VOTED, That the Treasurer's Report, also Treasurer of the Town Deposit and School Funds be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the Town Clerk's Report be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the Report of the Library Directors be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the Report of the Town School Committee be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the Report of the Auditors be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the sum of \$80 be appropriated for Memorial Day.

VOTED, That the sum of \$200 be appropriated for use of the Green Park Association, upon the Green Park.

VOTED, That the Treasurer be authorized to borrow on the faith and credit of the Town a sum not to exceed \$40,000 to be used in paying the running expenses of the Town.

VOTED, That the Selectmen be authorized to fully repair Naubuc Avenue, above the Iron Bridge to Town Line.

VOTED, That the Selectmen be authorized to stone Wells Street from Main Street, at Station 34 to Connecticut River.

VOTED, That the Selectmen erect a new fence and make a new driveway at the South Cemetery and the sum of \$100 be appropriated therefor.

VOTED, That the system of making up the Town Report by the Selectmen, as to Highways, that the same be not made up by districts, as formerly, but itemized as Highways.

VOTED, That the Selectmen be authorized to pay the Assessors of year 1909, in full with interest to date, said assessors being Harry B. Rising, Arthur E. Douglas and Wells A. Strickland.

VOTED, That application be made to the State Highway Commissioner as per the following Resolution:

WHEREAS, An Act of the General Assembly approved May 16, 1917, being number 379 of the Special Acts of 1917, provides an appropriation for the construction of State aid roads for the two fiscal years ending September 30, 1919:

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Town of Glastonbury hereby declares its intention to build or improve a section or sections of public road in accordance with and under the provisions of Chapter 264 of the public acts of 1907 and amendments thereof and in conformity with the provisions of said laws the sum of \$20,000 dollars or so much thereof as may be required to pay the amount of the pro rata share of said town of the cost of such construction or improvement under that portion of said appropriation allotted to the town by the Highway Commissioner is hereby appropriated for such purpose, and the Town Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to pay said amount to the State of Connecticut at the terms and in the manner provided by law.

RESOLVED, That the Selectmen are authorized and directed to make application to the Highway Commissioner in the manner provided by law, for the construction or improvement of highways in this town under said laws and appropriations.

VOTED, That this meeting recommend that the Selectmen appropriate a sum not to exceed \$300 to be expended as directed by the Finance Committee of the Glastonbury Council of Defense.

VOTED, That the sum of \$700 be appropriated for use of the Tree Warden for the care of the trees of the highways.

Adjourned to March 2, 1918.

O. Talcott in said meadow and extending south to the river. Provided said Company shall bear one-half the expense, and that the town appropriate \$400 for said purpose.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.

July, 1917 — July, 1918.

The main library, located in the Covell Block on Hebron Avenue, has been open for the distribution of books on Tuesdays and Fridays, from three to five and seven to nine o'clock P. M., except during the summer, when it has been open only one evening a month.

The four branch libraries maintained are in the church at Buckingham, in care of Charles G. Strickland; in the church at East Glastonbury, in care of H. R. Brooks; in the office of the Glazier Manufacturing Co., at Hopewell, in care of Miss Ruth Covell; and in the house of Mrs. Loren Curtis in South Glastonbury, in care of Mrs. Curtis.

686 persons have taken books, representing 391 families. Of these, 414 are adults; 272 children. 10,276 volumes have been circulated during the year. The following table shows the number of books in each subject drawn from the main library and its branches.

386 new books have been added to the library, 291 of which were purchased with the town funds, and 95 given; 91 by the State of Connecticut, and 4 by four of the townspeople. The new books are divided among the following classes: Reference, 1; Philosophy, 3; Religion, 3; Education and Sociology, 15; Science, 7; Useful Arts, 25;

Fine Arts, 5; Literature, 25; Travel, 6; Biography, 6; History, 23; Juvenile, 74; Fiction, 99; Juvenile Fiction, 94.

19 volumes have been withdrawn from circulation, 10 being worn out, and 9 lost, making the total number of volumes in the library 5,741.

130 books designed for supplementary reading have been sent to 4 schools: Addison, Buckingham, East Glastonbury and Hopewell.

