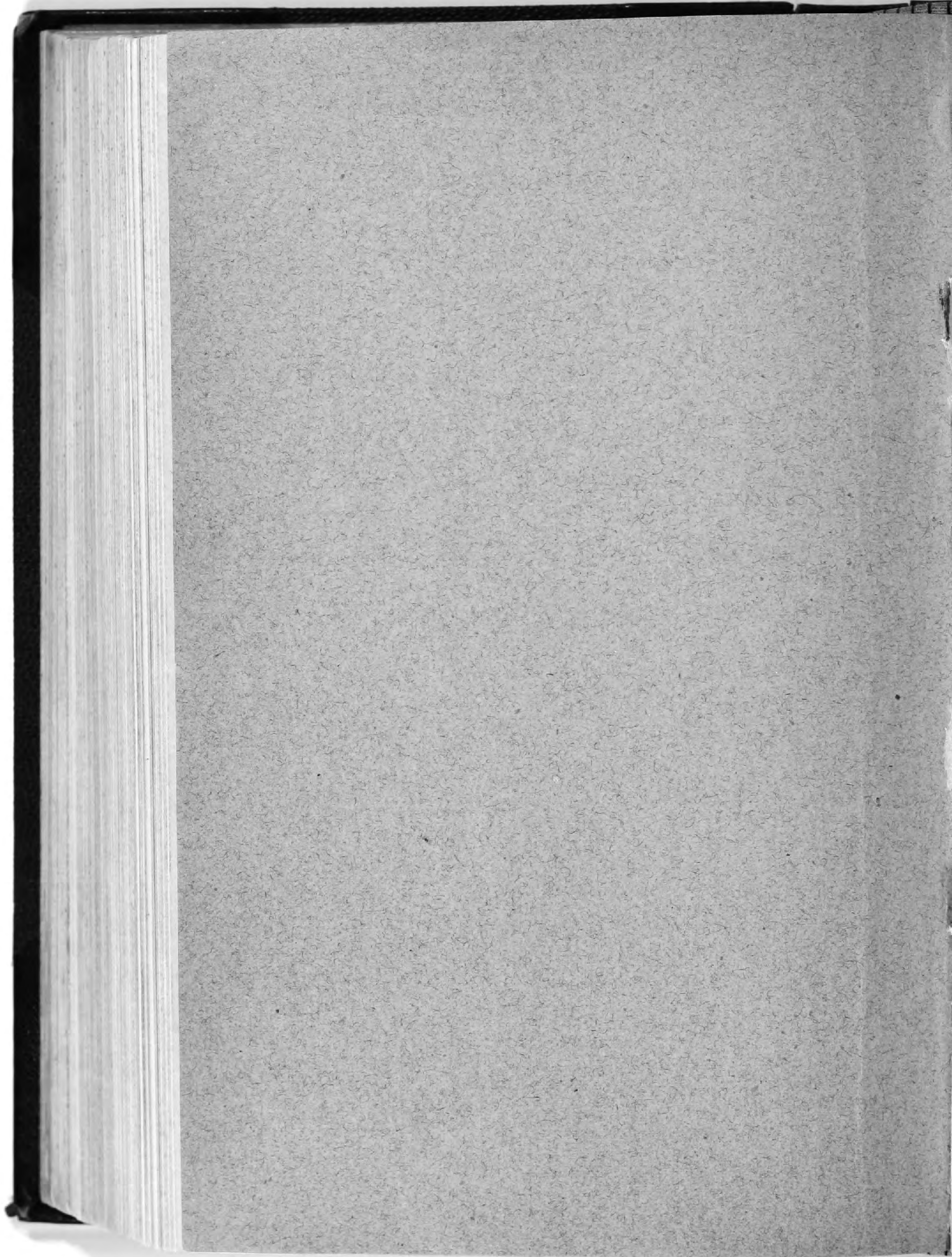

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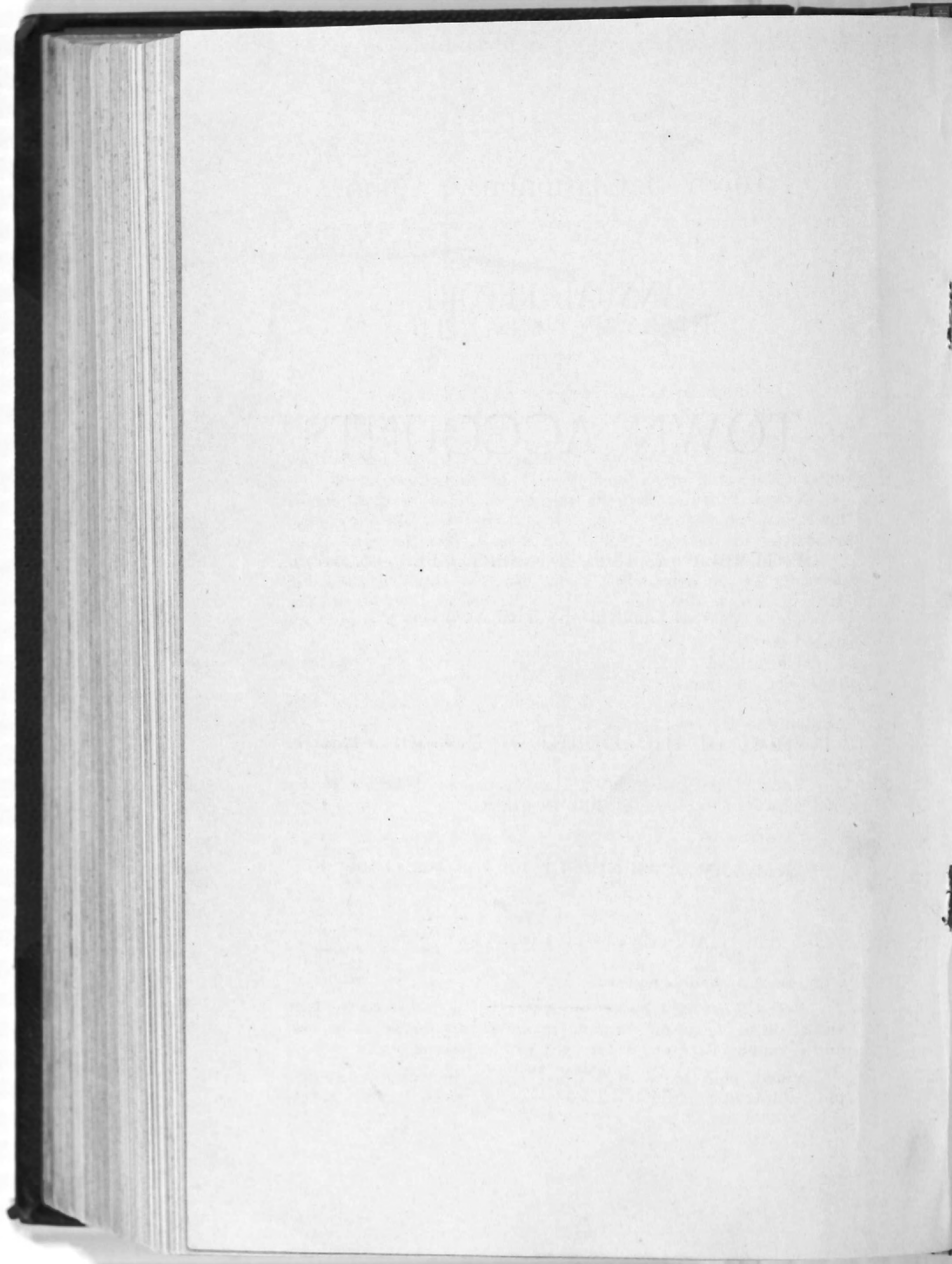

## TOWN MEETINGS HELD.

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Adjourned Annual Town Meeting, Oct. 17, 1898.

Voted, That the report of the selectmen be accepted and placed on file.

Voted, That the report of the treasurer, treasurer of the town deposit, town and school funds be accepted and placed on file.

Voted, That the selectmen and the agents of the town deposit funds examine carefully all loans of said fund and take such action as shall secure the town from all loss so far as possible.

