carrier has taught another year in this school. There has seemed to be an advance in the school similar to that remarked last year. The school has been quite large with considerable diversity of ages. This has made a strong argument for some system of grading the studies in our schools.

District No. 18, *Williams*. Miss Daisy White in this school has shown the benefit of Normal training. The scholars are for the most part quite young, though a few were old enough to prepare for entrance to the Academy. Miss White has been faithful and painstaking, and made a good or favorable impression.

Districts Nos. 4, 8, and 10.

District No. 4, *Old Center*. Miss Elizabeth Clarke of Portland taught for the first time in this district. The improvement during the last term was marked—both teachers and scholars showing more interest.

A small library has been built to keep the few nice books safe, and in good condition.

During the summer vacation, the schoolhouse has been thoroughly repaired, re-furnished, and attention given to the ventilation, which was very poor.

The school should be in a very flourishing condition, with such pleasant surroundings, under the direction of Miss Florence Hollister, who is engaged to teach the ensuing year.

District No. 8, *Matson Hill*. This school has been taught by Miss Lucy Shipman. The schoolroom is neat, but old-fashioned. The scholars, who are bright and prompt in their recitations, should have more blackboards and other helps to make the work interesting. A few books on Physiology are to be found in the library.

Miss Vara Shipman is to teach here the coming year.

District No. 10, *Nayaug*. This school was taught until the latter part of March by Miss Flora Thompson, then Miss Imogene Bacon satisfactorily finished the term. Miss Lottie Spaford entered upon the duties of teacher for the first time in the spring term. The school is small, but the children bright and interesting, all but two being under twelve years of age.

I noticed pleasing natural science experiments were used for the benefit of the children.

Only a few books are in the library.

Miss Hattie Miller is engaged to take the school in September.

Districts Nos. 12, 13, and 17.

District No. 12, *Wassuc*. The scholarship of this school during the year has been largely a repetition of that of the year preceding. The recitation that most surprised and pleased the writer was perhaps that of Reading. Supplementary reading has been used largely, thus giving the pupils an acquaintanceship with

many authors and their leading works. In this way the scholars have not only been taught to read, but have at the same time had instruction in English literature. All of the studies have been handled intelligently, and the results of the year, for teacher and scholars, have been most satisfactory. Miss Mary Walch of Easthampton succeeds Miss Curtis the coming year.

District No. 13, *Middle*. Miss Myra Cannon of Boston proved herself to be a conscientious and intelligent teacher. She, however, found the discipline of a school a heavy burden, and as this in school work is a very important part, she could not be prevailed upon to hold the school during the year. Miss Cannon was followed the second term by Miss Grace Hills of Gilead, who continued through the year and did fairly good work.

Miss Hills is engaged to open the school in September.

District No. 17, *Nipsic*. This has had commendable results, especially in department under the care of Mr. Banks Jones. He has a happy faculty of disciplining a school. The schoolroom is light, commodious, and in good repair, as are the buildings. An appropriation of five dollars from the state, and a like amount raised in the district, have permitted the addition of several volumes to the library. A like addition, frequently, is much to be desired, as the need of books of reference is felt more and more.

Miss Effie B. Curtis is engaged for the fall term, and we hope for good results, both in department and scholarshlp.

During the spring term I visited the 15th district school, where Mrs. E. C. Goodale was found, with her little school grouped interestingly about her. Mrs. Goodale, early in the year, seeks the confidence of the pupils and the acquaintance of the parents. The parents have been frequent and interested visitors of the school.

ADA B. CROSBY, A. S. V.

Districts Nos. 6, 7, and 9.

Districts Nos. 6, 7, and 9 were by mutual agreement placed under my supervision and were taught by the following teachers during the entire school year :

District No. 6, *South Center*. This school has been conducted throughout the year by Mrs. E. D. Miller of South Glastonbury. Mrs. Miller is a teacher of experience and ability, is also a favorite

in the district. Mrs. Miller is to teach in District No. 10, Nayaug, which is nearer her home, is why she makes the change, but the district was very fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Mary M. Goodrich of East Hampton, who has taught in District No. 9 for several terms with good success.

District No. 7, *Taylorstown*. Miss Anna P. Tryon of South Glastonbury has had charge of this school for the whole school year. Miss Tryon is a teacher of experience and ability, and has done good work.

