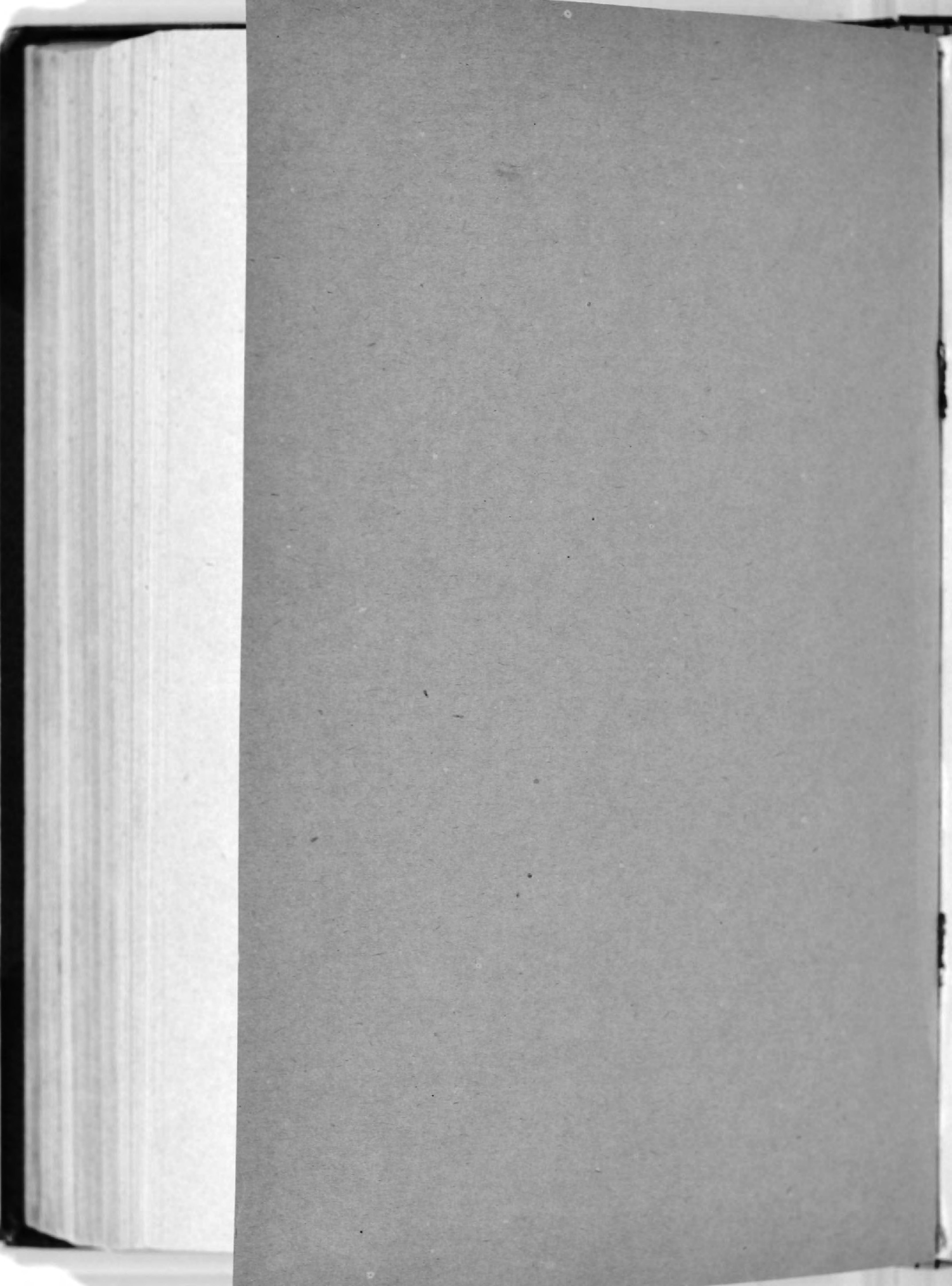

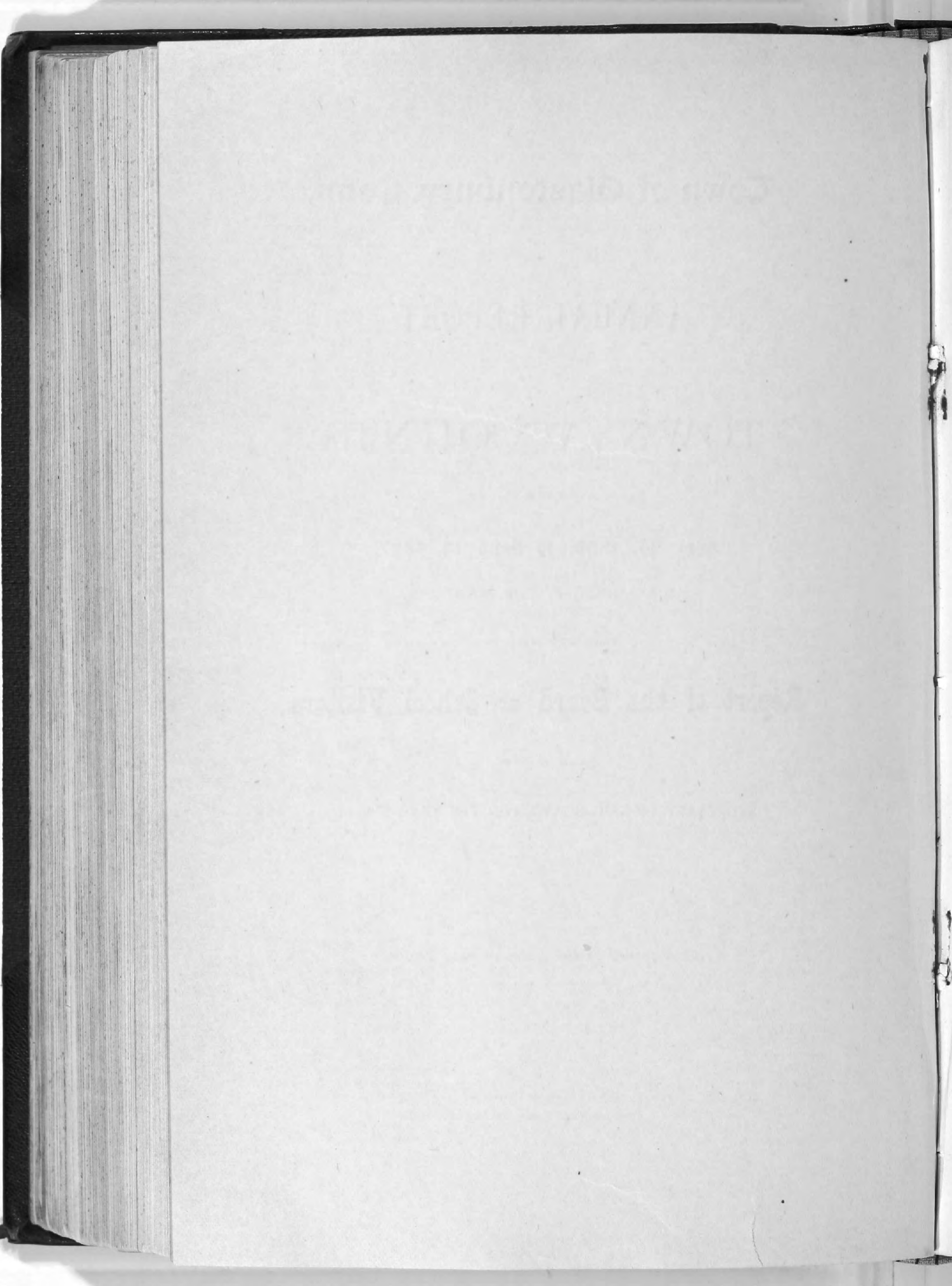

### ANNUAL REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER.

There have been reported during the year just closed fourteen cases of measles. There was also a general epidemic of German measles during the winter.

Of scarlet fever there was reported fifteen cases, mostly confined to the First School District. The first cases occurred the last of March, and the last were reported early in June. Quarantine was established as far as practicable. The origin of the disease was not definitely known, but it was thought to have been introduced in rags or paper stock about which the children first reported were known to have played. Five of the cases were very severe. There were no deaths.

Three cases of diphtheria were reported. The origin of the first case was not known, but the other cases took the disease from the first before quarantine was established.



One case of whooping cough and two of typhoid fever complete the list of contagious diseases reported to me.

The Health Officer has received but few complaints. My suggestions in regard to existing nuisances have been readily complied with.