Voted, That the town treasurer be instructed to strike from his accounts \$3 on outstanding order No. 88, series of 1884, and \$181.13, amount due from D. L. Tallcott, collector, on list of 1885.

Voted, That the report of the school visitors be accepted and placed on file.

Voted, That a tax be laid of 16 mills on the dollar, on list of 1898, due and payable April 1, 1899.

Voted, That \$800 be appropriated for the Glastonbury Free Academy for the ensuing year.

Voted, That the sum of \$50 be appropriated for Memorial day.

Voted, That the following sums be appropriated for the district schools of the town for the year ensuing.

Voted, That the treasurer be authorized to borrow on the faith and credit of the town a sum, not exceeding \$15,000.00, to be used for the running expenses of the town for the ensuing year.

Voted, That the board of school visitors be authorized to give the children of the district schools a day in which to raise money,

to be devoted to a monument to Lafayette to be erected in Paris by the school children of America.

Voted, That the report of the health officer be accepted and placed on file.

Voted, That the selectmen be instructed to investigate and see what can be done towards disposing of the present Town Farm property on "Still Hill," and also make inquiry and ascertain where some suitable farm, for a Town Farm, can be purchased, and report to the next annual town meeting.

### SPECIAL TOWN MEETING.

June 14, 1899.

A ballot was taken for a member of the Hartford Bridge District Commission for the term of three years, from July 1, 1899. Alembert O. Crosby receiving the largest number of votes cast was declared elected.

The following resolution was passed :

*Resolved,* That the selectmen be hereby authorized to purchase sufficient drain tile of suitable size to conduct the street water by the property of C. G. Rankin, commencing at the culvert in front of Masonic Hall.

The following resolution was passed :

*Resolved,* That the town accept from C. S. Williams a strip of land two rods in width, running from Williams road to the Green road, and maintain the same as a public highway.

The following vote was referred to the selectmen, to investigate as to the necessity of same, expense, etc., and report at the adjourned annual town meeting in October next, to wit :

*Voted,* That the selectmen be authorized to lay a tile drain on south side of Naubuc avenue, to run from Main street to Salmon Brook, the same to be a 10-inch tile from Main street to a point near the residence of Charles H. Phillips, and from the residence of said Phillips to the brook to be a 12-inch tile.

The following vote was passed :

*Voted,* That the selectmen be authorized to accept the road running from Colchester avenue to top of hill above Stephen Holmes' house, offered by C. S. Loveland. Also the one offered by Charles G. Rankin through his property from highway running east, each road to be two rods wide.

The following vote passed :

*Voted,* That the chair appoint a committee of three to look into the matter of changing line between school districts 9 and 12, so as to bring property of Frederick Trowbridge into district No. 12, and report at annual town meeting. The chair appointed Rev. F. H. Spear, H. N. Brainard and John W. Purtill as said committee.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER.

During the year ending September 1, 1899, there were reported to me one hundred and fifty-seven cases of measles. Most of these cases occurred during the months of March, April and May. Probably the actual number of cases would not fall much below three hundred. All parts of the town were visited alike. At that time measles were prevalent all over the state, but I noticed no town where they were reported to such an extent as here. They varied in severity. Two deaths were reported from complications following measles.

Three fatal cases of membranous croup were reported. The source of infection was not known in any of the cases.

There were two cases of typhoid fever, one in November and the other in December.

Whooping cough has been about in different parts of the town during the greater part of the past year. The cases are not as a general thing reported, as but little attention is paid to this disease. One death was reported from whooping cough.

But few complaints have come to me of existing nuisances. All such have been abated without objection. No public works of a sanitary nature have been undertaken during the past year.

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# REPORT

OF THE

## GLASTONBURY SCHOOLS.

### REPORTS OF ACTING SCHOOL VISITORS.

#### DISTRICT No. 1.—NAUBUC.

The higher grade was taught by Miss Adele Lois Hollister. The second grade was taught by Miss Alice J. Burpee. Both of these teachers labored under great disadvantage in their work, as the schoolhouse is not large enough to accommodate the large number of scholars that attend. The teachers cannot do themselves justice, neither can the scholars make the advancement in their studies they ought, for this reason of overcrowding. Both teachers have done excellent work, and are retained for the coming year.

