ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, OCTOBER 8, 1910.

The adjourned annual town meeting held this P. M. was largely attended.

Lewis W. Ripley, Chairman.

After the reading of the warning by the Clerk on motion of Samuel H. Williams, it was

Voted, That the Report of the Selectmen be accepted and placed on file, following which the following passed without comment.

Voted, That the Report of the Treasurer be accepted and placed on file.

Voted, That the Report of the Treasurer of Deposit Fund be accepted and placed on file.

Voted, That the Report of the Town Clerk be accepted and placed on file.

After some explanation by Chairman S. H. Williams, it was

Voted, That the Report of the Town School Committee and entire Report of Schools be accepted and placed on file.

Voted, That the Report of Directors of Public Library be accepted and placed on file.

Voted, That the Report of Town Health Officer be accepted and placed on file.

After explanation by the Tree Warden, it was

Voted, That the Report of the Tree Warden be accepted and placed on file.

After much discussion on motion of C. F. Dean, it was

Voted, That the repairs and improvements of the Highways and Bridges of the Town be left in hands of the Selectmen for ensuing year.

A somewhat lengthy discussion followed, when it was

Voted, That the Selectmen be instructed to investigate the condition of the Iron Bridge, near the upper mills in Addison, and find the cost of a Stone Arch Bridge for this place, and report at a future Town Meeting.

On motion of Charles G. Rankin, it was

Voted, That the Selectmen be instructed to lay out a road, three rods wide, from the road known as Griswold Street to run north from near the residence of Ferdinand Lange to land of Ignatz Fink — Candle Wood Hill District, so called — and that this road shall not be laid out until a survey of same is made and recorded in Town Records.

On motion of Mr. H. Roser, it was

Voted, That the macadam road, known as New London Turnpike — running from junction of Main Street and Hebron Avenue, southeast to Hubbard Street — be repaired and put in good order by the Selectmen.

On motion of W. S. Kingsbury, it was

Voted, That the Selectmen be instructed to expend a sum not to exceed \$500 in oiling the macadam roads of the Town.

Voted, That the Treasurer be authorized to borrow, on the faith and credit of the Town, a sum not to exceed \$10,000 for the running expenses of the Town.

Voted, That the sum of \$60 be appropriated for Memorial Day, and that said sum be paid before May 30th, to the proper person authorized to receive and use same.

Voted, That when this meeting adjourns it be to the last Saturday in February, 1911, at 2 P. M., for the purpose of, at that time, laying a tax.

Voted, That the Report of the Committee on Town By-Laws be accepted, and the said By-Laws as proposed by said Committee, be adopted.

Voted, That the sum of \$200 be appropriated for use of the "Green Park Association" and that said sum be paid to the Treasurer of said Association by or before June 1, 1911.

Voted, That the operation of Section 4 of Chapter 128 of the Public Acts of 1909, in this Town, be suspended until March 15, 1911.

Voted, That the sum of \$250 be appropriated for the use of the Tree Warden, in spraying shade trees on the highways of the Town.

The following By-Laws, adopted, are to supercede all previous By-Laws to date.

CHAPTER I.

TOWN AND ELECTORS MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. At the annual town meeting held on the first (1st)

Monday of October in each year hereafter the following town officers shall be voted for by ballot with the names fairly written or printed on the official ballot as by statute provided, viz:

Two (2) Registrars of Voters.

One (1) Assessor for three (3) years and any vacancy.

Three (3) Board of Relief.

Two (2) Auditors.

Two (2) Town School Committee for three (3) years, and any vacancy that may occur in said office.

Three (3) Selectmen.

One (1) Collector of Taxes.

Seven (7) Constables.

Six (6) Grand Jurors.

Three (3) Agents of Town Deposit and Town Funds.

One (1) Tree Warden.

Two (2) Town Corporators G. F. A., for three (3) years, and any vacancy that may occur in said office.

Two (2) Directors of the Public Library for three (3) years, and any vacancy that may occur in said office.

At the annual town meeting held on the first (1st) Monday of October, 1911, and bi-annually thereafter, there shall also be voted for on the official ballot as aforesaid:

One (1) Town Clerk, for two (2) years.

One (1) Town Treasurer, for two (2) years.