District No. 9, *Twine Mill*. Mrs. Mary M. Goodrich of East Hampton taught the higher grade for the whole school year with marked success. The primary department was taught by Miss Catharine Walker, who is a resident of the district, and is painstaking in her work. She is engaged for the ensuing year.

Reading. No branch of study needs more liberal provision and intelligent teaching than reading, since no study of the school will be so frequently applied to practical use in after life, and no other will afford so much rational enjoyment and abundant means for personal improvement. Ability to read aloud has its value and is an object worthy of great effort to attain.

All of our schools have a national flag, and I wish that the teachers would see that they were in use every school day.

Districts Nos. 11, 14, 15, and 16.

District No. 11. Miss Lena Taylor of South Manchester was in charge of this school the entire year.

The parents of the children in this district seem desirous that the children shall have the advantage of school, as is shown by the regular attendance when the weather and traveling will permit, most of them living quite a distance from the schoolhouse.

The schoolroom has been thoroughly renovated and newly painted, and the expense of the same met by popular subscription.

District No. 14. The fall and winter terms of this school were taught by Miss Effie Buell of Gilead. This was Miss Buell's first attempt at teaching, and her inexperience, coupled with the presence of some unruly scholars, left more to be desired in the line of discipline.

The spring term was taught by Mr. M. I. Loveland, an old teacher. It is to be regretted that the attendance was so small, as his work was highly satisfactory.

District No. 15. This school was in charge of Mrs. E. C. Goodale during the entire school year. Miss Crosby visited this school after her return from abroad.

I can say there is much to be regretted in the irregular attendance in this district. With a good working number of scholars registered, the teacher is hampered by the uncertainty of when she will see them in the schoolroom. We hope to see this remedied the present year.

District No. 16 was taught by Miss Nellie Cowperthwaite of Hyde Park, Mass. Her work seemed to your committee highly satisfactory, and if her services could have been secured for a longer period we have no doubt it would have been for the interest of the school. She resumes her work this year in a school with nearly double the salary of last year. This is one result of close attention to her work.

It was also my privilege to make one visit each to Districts Nos. 12, 13, and 17 during the absence of Miss Crosby. I can say very little of the progress of the work of these, not having visited them previously, but in each the discipline was very good, and the scholars seemed to be interested in their work.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF SCHOOL VISITORS.

On October 20, 1894, was held the first meeting. The Board organized by appointing A. A. Babcock, chairman, and S. H. Williams, secretary. All the members were present except the Rev. James P. Cameron of South Glastonbury, who sent in his resignation, giving two reasons, apart from others, for taking this step. First, he deemed it unwise for a clergyman to hold an office which is elective. Second, he thought probably a number of votes were cast for him under the misapprehension that he was a Republican.

It was voted to accept his resignation, and the vacancy was filled by the election by ballot of Mrs. J. H. Hale. A portion of the Board feeling themselves illy fitted, in consequence of lack of experience and time, for the duties of a school visitor, urged that a visitor be appointed by the Board to superintend the schools of the town. After some discussion the motion was lost — four to one.

One of the teachers failing to appear before the Board at its meeting, August 15th, wrote asking for a certificate. It was with some reluctance granted, bearing the date of her application.

The Secretary was instructed to write to Mr. Potter, Agent of the State Board of Education, asking him to visit certain portions of the town and search for children not in school.

Mr. Williams passed in his resignation as a member of the Board. It was voted to lay the same on the table for *one year*. Meeting adjourned for two weeks, or until November 3d, for perfection of enumeration.

The second meeting was held November 3d, as per adjournment, with all members present.

The enumeration of the several districts was considered, and the reports of the committees corrected. Seven hundred and thirty-two children were enumerated between the ages of four and sixteen, eighty-seven of whom were in no school (October 1, 1894). The enumeration will be found in the table of statistics.

Mr. Williams, who has served the Board as Secretary the past three years, urged his resignation as same, much to the regret of all the members. After reluctantly accepting his resignation, the vacancy was filled by the election of Ada B. Crosby.

A meeting of the Joint Board of Selectmen and School Visitors, held the 18th of June, as per statute, with all members present. A deficiency of thirty-six and $\frac{26}{100}$ dollars being reported by the Third School District, a like amount was voted to said district to cover same.