#### DISTRICT No. 5.—ADDISON.

As my term of office did not commence until after the beginning of the Fall term, I did not call until the last of term and found there had been a great deal of sickness there. On the day I called, the teacher, Miss Rood, was sick, therefore I did not see her, but the report of her was very favorable. The two following terms were taught by Miss Anna Toohy, who deserves great credit for her management and for the enthusiasm she has awakened in this school, although her school numbered fifty-four at times.

This district will have for the coming year two schools, with Miss Toohy and Miss Martha Townroe as teachers.

#### DISTRICTS Nos. 2, 3 and 18.

District No. 2. Primary. The year has been a profitable one to the pupils in this room. Miss Lottie Spafard, who has been the teacher during the year, is eminently well qualified for her work with the children, as the results clearly show. A few additional desks were put in this room this year, but the size of the room is small for the number of pupils.

Grammar. Miss Laura J. Cuzner has maintained her reputation as a careful instructor in this grade. The pupils were as a rule faithful in their work. Fortunately both these teachers are re-engaged for the coming year.

District No. 3. Mrs. H. G. Woods taught throughout the year. Her manner was energetic, and a moderate amount of success was attained. Attendance was interfered with by sickness and other things, and as a consequence the work suffered.

Parents should never complain regarding the progress of pupils unless they are present promptly and regularly.

District No. 18. Miss Annie Laurie came to this school at the opening of the year, highly recommended by Sec. Chas. D. Hine. But in some ways the work of the school was not all that could be desired. An unusual amount of sickness among the pupils greatly interfered with the attendance in the winter and spring

terms. If these three districts are united as one it will give opportunity for better classification and consequently for doing better work.

The introduction of new readers in the schools has given an awakened interest to the pupils in the matter of reading, and a very marked improvement and advancement has been made along this line in some of the schools. It pays to put the best possible books in the hands of pupils. To do good work demands good tools.

The school was smaller during the year than it had been for some time.

The fall term opens with an increase in numbers, as a number of children have just attained school age.

Miss Nellie B. Griswold, a graduate of Glastonbury, class of '97, is engaged for the coming year.

District No. 8. Matson Hill. Mr. Charles E. Shipman retained his position throughout the year and did good work.

The enumeration of this district is on the increase. Many of the farms have been purchased by Italian families, who are desirous of a common school education for their children.

The contract for the erection of a new schoolhouse has been made and work will be begun immediately.

District No. 10. Nayaug. The work of this school was carried on by Mrs. H. P. C. Miller throughout the year with her usual good success.

The school was large for this district, but this year will be smaller, as one large family has been removed.

Miss Miller is re-engaged.

Two pupils entered the academy, so that now this district is represented there by five of our young people.

DISTRICTS Nos. 6, 7, and 9.

District No. 6. South Center. This school has been taught the whole school year by Miss Mary M. Goodrich as principal, and Miss Mary L. Shipman as assistant, and they are both engaged to teach the coming year. The schoolroom is very well supplied with reference books.

What this district should have is another room, for as it is the teachers cannot do justice to the scholars, and cost would be very small, and the district is abundantly able to make the improvement.

Three entered the academy.

District No. 7. Taylortown. Miss Amy M. Griswold has taught the school of this district for the past two years. Her work was good.

Miss Bertha M. Norton of South Manchester is teaching the fall term.

District No. 9. Twine Mill. Miss Catherine E. Walker and Miss Sarah T. Brainard have taught the school of this district, Miss Walker in room No. 1 and Miss Brainard in room No. 2, with good progress. Mr. Clark T. Falkner has been engaged for room No. 1, and Miss C. E. Walker for room No. 2, for the coming year.

## DISTRICTS 12, 13, 17.

The year in each of these schools has been one of marked improvement in every way. The discipline has been excellent and the work in the schoolroom as well as could be expected in district ungraded schools. Much credit is due the teachers, who by their fidelity and painstaking care made the schools a splendid success.

