Andrews, or to the top of the hill around the bend in the road, at an expense not to exceed \$7,000.00 and

Voted, That the Selectmen be instructed to begin work at once and finish same this fall.

Voted, That a tax of 18 mills be laid on list of 1916 (to be completed), same to be due and payable April 1, 1917.

Voted, That the Selectmen be authorized to survey and establish street lines on both sides of Spring Street from Main Street east to House Street.

Voted, That the Selectmen be instructed to open and lay out a three rod road from the Hillstown road and what is known as the Great Swamp Road, along the present road to the west line of Sabastian Willner's property and grade what is known as Stony Hill to a grade that will allow an easy passage for teams passing over it, also to widen the present road to a sufficient width for teams to pass, *provided*, the adjoining proprietors deed to the Town the land taken for the purpose of laying out said road.

PUBLIC LIBRARY

July 1916 — July 1917.

The main library located in the Covell block on Hebron Avenue has been open for the distribution of books on Tuesday and Friday afternoons, from three to five o'clock, for eleven months, being closed one month, Aug. 29th to Sept. 22, 1916, on account of Infantile Paralysis; it has also been open on Tuesday and Friday evenings, from seven to nine o'clock, except during the summer, July to October, and during that time, it has been opened one evening a month to accommodate those who could not come in the afternoon, such persons having the privilege of drawing eight books and returning them in a month.

The four branch libraries maintained are in the church at Buckingham, in care of James G. Bosworth; in the church at East Glastonbury, in care of H. R. Brooks; in the reading room at Hopewell; and in the house of Mrs. Loren Curtis in South Glastonbury, in care of Mrs. Curtis. This year 679 persons, representing 377 families, have taken books, 373 being adult, 306 children.

Eight thousand one hundred and eighty-three volumes have been circulated during the year. The following table shows the number of books on each subject drawn from the main library and its branches:

There has been added to the Library 463 new books, of which 308 were purchased with the town funds and 155 given, 51 by seven of the townspeople, and 104 by the State of Connecticut.

The new books are divided among the following classes: Philosophy 4; Religion, 2; Education and Sociology, 13; Science, 7; Useful Arts, 32; Fine Arts, 4; Literature, 18; Travel, 6; Biography, 16; History, 44; Juvenile, 95; Juvenile Fiction, 106; Adult Fiction, 116.

One hundred and fifteen books have been rebound; 18 volumes have been withdrawn from circulation, 10 being worn out, and 8 lost, making the total number of books in the library 5,374.

The Directors have rented for the coming year the room adjoining the library, the use of which, together with the addition of a few shelves in the library proper, has relieved the congestion in that room.

A beginning has been made of furnishing supplementary reading for schools by sending cases containing from 20 to 25 books to Addison, Buckingham, East Glastonbury and Hopewell. These schools were chosen for two reasons; to divide the books as evenly as possible through the different sections of the town, and to place them in school houses of two rooms that as many pupils as possible might have access to them.

REPORT OF THE TOWN SCHOOL COMMITTEE

We herewith present to the Town our Eighth Report on the condition and expenses of the schools during the year 1916-17.

The expenses the past year are something less than for the previous year. The total amount of the 673 orders drawn is \$32,147.88, against \$35,705.01 of one year ago, the difference being in the cost of erecting the new school house at Buckingham, in last year's report. Thus the running expenses of the past year have not materially varied from that of the past three years.

The loss by fire, of the school building in the 18th District was a serious loss, coming as it did at the beginning of the fall term of school. To build a new building at the time, with material and labor so excessively high, and the time needed to erect anew and make ready for use another building, seemed out of the question. Fortunately, President Samuel H. Williams, placed at its disposal the use of his former residence, and located next west of the burned building site, for the use of that district's schools, and which has been very acceptable, and the new year starts with making use of the same building. There seems to be a divided opinion as to where to locate a new building, should it be thought best to build in the near future.

The need of a new school building in the 6th District and consolidating the surrounding districts thereby into one modern and convenient building, is fast becoming necessary, and but for the present high prices for material and labor, the idea possibly might have been carried out this year.