The library has taken some part in war work. During the campaign last fall, the Directors and their helpers collected \$332.05 towards the establishment of war libraries, thus exceeding the quota for this town, which was \$250.00; 125 books given by the townspeople have been sent to camps in this country or to France; about a hundred posters teaching food conservation have been exhibited at the library; and pamphlets containing patriotic addresses or recipes for food substitutes which have been sent by the United States Food Administration or the State Council of Defense have been loaned as books.

The library has lost two faithful workers within the last two years in the resignation of Mr. Hugh Gray, who had been in charge of the Hopewell branch since its establishment in 1896 and in the death, last spring, of Mr. James Bosworth, who, like Mr. Gray, had been interested in the library from its beginning and had been in charge of the Buckingham branch since 1905, resigning in July, 1917, on account of ill health.

The first bequest to the library has been received this year through the public spirit and generosity of Mrs. Mercy Barber, who bequeathed to the library \$2,000.00, the income derived from the sum to be used for the purchase of books. This gift has been invested in two \$1,000.00 Liberty Bonds.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER.

During the past year the health of the town has been in the main, very satisfactory. In common with a great part of the State there was an epidemic of measles and whooping cough, under conditions that prevailed during the prevalence of these diseases it seemed impossible to control them even in a measure. Many do not call a physician for these patients until the contagious period is well advanced, for various reasons, partly because they wish to avoid the resulting quarantine with the financial loss to themselves, whereas the loss to the community may be many times as great as their own would have been.

The new Sanitary Code which the State Department of Health has adopted requires the reporting of many more diseases than formerly. It is only by the active cooperation of the physicians and their patients that these regulations can be carried out. Few people realize that they are obliged by law to report any contagious disease that may occur in their household if no physician is in attendance. I want to say in this connection, that the Health Officer appreciates the cooperation of the Superintendent and teachers of our schools. Much can be done to improve the school attendance by early reporting of children absent on account of sickness.

A move has been made towards draining our meadows, an improvement I have advocated for many years. Our school houses with but one or two exceptions are in excellent sanitary condition, for which much credit should be given to our very efficient school Superintendent.

The public water and ice supply is excellent. The main water sheds being carefully looked after.

The child's welfare work undertaken during August, by the ladies of the town, assisted by the resident doctors and nurses, seemed by many, uncalled for in such a community as ours but if one life was saved or one disability corrected by the examinations, our efforts would be fully compensated.

But few complaints have been made. All have been investigated and corrected where worthy of attention.

The public milk supply is regularly looked after. Samples are taken for examination whenever necessary. Under the law passed by the last legislature, any owner of a cow who sells any of the milk or other products, is obliged to register with the Dairy and Food commissioner at the Capitol. This is not generally known.

REPORT OF THE TOWN SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Herewith is presented the report of the Town School Committee, for the year 1917-1918, the ninth annual report.

The rapidly increasing cost of living made it necessary in the middle of the year to increase the salaries of all the teachers in the grade schools. The expenses therefore for the year are greater than heretofore.

It has been also increasingly difficult to secure competent teachers at the salaries we have been paying. We must therefore face the facts that the cost of running our schools will be higher.

In the spring the Committee decided that the transportation problem could easily be solved by means of automobiles, so a motor omnibus was purchased, which has taken the place of two of the horse drawn vehicles, running from the eastern edge of the town to the Buckingham School and from East Glastonbury to the High School. It seemed to give general satisfaction during the few weeks of the spring term when it was used.

The problem of adequate room for all the pupils in town has not yet been solved. The congestion in the northern part of the town will be relieved temporarily by the use of the lower room in the Masonic Building for the lower grades of Schools No. 1 and No. 2. In the near future however it will be necessary to have more buildings both at the north and south ends of the town.

It will probably be necessary also to provide houses for the teachers. A boarding house should be arranged for by renting or purchasing or building a house.

Reference has been made repeatedly to the need for a new High School building. The present building is very apparently inadequate. For the details of expenses and of the management of the schools, we refer to the reports that follow.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

TOWN SCHOOL COMMITTEE,
Town of Glastonbury.

Gentlemen:

I submit herewith the annual report on the condition of the public schools for the year ending July, 1918.

The work of the schools has progressed steadily, pupils have reached the standards outlined in the course of study, with few exceptions. The chief causes of failure on the part of pupils have been several epidemics of so-called children's diseases, and over-crowded conditions in some schools.