District No. 12 (Wassuc) has been under the efficient direction of Miss Bessie Brainard. Her methods of instruction and discipline are very commendable, and of course successful. The schoolroom is always neat and orderly, and is made attractive by many features introduced by the teacher. Those interested in good schools will be pleased to know that Miss Brainard is engaged for another year.

There is great need of more room in this schoolhouse, also of repairs. This matter, however, would have been attended to but for the present agitation of district consolidation. Owing to the likelihood of this being accomplished it was thought wise to postpone the improvements until after the town meeting.

District No. 13. The school in this district was taught through the year by Miss Mabel Thomas, who demonstrated her ability to the perfect satisfaction of interested parents. The school has received new supplies during the year, and is quite well equipped. The building is in good repair, but the great disadvantage is the lack of a school yard.

District No. 17 (Neipsic) is an object of pride to the voters of the community, and hence a well-kept school. Great care is always exercised in the choice of a teacher, and only such as can bring the best of testimonials are employed. Miss Harriet F. Black, of Hartford, a normal graduate, taught a model school during the year, having previously taught two terms at District No. 12. We lost her this year, as a better offer from Hartford tempted her away. But the committee has secured another who starts the school work of the year with much promise. Miss Eva A. Crosby, a graduate of Wilbraham Academy, is now in charge. Miss Crosby, after graduation, took a post graduate course, and the past year she spent in the study of the higher branches at Boston University. She is a worker, painstaking, thorough and efficient. The visitor expects that the standard of the school will be maintained.

The present agitation respecting the town schools must result in much good to the cause of education. The importance to the town of the best schools possible is sure to be made plain. In the meantime much can be done in the way of insisting on systematic work under the present method. An aim at graded work is altogether advisable even in the district school.

## DISTRICTS Nos. 11, 14, 15 and 16.

For the present Miss M. DeEtte Slocum, a graduate of the New Haven Normal School, is in charge.

The school buildings are in good condition and willingly kept so by the District.

District No. 15. Northeast. Miss Minnie V. Fryer taught the fall term, when a more lucrative offer secured her services for Manchester, and we lost an excellent teacher. Miss Emma D. Rood finished the year very acceptably, and is in charge at this writing. The school property is in good condition.

District No. 16. Goslee Street.—This district was fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Mary C. Treat, a teacher of experience and we considered that the children made good advancement in their studies, and the moral tone of the school was something to be noted.

Mrs. Treat is engaged for the present year.

#### SUMMARY.

Please note by reference to the Table of Statistics these Districts, in spite of the severe winter, and their isolated location, in the average attendance will compare favorably with your more central localities.

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

### FIRST MEETING.

The Board of School Visitors met for organization Oct. 15, 1898, five members present. A. A. Babcock, Esq., elected chairman and Mrs. Julia T. Clark, secretary.

Meeting of Joint Board of Selectmen and School Visitors was then called, three selectmen present.

S. H. Williams presented a request from the Trustees of the Academy regarding a representative in the corporation from the town.

Voted, That it is the opinion of this Board that the town be represented in the Corporation of Glastonbury Free Academy by one or more persons.

Voted, To fix the appropriations to the several districts as estimated at the meeting held June 21, the whole amount \$6,445.

Voted, That the teachers be required to send monthly reports to parents and require a reply. The Secretary authorized to procure blanks. Mr. Hutchins appointed a committee to bring the matter of Lafayette Day before the town meeting.

### SECOND MEETING.

October 29, 1898.—All members present. Enumeration lists of children perfected. Whole number, 817, a gain of 27 on the list of 1897. Not in school, 97.

Rev. F. H. Spear and Mr. J. H. Hutchins appointed a committee for next teachers' meeting.

Voted, That Wednesday, November 23, be celebrated as Lafayette Day.

#### THIRD MEETING.

April 1, 1899—5 present.

The same committee for teachers' meeting of the spring term retained.

Voted, That the votes of Sept. 10, 1898 and Oct. 3, 1898, be rescinded.

Voted, That the School Visitors give to Messrs. Jerome and Jefferson Weir the privilege of sending their children to the school of District No. 16.

#### FOURTH MEETING.

Meeting of Joint Board of Selectmen and School Visitors, June 20, 1899—All members present. Estimated appropriations made to the several districts, (See table of statistics.)