Fifteen dollars was voted to Twelfth District.

The estimated cost of the schools for the town the next succeeding year is somewhat in advance of that of last year. The amount recommended for the Academy is the same as last year, *i. e.*, two hundred dollars.

Recommended for music, two hundred and ten dollars, the same to be divided equally among the three sections.

The appropriations recommended will be found the table of statistics.

After the Joint Board meeting dissolved, the Visitors were called to order by the chairman, A. A. Babcock, and the general examination of teachers was considered. It was voted to meet at Academy Hall, August 20th, where all applicants for schools in the town should present themselves for examination and certificates.

The adjourned meeting was attended by all the members save Mr. Williams, who was out of town. It was found that two of the applicants held state certificates, and some others had taught in the town several years giving satisfaction. These were, therefore, excused. Eight applicants took the examination, five of this number receiving certificates.

In ungraded schools it is very difficult to arrange the work satisfactorily. It, of course, takes considerable time for the teacher, under the present system, to locate the scholars in their studies, and the demand made on the teacher's time by the numerous recitations in the larger schools is great. This gives too little time for explanations and side-helps.

I think all teachers should prepare for the lessons of the day, and be as well fitted to *teach well* as the pupils are to *recite well*. Sometimes, when visiting schools, it has been found that the teacher spends much time outside the regular school hours culling information from various sources for the benefit of geography, history, or physiology classes, as the case may be.

In this way the pupil gains a large amount of information not found in their text-books. The average attendance for the three terms of those registered was 62.88 per cent., or 4.12 per cent. less than the average of the preceding year. I would strongly urge the use of deportment and scholarship cards. If these were sent monthly to the parents for their signature, I think they would be better informed in regard to the condition of their children in school, and be more on the alert for their interests.

The electric road places many children in easy communication with the Academy. The eastern branch hasn't grown yet, but perhaps it may in good time, thus enabling all sections of the town to have the benefit of its advantages. The Academy has been in session thirty-eight weeks the past year. Fifty-five pupils have been enrolled — twenty-seven boys and twenty-eight girls.

These pupils represent a large number of districts in the town. This indicates something of a general interest in the advantages offered by the Academy. Thirty-four new pupils have been admitted to commence the course in the fall of 1895. This is a larger class than has entered at one time since the opening of the Free Academy.

It is the aim of the Academy to help in the best possible way all its pupils, and to incite them to careful and faithful application.

We want in all our schools a healthy mental, physical, and moral growth or development. If the children in school are industrious and do good, conscientious work, we may expect later on to have intelligent and honorable citizens.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER.

To the Town of Glastonbury:

As Health Officer, I have the honor to report as follows: The year has been remarkable on account of the prevalence of contagious diseases.

During the year ending August 31, 1895, there have been reported the following cases of contagious diseases:

Typhoid fever,	-	-	-	-	-	32

In the fall of '94 typhoid fever was very prevalent all over the town. In Hopewell it assumed the form of an epidemic, there being twenty-four cases (from July, '94, to March, '95), in that village, more than during the "previous twenty years." Great effort was made to stamp out the disease in that locality and it was only accomplished by removing several of the patients to the Hartford hospital. The origin of the epidemic was clearly traced to a well that had been contaminated by the discharges of a typhoid fever patient the previous spring. An analysis of the water showed serious surface contamination, and was pronounced unfit for use by Prof. H. E. Smith of New Haven. The well was condemned and has since been filled up.

The origin of the scarlet fever epidemic which occurred during the month of December could not be discovered. It was quickly suppressed, no deaths having occurred.

During the year I have made fifty-five visits of inspection—upon receipt of reports of the existence of contagious diseases or upon receipt of complaint of unsanitary conditions in any part of the town. I have also caused to be buried four horses, one cow, and two dogs, which had been neglected and would soon have become nuisances.

In my efforts to improve the sanitary condition of the town, I have received the hearty co-operation of all physicians practicing in town. I have been courteously received by all. Each year the people are giving more thought and attention to their surroundings, and are especially looking more carefully after their house drains. The need from a sanitary point of view in this town is some more general system of drainage for the more thickly-settled portions of the town.