At the annual town meeting held on the first (1st) Monday of October, 1913, and tri-annually thereafter, there shall also be voted for on the official ballot as aforesaid:

One (1) Bridge Commissioner, for three (3) years, of the Hartford Bridge and Highway District. Vacancies in said office may be voted for on the official ballot as aforesaid on the first (1st) Monday of October in any year.

The Town Treasurer elected shall be the Treasurer of the Town Deposit, Town, and School Funds.

The ballot-box for the reception of such ballots shall be opened at the commencement of said annual meeting at six (6) o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be closed at five (5) o'clock in the afternoon of said day; when the votes shall be counted and the result declared by the moderator in open meeting.

On such ballot, if the number to be elected for any office is an even number, each elector may vote for one-half of the number; if the number is an odd number each elector may vote for a majority of the number, and the persons not to exceed the numbers herein designated who shall receive the highest number of votes for each office shall be declared elected, and, in case of a tie, the one whose name stands first or highest on the greatest number of ballots shall be elected.

SEC. 2. At all electors' meetings hereafter held in the town of Glastonbury, for the reception of ballots for state officers, presidential

electors, and members of the General Assembly, the polls shall be open at six (6) o'clock in the forenoon, and closed at five (5) o'clock in the afternoon.

SEC. 3. The annual town meeting held on the first (1st) Monday of October in each year shall be adjourned after the declaration of the result of the ballot to Saturday, at two (2) o'clock, next following.

SEC. 4. At such annual town meeting it shall be the duty of the Selectmen and Auditors of the preceding year to make and present a classified report in detail of the expenditures of the town so far as orders have been given therefor, for the year preceding up to September first (1st), together with an estimate of the town expenses for the ensuing year; and also an estimate of town property, and a recommendation of the amount of taxes required, in their opinion, to be levied to meet said expenditures and other town purposes for the ensuing year.

The Town Treasurer and Treasurer of the Town Deposit, Town and School Funds, and the Town School Committee, shall also make and present their reports for the same time, as hereinbefore provided. All said reports shall be printed and circulated at least five (5) days before said annual meeting, and shall be consolidated one in pamphlet for distribution. All other reports shall be presented and read in open meeting.

And the Directors of the Public Library shall make an annual report to the town, which shall be printed with the other town reports.

SEC. 5. The Selectmen are hereby directed to meet at the record building from two (2) until four (4) o'clock in the afternoon on the first (1st) Saturday of each month for the purpose of examining all bills against the town and drawing orders on the town Treasurer therefor; and the Town Treasurer is hereby directed to be at the town record building from two (2) o'clock until four (4) o'clock in the afternoon of each of said days for the purpose of paying town orders.

CHAPTER II.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.

SECTION 1. A public library is hereby established, which shall, under the proper regulations to be adopted by the Directors, be free to all the inhabitants of the town.

SEC. 2. The number of the Directors of the public library shall be six (6), two (2) to be elected each year to hold office for three (3) years.

SEC. 3. The amount which shall be annually expended by the town for the maintenance and increase of the public library shall be \$200, to be paid by the Town Treasurer upon the order of the Directors of the public library.

SEC. 4. The Directors are authorized to provide a suitable room or rooms for the public library.

SEC. 5. Vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be filled by the Selectmen until the next annual town meeting.

CHAPTER III.

AMENDMENTS.

Any amendment or change in the foregoing rules and regulations may be made at any town meeting, on notice having been given thereof in the swarning for such meeting.

FURTHER ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING.

REPORT OF THE TOWN SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Town School Committee herewith presents its second report of the management of schools by the Town:

The Committee feels that the schools are improving; that the unity of management and oversight is bringing about better conditions — and is bound to do so more and more.

Many possible improvements have been discussed. Without question there is room for improvement, and the Committee hopes to meet the expectations of the Town in this matter.

The expense of the schools has not been large. In fact, while Glastonbury stands among the 168 towns of the state, 43rd in point of population, and 51st in the amount of the grand list, its rank in cost per scholar in average attendance is 150.

For each child enumerated, the cost is only \$17.42, with an average throughout the State of \$19.15. The actual net cost to the Town, however, is only \$14.04

The teachers have in the main done good work; but it is getting more and more difficult to secure as good teachers as we ought to have without paying higher salaries.