## REPORTS OF ACTING SCHOOL VISITORS.

### Districts Nos. 1 and 5.

District No. 1 was taught in the higher grade by Miss Mabel A. Alvord of Barkhamsted during the year. Miss Nina Simmons of Essex was engaged for the primary department, but owing to ill health was unable to take the fall term, but taught the winter and spring terms. Miss Allena Taylor of South Manchester taught the fall term. Mrs. H. P. Miller and Mrs. V. E. P. Hale, both of this town, and teachers of many years' experience, are engaged for the fall term.

### Districts Nos. 2, 3 and 18.

District No. 2. Miss L. J. Cuzner of this town taught in the fall term in the higher grade with good success; followed by Miss Allena Taylor of South Manchester in the winter and spring terms. Both are teachers of experience and ability, and under their tutelage the school made good progress. Miss Cuzner is again engaged for the present term. Mrs. V. E. P. Hale of this town taught the primary school the entire year with her usual success. Too much cannot be said in Mrs. Hale's favor as a successful teacher for the little ones. Miss Taylor takes this school the present term.

District No. 3. Miss Almira Lewis of Middletown taught the full term. She proved herself a capable teacher. The school was large; many small children. Miss L. J. Cuzner taught the winter and spring terms. In some respects this was a hard school to manage. Parents (some of them) did not seem to take the interest they ought.

Miss A. L. Hollister of Vineyard Haven, Mass., is engaged for the present term.

District No. 18. Miss Bessie B. Brainard of this town has taught the entire year, and we may well consider that she gave satisfaction, as she is engaged for the present year. Miss Brainard found one difficulty at the start, as a number of her scholars could hardly talk in the English language. Our adopted citizens should take more pains to have their children learn our language.

**Districts Nos. 4, 8 and 10.**

Elected during the winter to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. Addie S. Hale, I feel that I labor under a disadvantage in making a report of the schools.

District No. 4, Old Church. This school was taught by Miss Florence Hollister during the entire year. She is a teacher of experience, and the school did good work under her instruction. This schoolroom is well supplied with reference books, supplementary readers, a sand board, charts and maps.

The pupils enjoyed the instruction in music and drawing given by Mr. Sturdevant. A new clock was purchased with the proceeds of an entertainment given during the fall term.

Two pupils entered the Academy.

District No. 8, Matson Hill. Miss Vara Shipman taught during the fall term, and Miss Lucy Shipman during the winter and spring terms. Teachers in this school labor under great disadvantage, as the building is wholly unfit for teacher and pupils during the winter months, and the room is but poorly equipped with apparatus. Miss Dorothy Cone is engaged for the fall term.

No. 10, Noyaug. Mrs. E. P. Miller, a teacher of many years' experience, taught the school during the entire year, doing good work. Drawing by her pupils is to be particularly commended. More blackboards are needed, otherwise the room is very well furnished.

One pupil entered the Academy.

Miss Mabel B. Clark is engaged for this fall term.

**Districts Nos. 6, 7 and 9.**

District No. 6, South Center. Mrs. Mary M. Goodrich of East Hampton has taught the entire school year, with the assistance of Miss Amy M. Griswold for one term. There were more scholars than Mrs. Griswold could do justice by, so it was thought best to have an assistant, and the school was conducted very harmonious. Mrs. Goodrich is engaged to open the school in September.

The schoolhouse is too small; it should be larger, with two rooms, for there are enough scholars in this district to fill two rooms, and they would get enough better returns to pay for doing so.

District No. 7, Taylortown. This school has been taught by Miss Alice House of South Glastonbury throughout the year, with good results. Miss Amy M. Griswold has been engaged for the coming school year.

District No. 9, Twine Mill. Mr. William R. Purple of Springfield, Mass., having taught again the higher grade, as he always does, gave the best of satisfaction, having taught some eight terms in this district.



The primary department was taught by Miss Catherine Walker of South Glastonbury, who has been in this department for seven terms. The work of primary teacher is the most difficult of all teaching, and here is where experience counts most, yet in general, less is known of this work, and less is expected of the teacher. In the primary grade is the period when mental habits are formed by the pupil, and either mistaken habits or correct ones are deeply fixed.

Miss Catherine Walker is to teach in the higher grade and Miss Sarah Brainard in the primary department for the coming school year.

#### **Districts Nos. 11, 14, 15 and 16.**

District No. 11, North Street. Mrs. E. C. Goodale completed another successive year in this district. There was an attendance of twenty during some of the terms, which is evidence that the school is on the increase in numbers. The school buildings are in good condition, all necessary repairs being promptly and willingly made by the patrons and taxpayers.