The 7th District is also in need of more room in which to carry on its school work.

The four rooms in the 2nd District start the new year — fall term — overcrowded. In the first grade room where there are seats for 40, there are 50 pupils, and the other three rooms have no vacant seats in either of them, with more pupils expected.

The First District has in its three rooms all that can be seated, and more pupils are expected.

The Fifth District has in attendance all that can be seated. Therefore in the erection of new buildings ample provision must be made for future needs.

The High School starts the new year with three new instructors. Principal Russell F. Lund comes well recommended, and he also in addition to his position as Principal will be in full charge of the Agricultural Department. Mr. Thomas H. Ford, Vice-Principal, comes also well recommended, as also Miss Ruth M. Welles.

While in many of the District Schools new teachers have been engaged, and with Mr. Francis S. Knox as Superintendent of Schools, your Committee hopes and believes that good results will be recorded from the work of the reorganized corps of instructors of the schools during the ensuing year.

The various reports and expense accounts for the past year follow, to which due reference is hereby made.

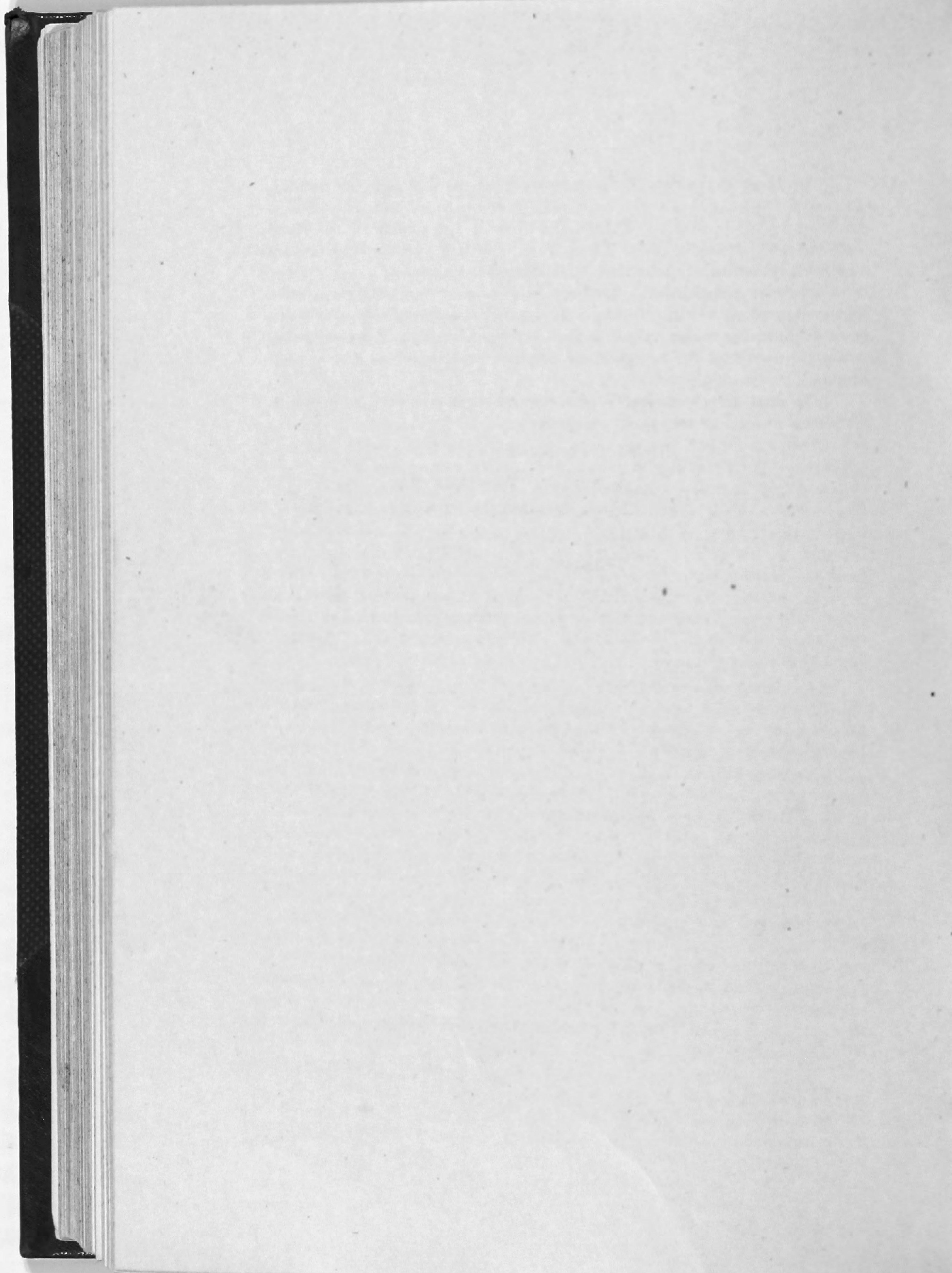

SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT 1916-17.

To the Town School Committee,

Gentlemen:

During the school year 1916-17 it was necessary for various reasons to accept the resignation of seven teachers and engage new ones to fill the positions. That is to say one quarter of the grade teachers were changed. In some cases this resulted in a decided loss. Many of the teachers proved their loyalty to their work and their sense of moral obligation by refusing to accept other positions during the school year. The best work in our schools can only be accomplished by securing and retaining excellent teachers. With the gradually increasing salary scale, which is now the policy of your Committee, it should be possible to improve along this line. In connection with the problem of retaining the most efficient teachers one of the most difficult elements is the solution of home accommodations, especially in the rural districts. This is not a condition peculiar to Glastonbury, for it is much the same throughout the rural sections of the United States. But each town must solve the problem for itself under existing conditions, and must be very seriously considered in the town of Glastonbury. It is impossible to have excellent schools without the best teachers. In most cases the progressive teachers will seek the situation with congenial and comfortable environment.