The Committee has voted unanimously in favor of the principle of doing away as soon as may be with one room schools, and the Town will be asked this fall to vote upon a plan to make a beginning along this line.

Plans have been made for this coming year to have more attention given to music and penmanship in all the schools, of which we feel sure the Town will approve.

We refer to the reports of the Secretaries and Superintendents, herewith respectfully submitted for the details of management.

Town School Committee.

Town School Committee, Glastonbury, Conn.

Gentlemen. — The report of the general conditions in the schools of Glastonbury for the year 1910-1911 would not differ in any marked degree from the report given last year. It will save considerable space simply to refer to the earlier report. Schools have been conducted in eighteen different

buildings. A brief report of each district will be found later in this report; also a table of statistics showing attendance in each room and other items of importance.

Any person who is interested to know how the town of Glastonbury compares with other towns in the State of Connecticut will find considerable information in the Report of the State Board of Education. There are 168 towns in the State of Connecticut; below is given the rank which Glastonbury holds:

The intelligent reader may draw his own conclusions from these statistics. Are the children of the town of Glastonbury less valuable than the children of other towns?

REPORT OF SCHOOLS BY DISTRICTS.

In the 1st district Miss Bessie Kingsbury had charge of the 5th, 6th, and 7th grades. Considerable improvement was manifest, particularly in conduct.

Miss Myrtle Ruoff continued her work in the 3rd and 4th grades and the results were uniformly good.

Very efficient work was done by Miss Sarah Kopelman in the 1st and 2nd grades; enthusiasm and interest are marked characteristics of her teaching.

A desire for more sanitary conditions was manifested spasmodically throughout the building.

Mrs. Allena Samson returned to take charge of the 6th and 7th grades of the 2nd district with continued good results.

The 4th and 5th grades were taught by Miss Nellie Edmond; This room showed a marked improvement.

Miss Anna Clark took up the work in the 2nd and 3rd grades in a most satisfactory manner.

The beginners showed good progress under Miss Kidney in the 1st grade.

Miss Mary Mullen continued to maintain the good standard of work in the 4th, 5th, 6th, and 7th grades of the 3rd district. The lower grades of this district did efficient work under Miss Caryl Porter up to the end of the winter term when she resigned to accept a better position. We were very fortunate in securing the services of Miss Mary Gleason, an experienced and capable teacher to fill this vacancy.

Miss Ruth Randall's school in the 4th district was well conducted; her work was entirely satisfactory.

Both rooms of the 5th district showed marked progress. Miss Mary Dougherty in the 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th grades continued to develop the attitude of enthusiasm combined with careful work. Miss Maragret Hayes has brought about a better organization and government than has previously existed there.

In the 6th district uniformly excellent instruction was continued under Miss Imogene Bacon in the upper grades and Mrs. Robert Grant, Jr., in the lower grades.

Miss Bessie Dickinson conducted a creditable school in the 7th district.

Miss Annetta Lonergan proved herself an unusually successful teacher by her work in the 8th district. The percentage in this school was considerably above that of any other school in Town.

Miss Buenna Barrett returned to the higher grades of district No. 9, and Miss Della Flynn to the lower grades. A good spirit of interest was manifest throughout the school.

Miss Christine Kelsey's teaching in the 10th district was conscientious and intelligent.

The work of the pupils under Miss Sarah Plumb in the 11th district showed a growing alertness and keenness.

The 12th district progressed satisfactorily under Miss Ethel Johnson. A new large bell was put into the building.

The numbers in the 13th district were again small but the teacher, Miss Mary Treat accomplished her usual thorough results.

Miss Laurie Bevan developed commendable conditions in the 14th district.

Miss Gertrude Holden in the 15th district aroused considerable interest for a school of such small numbers.

Miss Mildred Barron began work in the 16th district but the location was not at all congenial to her and she resigned early in the year. Miss Emilia Ruther filled the vacancy and brought about a better organization.

Under Miss Annie Page's capable management the higher grades of the 17th district progressed rapidly. Miss Lena Collis was well fitted for the work among the younger pupils of the same school.

Miss Alice Dowling accomplished excellent results in the 18th district.