The school building is in fair condition. A decided improvement might be made in the out-buildings, and at small expense.

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

---

The Board of Visitors met for organization October 26, 1896—all members present.

### FIRST MEETING.

A. A. Babcock, Esq., was elected chairman and Mrs. Addie S. Hale, secretary.

*It was voted:* That teachers' meetings be held as in the previous year.

The reports of District Committees not being all received, adjourned to November 3rd.

### SECOND MEETING.

Met November 3rd, 1896, and perfected the enumeration of the children. Total number, 782.

*Voted:* To invite the teachers to meet at the Academy, Tuesday evening, November 17, when Miss Welch, in the employ of King, Richardson & Co., would give free instruction on several points of education. These meetings were continued for several weeks at no expense to the town.

### THIRD MEETING.

Met January 19, 1897—3 present—and adjourned to January 30th.

### FOURTH MEETING.

Met January 30, 1897. Present—Messrs. Babcock, Betts, Griswold and Tallcott, the meeting being held with T. H. L. Tallcott, he not being able to meet the Board elsewhere.

Rev. J. Betts appointed Secretary pro tem.

The resignation of Mrs. Hale as member of the Board was received and accepted, and on ballot Mrs. Julia T. Clark was elected to fill the vacancy on the Board and as A. S. V. until October. T. H. L. Tallcott was then elected by ballot as secretary of the Board.

### FIFTH MEETING.

The semi-annual meeting of the Board was held (as the law requires) April 24, 1897. All the members present except Rev. J. Betts.

The resignation of Rev. J. Betts as a member of the Board was received, and accepted, and on ballot Rev. D. W. C. House was elected to fill the vacancy on the Board and as A. S. V. until October.

*Voted:* That the teachers' meeting for this term be omitted.



## SIXTH MEETING.

The joint Board of Selectmen and School Visitors met June 15th (as required by law). All the members present except E. E. Olcott, one of the selectmen.

The meeting organized with H. A. Potter as chairman. Claims of several districts for deficiencies were considered, and the following appropriations voted:—

To District No. 1, \$19.68; No. 5, \$13.43; No. 6, \$84.95; No. 9, \$11.90; No. 13, \$15.00; No. 14, \$15.00; No. 17, \$10.00. Total, \$169.96. The joint Board then made estimates of the sums necessary for the several districts for the ensuing year. (See Table of Statistics.)

## ACADEMY.

Rev. G. F. Waters, as a committee from the "Glastonbury Free Academy," presented the needs of that school, and, after some discussion, the matter of an appropriation was left for the action of the town.

The joint Board adjourned.

A meeting of the Board of S. V. was then held, with Chairman Babcock presiding.

*It was voted:* That the examination of teachers be left with the several A. S. V.'s in their several sections.

## SEVENTH MEETING.

The Board met September 22nd, 1896. All present except Mr. Griswold, who was out of the state. On motion, it was

*Voted:* That we hold a teachers' meeting at the Academy, Monday, October 11th, 1897, commencing at 9 o'clock a.m. Committees were appointed to procure speakers, &c.

A joint meeting of the Selectmen and School Visitors (new Boards) is to be held, as required by law, on Saturday, October 9th, 2 p.m., at Town Clerk's Office, at which time the School Visitors will organize and lay out their work for the ensuing year.

The average attendance for the town the past year was about the same as in the previous year.

## ACADEMY.

The school at the Free Academy has largely increased in numbers the past year, so that it has been necessary to have three teachers the entire year. That the Academy has for years been doing a grand work for our young people, no one can doubt who were present at the graduation exercises of four of our young ladies at the close of the last school year; and now for the first time in many years the Academy has a graduate in College, which establishes the fact that the Academy is able to prepare students for the higher institutions of learning.



Two prizes were given by Dr. C. G. Rankin for general excellence in scholarship throughout the year. The first, a gold medal, was given to Miss Emily L. Covell, the second, a silver medal, to Miss Nellie B. Griswold, both of the class of 1897.

Owing to my sickness for nearly one-half of the past year, I am unable to speak of the improvement in and needs of our schools as I otherwise might, but I am fully satisfied if the board would appoint one of their number to be the Acting Visitor and Superintendent of Schools for the whole town, it would bring about more uniformity in the methods of the schoolroom, and be a great blessing to the pupils.