The percentage of attendance during the year for the town was approximately 87%. This is somewhat better than we have done many years and the record in the different districts is more uniform, District No. 9 being the highest with a record of 94% and District No. 12 lowest with a record of 82%. Thirteen children out of each hundred absent from school every day! Roughly speaking that means that 130 children in the town of Glastonbury are for legal reasons unable to attend the public school session. There have been during the year some epidemics of various maladies but the percentage of attendance might have been considerably higher if every child had been in school every day when he was able. Obviously at least part of the burden rests on the home. The waste by non-attendance is realized only on a small scale to estimate the current expense per child at ten cents per day, making the waste of \$91.00 per week for the 130 children absent. At a \$12 salary this \$91.00 represents the cost of more than seven teachers. Of course in this very incomplete statement we have made no mention of the future loss to the child and various other sources of leakage.

The need of a more detailed course of study for the grades had been apparent for some time. In September, 1916, we began to revise "Plans for Progress" prepared by the Connecticut State Board of Education. Our work was not abreast of the standards required by

this course of study. An attempt was made during the year to cover the work of Standard I with our First Grade. In most of the schools fairly successful performances was accomplished except in Arithmetic. The requirements in this subject are too difficult for children in our first grade. In all the other grades we covered the work of one standard below each grade and planned to accomplish at least half of the work of the regular standard. For example, Grade II did all the work of Standard I and half of Standard II, Grade III all of Standard II and half of Standard III, etc. This program was quite successfully followed in most of the schools. Teachers in the one room buildings found considerable difficulty especially with the Arithmetic. The same difficulty has been reported from other towns. So it is fair to assume that our failure was not altogether the fault of the teachers. In general the advantage of the more specific course of study was marked. When the necessary revisions has been accomplished it will unify the work of the schools and be a source of satisfaction to all the teachers.