The Superintendent and teachers have striven throughout the year for more co-operation. Spelling contests were held by grades at the High School building in which the districts near the car lines participated and considerable

enthusiasm was shown. For those pupils farther away the Rev. S. E. Dunham began a system to teach school singing of two-part songs. In May pupils from districts 11, 13, 14, and 16 met at Buckingham church for a union school exhibition. A growing interest and commendable effort were shown by both teachers and scholars. And yet one cannot visit these schools and work among the outlying districts without observing the deplorable provincialism and the resulting lack of a broad, stimulating interest.

The co-operation of the teachers has been marked. Almost every criticism has been met in an entirely professional spirit for progress. I wish to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the School Committee, teachers, pupils, and parents, for every assistance which has been given.

MEETINGS OF COMMITTEE.

First meeting of the Committee held August 18, 1910, at which there were present Messrs. S. H. Williams, L. W. Howe and F. R. Curtis, owing to the small attendance of members little business was transacted. A general discussion in relation to the schools was had, following which, on motion of Mr. Howe it was

Voted, That each member of the Committee should in due season, look after their respective school buildings and see that they are cleaned and made ready for opening of Fall Term of School, and also make the necessary arrangements for caring for their school buildings, during the ensuing school year.

SECOND MEETING, SEPTEMBER 2.

At the meeting of the Committee held this afternoon, There were present Messrs. S. H. Williams, W. A. Hills, J. P. Cornish, F. R. Curtis and L. W. Howe.

The regular monthly meeting, being also the Annual Meeting for election of officers, was held in P. M. All members present, viz.: Messrs. S. H. Williams, L. W. Howe, J. P. Cornish, F. R. Curtis, W. A. Hills and E. E. Thompson. Election of officers followed.

FIFTH MEETING, JANUARY 26, 1911.

Voted, That all certificates of age for sake of employment, where pupils have reached the age of 14 years, shall be issued from the Secretary's office on approval of the Superintendent of Schools. Such pupils must have finished at least the fifth grade of the Town schools, so as to meet the requirements of Chapter 123; Public Acts of 1909.

Voted, That the Committee ask of the Selectmen that a special Town Meeting be called to consider sites, and plans for a new school building at or somewhere in South Glastonbury, for the purpose of consolidating certain districts in that locality.

Voted, That Mr. Williams be given authority to have the schoolhouse in 3rd District painted.

Voted, That the bill of H. Roser for painting the flag pole, in the 3rd District, be paid.

TOWN HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT.

In making this report, I shall try to follow the suggestions received from the State Board of Health. The following contagious and infectious diseases have been reported to this office, from September 1, 1910, to August 30, 1911:

Measles, five; diphtheria, thirteen, one fatal; typhoid fever, two, one case reported last year proved fatal during this time; whooping cough, eight (probably there were many more cases as but a small proportion are usually reported); scarlet fever, thirty-seven, probably there were more. As for the most part the epidemic, though very extensive, was of a very mild type. The necessity of such a long period of quarantine makes scarlet fever greatly to be dreaded and accounts in part, no doubt, for the failure of many cases of a mild nature to be reported. Only three cases of tuberculosis were reported.

There were complaints of eight nuisances, mostly in reference to closets and offensive sink drains and were usually remedied quickly. I have also inspected the public water supplies and ice ponds from which ice is sold.

Samples of milk have been collected and sent to the State Laboratory at Middletown for examination, four times during the year. For the most part the milk offered for sale in Town is of excellent quality.

During the last days of August and the first two of September, I examined each of the schoolhouses in Town and the surroundings. At that time only about one-half of the rooms and one-third of the closets had been cleaned.

There have been placed in the library 329 new volumes, including 18 books given by Rev. John W. McCombe, and the annual grant of books to the value of \$100.00 received from the State Library Committee. More books than usual were purchased as advantage was taken of the sale of a private library to obtain many books of special use in the schools, at an average price of 30c. per volume.

The new books added were divided among the following classes: Arts, useful and fine, 20; Biography, 39; Educational 18; Fiction, 99; History, 22; Juvenile, 18; Literature, 62; Religion, 18; Natural Science, 18; Travel, 14; Reference, 1. The total number of volumes in the library is 3,446.