The epidemics have spread generally over all the schools at different periods. It is, possibly, worthy of notice that the School Committee spends nothing for the care and promotion of children's health. Many communities think this is worth while.

The First District school and the Second District school have been badly over-crowded, especially in the primary rooms — just where conditions should be best. It is my opinion that the salary of a teacher is largely wasted when she is asked to teach from 40 to 60 pupils in a room not large enough for over 35.

I would recommend that the Town give its serious and intelligent consideration to the problems of housing pupils in the First and Second as well as the Sixth and Eighteenth Districts. I do not believe that justice is being done the children in any of these schools.

Your consideration of the financial statement will show that, while the gross expenditures have increased considerably over former years, they have not increased in proportion to the general cost of living. If schools are to be maintained at their present state of efficiency, it will be necessary for teachers' salaries to be increased still further. When a woman can find congenial employment for 52 weeks of the year at \$18.00 per week, there is nothing attractive about a teaching position at \$15.00 for 37 weeks of the year.

The cost of one year's education per pupil has been: Elementary, \$27.34, High School, \$54.87. Comparison of these figures with the costs of other towns and cities will show that they are not excessive.

The use of the motor bus for somewhat less than two months in the spring shows that the operating expenses are about \$1.50 per day less than the cost of operating the two horse-drawn busses, which the motor displaces. The kind of service rendered is not to be compared. Of course it is to be expected that it will be necessary to resort to horses for a part of the time in the periods of bad roads, in the winter and spring.

The graduating class at the High School was the largest in its history. Many of these pupils will go to college because the school is accepted by the College Entrance Board and may enter its graduates on certificate. This privilege has been extended for the year 1918-1919.

Your decision to eliminate the teaching of Agriculture will leave two courses open to Glastonbury children, College Preparatory and Commercial. Every effort will be made to make these two as efficient as possible.

Your decision to make the school year 38 weeks instead of 37 will help to put Glastonbury schools on a par with other schools of the state.

FIRST MEETING

November 11, 1917.

An organization was effected by the election of

President Williams made the following assignments of members:

Districts 1 and 11 — Arthur E. Bidwell.
Districts 2 and 5 — Fred R. Curtis.
Districts 3-4 and 18 — Samuel H. Williams.
Districts 6-7-8 and 10 — Louis W. Howe.
Districts 9-12 and 17 — John W. Purtill.
Districts 13-14-15 and 16 — William A. Hills.

On motion the matter of enumeration be left with the Secretary to perfect and tabulate. So voted.

The Secretary reported that insurance on the 15th District School House had been cancelled by the Insurance Company. It was left with the Secretary to endeavor to ascertain if insurance on unoccupied school buildings could not be effected in other insurance companies.

The matter of re-opening the 14th District School, for Winter term, was discussed and action deferred.

Arthur E. Bidwell was elected a member of the Governing Board of the Williams Memorial Building Association.

VOTED, That the Superintendent be instructed to engage another teacher for the High School at a salary not to exceed \$75.00 per month.

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to procure necessary Manuals, etc., for having music taught in the schools of the Town.

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to purchase paper and crayons and such supplies as may be necessary for the Grade and the High Schools.

SECOND MEETING

November 15, 1917.

There were present at the meeting today: Messrs. Williams, Bidwell, Hills and Curtis.

A representative from the Reo Automobile Co., of Hartford, was present and gave a talk and presented figures, relative to auto trucks for transporting school children.

The Secretary reported the result of tabulating and perfecting of the Enumeration Lists.

Whole number of persons enumerated between the ages of 4 and 16 was 1,280. Whole number attending school, 1,081. Number not attending school, 199, of which 98 were under 5 years of age and 67 between 14 and 16 years of age.

THIRD MEETING

November 30, 1917.

At the meeting of the Committee held this afternoon all members were present, also Supt. Knox.

Superintendent Knox presented his report of the schools. A communication from eleven of the Grade Teachers was received, in which an increase in salaries was asked for. And on motion of Mr. Howe, it was

VOTED, That we increase the salaries of all teachers in the Grade Schools, Two Dollars per week beginning with the winter term of school.