Several changes in grouping of one-room schools were made with the opening of our schools in September, 1916. District No. 10 was closed and by utilizing the Masonic Hall for grades one and two a three room grouping was made in District No. 6. The old building of District No. 6 was used for grades three and four in one room and grades five, six and seven in the other. The results undoubtedly justified the action of the Committee in making this change. This group had an attendance of 91% for the year. The smaller children were in a well-lighted, cheerful room. They had good blackboard accommodations, a piano and many advantages which they would not have had at the old building. There was less crowded condition in the old building. The present arrangement however cannot be satisfactory indefinitely and plans should be made for the future at as early a date as possible.

By the building of the new school house at Buckingham, Districts No. 11, 13, 14, 15 and 16 were closed. The percentage of attendance for this new school was 83%. A much higher percentage of attendance than has been attained at times in many of the schools closed. The children have a well-ventilated, well-equipped school. The advantages over the conditions which prevailed in the old buildings are very obvious.

I wish in this, my last report as Superintendent of Schools to express my appreciation of the many courtesies extended to me during my work in Glastonbury, by parents, pupils and school officials.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY
MEETINGS OF THE COMMITTEE

First Meeting, October 12, 1916.

At a meeting of the Town School Committee held this P. M., all members were present, namely: Messrs. Samuel H. Williams, Frederick R. Curtis, John W. Purtill, Louis W. Howe, James P. Cornish and William A. Hills, also Superintendent Leon A. Martin and N. Searle Light, Agent of State Board of Education.

The election of officers for the ensuing year taken up.

On motion, the Secretary cast one ballot for Samuel H. Williams for President; for Secretary, Frederick R. Curtis was nominated and declared elected. The President subsequently made the following assignments of members:

Districts 1 and 11 — James P. Cornish.

Districts 2 and 5 — Fred R. Curtis.

Districts 3-4 and 18 — Samuel H. Williams.

Districts 6-7-8 and 10 — Louis W. Howe.

Districts 9-12 and 17 — John W. Purtill.

Districts 13-14-15 and 16 — William A. Hills.

On motion the matter of enumeration be left with the Secretary to perfect and tabulate. So voted.

By request it was

Voted, That the Principal of the High School be given leave to attend meeting of the Y. M. C. A. at New York.

Upon request, as given by Supt. Martin, it was

Voted, That at the next meeting of the Committee, Principal Fontaine be invited to present his ideas about the conduct of the High School.

Following some discussion it was

Voted, That the matter of consolidating the 3rd and 18th School Districts, when a new building is erected, be laid on the table.

Mr. N. S. Light attempted to explain about his so-called "Survey of Glastonbury," creating thereby considerable criticism by the members.

SECOND MEETING

October 31st.

All members present, also Supt. Martin.

On motion it was

Voted, That a public hearing be given at the Town Hall on Saturday, Nov. 11th, at 2 P. M., in conjunction with the Special Committee, appointed at Town Meeting held Oct. 7th, and that the residents of the 3rd and 18th School Districts be specially invited to attend said hearing, for the purpose of ascertaining if a new school house should be built on the old site in the 18th District, or if the 3rd and 18th Districts should be consolidated and the building erected on some other site.

A letter received from Charles P. Carter was read by Mr. Williams, relative to the Town paying for tuition of his son at Hartford High School.

On motion by Mr. Purtill it was

Voted, That the Secretary of the School Committee inform Mr. C. P. Carter that the College Preparatory Course is still being taught at the Glastonbury High School and as Glastonbury still provides a College Preparatory Course it does not seem proper to pay for tuition in the Hartford High School.

Principal Fontaine of the High School, on invitation, made a lengthy address upon his ideas of needs, etc., at the High School.

The work of compiling and tabulating the enumeration lists as completed by the Secretary makes the following showing:

Whole number of persons enumerated between the ages of 4 and 16, is 1,227. Number attending school, 994. Number not attending school, 233, of which number 100 were under 5 years of age, and 66 between 14 and 16 years of age.

THIRD MEETING

February 26, 1917

At the meeting held this afternoon only three members were present, namely: Williams, Howe and Curtis.

On motion of Mr. Howe it was

Voted, That President Williams be authorized to secure the services of an expert advisor, relative to getting up a proper Course of Study for use in the High School.