Voted, Deficiency in No. 11 of one dollar and sixty-five cents, and in No. 14 of one dollar and fifteen cents. Joint Board adjourned. Meeting of School Board called.

Voted, To assign one subject for examination of teachers to each member of the Board, each member to have a copy of all the subjects.

Voted, That the secretary procure 1,000 report cards and order blanks for certificates.

Voted, Resolution offered by Mr. Spear, viz:

“Resolved, That in the opinion of the Board of School Visitors no pupil from the district schools should be permitted to take the examination for admission to the Academy without having first obtained from his teacher a certificate of qualification.”

Committee appointed for fall teachers' meeting, Rev. F. H. Spear and Mr. J. P. Cornish.

#### FIFTH MEETING.

June 27, 1899—5 present.

Voted, That a committee of two be appointed to notify the taxpayers and voters of District No. 8, by a notice placed upon the district schoolhouse and through the Gazette and Bulletin of the proposed action of the Board of School Visitors to withhold all money from the district until a suitable building for school purposes is provided, and that they are invited to assemble in the schoolhouse at the call of this committee, to show why such action should not be taken.

Committee appointed Mr. A. A. Babcock and Mrs. Julia T. Clark. Time, Wednesday, July 5, 1899, at 6.30 p. m.

#### SIXTH MEETING.

July 7, 1899—4 present.

Report of committee on Matson Hill schoolhouse showed that only two taxpayers of the district were present at the meeting held July 5.

Voted, That the Board withhold all money to District No. 8 (Matson Hill) until the district furnish a building or room for school purposes satisfactory to said Board.

Officers appointed, for District No. 8, viz:—Committee and Treasurer, Wilbur J. Hodge; Clerk, Frederick G. Patten; Collector, A. A. Welles.

## SEVENTH MEETING.

September 1, 1899—5 present.

Voted, to rescind the vote of July 7, regarding the money to District No. 8.

Voted, That money be given to District No. 8 as usual, until Dec. 1, 1899 and after that if a new building satisfactory to the School Visitors is erected.

Adjourned to meeting of Joint Board, Friday, Sept. 8, to consider the matter of request from District No. 5.

## EIGHTH MEETING.

Sept. 8, 1899. Joint Board—3 Selectmen and 5 School Visitors present.

Request of District No. 5, (Addison) made by Mr. George C. Samson, district committee, for an added appropriation in order that they might open a primary department in their school.

Voted, To make an additional appropriation of a sum not to exceed \$225 to District No. 5, the disposition to be ruled by the Acting Visitor.

Voted, To pay deficiency of ten dollars to District No. 17.

## LAFAYETTE DAY.

General exercises appropriate to the day were held on the afternoon of Wednesday, November 23, 1898, in the various schools, and contributions of small sums were given to be sent to the Lafayette Memorial Fund. The sum of nine dollars and eighty-six cents was raised.

## ACADEMY.

The number of pupils enrolled during the year was 106. The graduating class numbered 8, all young ladies.

The prizes offered by Dr. C. G. Rankin for general excellence in scholarship were not made to the whole school as formerly, but limited to members of the graduating class. Miss Helen J. Vail of the 9th district received the first prize and Miss Lora Griswold of the 1st district the second. There has been an entire change in the corps of teachers. For the ensuing year they are as follows:

Principal, Henry E. Cottle; assistants, Edgar H. Lane and Miss Sarah M. Osborne.

## TEACHERS' MEETINGS.

Three teachers' meetings were held during the year, one in each of the fall, winter and spring terms. They were very successful gatherings, full of interest and instruction. The morning sessions were devoted to topics assigned by the committee to teachers, who willingly and effectually responded to the task laid upon them. For the afternoon sessions, speakers from other towns were secured. Among the number were Miss Bertha McConkey of South Manchester Training School on "Reading," Prof. C. T. Winchester of Wesleyan on "Literature" and Prof. W. H. C. Pyncheon of Trinity on "Geology of the Connecticut Valley," (illustrated by stereopticon.)

It is a matter of regret that parents and others interested in the education of our youth do not avail themselves of the privilege to be present at these meetings.