Upon explanation by Mr. Williams, who offered the following it was

Voted, That the Principal of the High School be instructed to purchase, supplies, if needed, and have charge of incidental expenses to an amount not to exceed \$100, for the balance of school year, this amount to include any bills he may now have unpaid, as well as the usual \$10.00 per month voted by the Committee on June 22, 1916.

Upon report that the Superintendent had, without authority, placed a new teacher as assistant in the 8th grade, at the High School on motion of Mr. Howe it was

Voted, That the High School Committee be authorized to engage an assistant teacher for as much of the time, during the balance of the year as they may deem necessary.

FOURTH MEETING

March 29, 1917

At the meeting this P. M., all members were present, but Mr. Purtill.

The meeting was devoted to various subjects in the interest of the schools.

Principal Fontaine being present was asked many questions relative to the High School, especially in regard to young ladies of the Senior Class, taking positions before graduation and which was allowed without the knowledge and consent of the Committee, other ideas being carried out were more or less open to criticism by members.

FIFTH MEETING

April 25, 1917

At the meeting this P. M., all members were present but Mr. Hills.

Superintendent Martin was present, and gave his report of recommendations for re-election of teachers for the District Schools for the ensuing year, 1917-18, and also made report on several matters pertaining to the schools.

It was

Voted, That Secretary Curtis and Supt. Martin purchase maps, globes, etc., to a limit of \$210, the understanding being, as made by Supt. Martin, that the State Board of Education would pay back to the Town one-half this amount, viz: \$105.

On motion of Mr. Purtill it was

Voted, That Twelve (12) Dollars per week be the minimum price to be paid teachers in the District schools hereafter.

Voted, That the teachers in the District schools, as recommended by Supt. Martin, be given a re-election at prices named by him as salaries.

SIXTH MEETING

May 8, 1917

At the meeting held this evening, all members but Mr. Hills were present. It was

Voted, That the Supt. and Principal of the High School be authorized to excuse pupils of the High School for one-half day at a time, for farm work if in their judgment best.

Voted, That the Superintendent be instructed to confer with the Librarian of the Public Library to the end that pupils attending the schools in Town may secure reference or other books as needed, to assist them in their work.

Voted, That Messrs. Williams, Purtill, Howe and Hills, have entire charge of the work of grading the grounds around the new school house in Buckingham, (16th District).

SEVENTH MEETING

May 23, 1917

At the meeting held this evening all members were present save Mr. Hills.

The resignation of Supt. Leon A. Martin was received.

A set of Rules and Regulations, concerning the duties of the Superintendent were offered by Mr. Williams, and were adopted. Also regulations as to the duties of Principal of High School, were adopted.

A ballot was ordered, by President Williams, for the position of Superintendent of Schools, under the new regulations, for the ensuing year and Leon A. Martin elected, and if he accepts the position the salary to be \$1,800.

The resignation of Berkley M. Fontaine, as principal of the High School, to be effective May 25th, was by a unanimous vote accepted.

And it was

Voted, That Supt. Martin and Hazel H. Chapin, the Vice-Principal, be given full charge of the High School for the balance of the term, or close of school year, and that each be paid \$50 extra for their services.

Voted, That all teachers be paid for the three days namely: September 21, 22 and 23, 1916, when they were called by the Superintendent prior to the beginning of the Fall term.

The resignation of William A. Morgan, the instructor in charge of the Agricultural Department at the High School was received, and accepted, to take effect at the end of school year.

Voted, That the Superintendent be authorized to engage certain teachers in the District Schools at an increase of salary, if, he deems same advisable..

EIGHTH MEETING

June 1, 1917

At this meeting of the Committee held this evening all members were present save Mr. Hills.

The resignation of Hazel H. Chapin received and accepted, to take effect at close of school year.

A list of the graduates of the High School as recommended by Supt. Martin received and approved by the following

Voted, That the Committee approve the list of names as presented by Mr. Martin for graduation . The following is the list:

NINTH MEETING

June 21, 1917

At the meeting held this afternoon, the following members were present: Messrs. Purtill, Howe and Curtis.

Mr. Purtill, *Chairman*

Voted, That a sum not to exceed \$20.00 be appropriated for use towards the expenses of graduation at High School.

A ballot was taken for Superintendent of Schools, resulting in the choice of

Charles R. Sumpf for that position, and it was

Voted, That President Williams be authorized to make an offer of \$1,700 salary to Charles R. Sumpf for the position of Superintendent of Schools for the ensuing school year, which sum to include all transportation charges.

TENTH MEETING

June 30, 1917

At the meeting held this evening, there were present Messrs. Williams, Cornish, Howe and Curtis.

Mr. Williams read a letter received from Charles R. Sumpf, in which he declined, on account of ill health, the offer and position of Superintendent of Schools as recently tendered him.

A ballot was taken for Superintendent, resulting in the choice of Francis S. Knox of Greenwich, Conn.

On motion of Mr. Howe it was

Voted, That we offer Mr. Francis S. Knox the position of Superintendent of Schools for the ensuing school year at a salary of \$1,800, which sum includes transportation charges.

ELEVENTH MEETING

August 16, 1917

At the meeting this evening of the Committee all members were present, except J. P. Cornish. Supt. F. S. Knox having accepted the position was also present.

On motion of Mr. Howe it was

Voted, That an invitation be sent to Russell F. Lund to appear before the Committee at a meeting to be held on Friday evening, August 17th, relative to his candidacy for the position of Agricultural Teacher at the High School.

On motion of Mr. Purtil it was

Voted, That the matter of engaging the two teachers needed at the High School be referred to Supt. Knox, and

Voted, That the salaries of said two teachers not to exceed \$1,900.

On motion of Mr. Howe it was

Voted, That the schools of the Town open for Fall Term on Monday Sept. 10th and the calendar as made up by Supt. Knox relative thereto be adopted.

On motion of Mr. Purtil it was

Voted, That the Course of Study for High School as recommended by Supt. Knox be deferred until a Principal of the High School is elected.

On motion of Mr. Howe it was

Voted, That the teaching of the Ninth Grade at the High School be eliminated.

TWELFTH MEETING

August 17, 1917

At the adjourned meeting of the Committee held this evening there was present Messrs. Williams, Purtil, Howe and Curtis, also Supt. Knox and Mr. Russell F. Lund.

On motion of Mr. Howe it was

Voted, That Mr. Lund be engaged as Principal and Instructor of the Agricultural Course at the High School at a salary not to exceed \$1,500.

Voted, That we take up the matter of adopting the Elson First Reader at the next meeting.

THIRTEENTH MEETING

September 6, 1917

The following members attended the funeral of one of our members, James P. Cornish, held at St. James Church, this afternoon, namely: Messrs. Samuel H. Williams, Frederick R. Curtis, Louis W. Howe and William A. Hills.

Immediately following the services, said members, convened at the Record Building, and held its 13th meeting.

On motion of Mr. Howe it was

Voted, That the Superintendent be authorized to purchase a sufficient number of the Elson First Reader and Manual as may be needed.

On motion of Mr. Howe it was

Voted, That we apply for our pro rata allowance for Teaching of Agriculture under the Smith-Kewes Bill; and that the Secretary of this Board file the necessary papers with the State Board of Education.

Owing to the absence from the meeting of the Superintendent, on motion of Mr. Howe it was

Voted, That Supt. Knox and Principal Lund of the High School, prepare a four-year course of study for use in the High School, and submit same to next meeting of the Committee for its approval.

The following preamble and resolution offered by Mr. Williams was passed.

Whereas, James P. Cornish, one of the members of the Town School Committee has been removed from our midst by death, therefore be it,

Resolved, That the Committee hereby expresses, most sincerely, its sorrow for his death. Mr. Cornish had been identified with the schools of the Town for many years and had served in various capacities. Few men have shown as much interest as he in school matters.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to Mrs. Cornish and the same spread upon the records of the Committee.