On motion of Mr. Howe, after some explanation relative thereto,

VOTED, That we pay Miss Imogene Bacon, four weeks salary during her enforced vacation.

Following discussion, on motion of Mr. Bidwell, "That we re-open the 14th District School for winter term," Bidwell and Curtis voting "yes" and Purtill, Howe and Hills voting "no."

President Williams declared motion lost.

VOTED, That a committee of three be appointed to investigate the matter of providing motor transportation from the 14th District to the Buckingham School and from East Glastonbury to the High School, and report at next meeting.

Committee: Williams, Hills and Supt. Knox.

On motion of Mr. Howe it was

VOTED, That the new school in the 16th District be known hereafter as the Buckingham School.

FOURTH MEETING

February 4, 1918.

At the meeting of the Committee this afternoon, all members were present.

On motion of Mr. Purtill it was

VOTED, That Supt. Knox be instructed to purchase Hydro-plate Blackboards for the 9th District Schools.

It was

VOTED, That all personal property, within the present building used for the High School, and belonging to the Town, be insured to the extent of 80 per cent., and that Supt. Knox and Charles P. Curtis appraise the same and report amount of said appraisal to the *next* meeting of the Board.

On motion of Mr. Purtill, after explanation, it was

VOTED, That Supt. Knox be allowed the sum of \$25.00 for his expenses, if he desires to attend the meeting at Atlantic City, N. J., of the National Educational Association of Superintendents.

On motion of Mr. Howe, it was

VOTED, That the Superintendent be notified to attend all meetings of the Board.

It was

VOTED, That after due consideration, It is the opinion of the Committee that no change should be made in the sessions of school, at the High School.

On motion of Mr. Williams, it was

VOTED, That the Town School Committee *do not* approve of sending out pupils of the Commercial Course of High School to take positions before end of School Year.

VOTED, That the matter of blackboards for the 8th District School House be left with Supt. Knox with power.

FIFTH MEETING

March 22, 1918.

At the meeting this afternoon, all members present but Mr. Purtill.

It was, after some discussion and explanation

VOTED, That the regular Easter vacation of one week be allowed, and that both the High and Grade Schools close the Spring term on June 21.

On motion of Mr. Howe, it was

VOTED, That we take the matter of purchasing a motor car for transporting pupils, from the table.

Williams, Howe and Hills voting "yes."

Bidwell and Curtis voting "no."

Following which on motion of Mr. Howe it was,

VOTED, That Messrs. Williams, Hills and Supt. Knox be authorized to purchase a Motor Bus for the Glastonbury Town School Committee at a total cost, not to exceed twenty-two hundred (\$2,200) dollars.

VOTED, That Supt. Knox be authorized to make application for an Agricultural Teacher, from the State Board of Education, under the Smith-Hewes bill, so-called, and that the Town School Committee will furnish all necessary requirements, if same is granted.

On motion of Mr. Howe, it was

VOTED, That the School Committee advance Two Dollars and a half to five dollars, to the different teachers in Town, if wanted, that they may carry an amount for purchase of Thrift Stamps to sell to pupils, said amount, so loaned, to be returned at close of school year.

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to purchase the necessary form of ledger for keeping the School accounts and such card indexes and cards as may be needed.

SIXTH MEETING

April 30, 1918.

There were present at the meeting of the Committee this afternoon, Messrs. Williams, Bidwell, Howe and Curtis.

Upon the recommendation of the Superintendent, the following motion offered by Mr. Howe, was

VOTED, That the Graded Schools of the Town, in the several districts, be, hereafter, kept 38 weeks in the year.

On motion of Mr. Howe,

VOTED, That the teachers of the Graded Schools, as recommended by the Superintendent, be re-elected for the ensuing year.

On motion of Mr. Curtis,

VOTED, That we discontinue the Agricultural Course at the High School, and that the Superintendent be authorized to fill all vacancies in grade teachers in conference with the various members of the School Committee.

VOTED, That we approve the bill as recommended by the Superintendent for supplies.

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to expend \$210.00 for library books, and to see that the State make payment of one-half, viz.: \$105.00

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to expend a sum not to exceed \$100 for Supplementary Readers for Grade Schools.

A ballot was taken for Superintendent,

Francis S. Knox, received all ballots, and declared elected.

On motion,

VOTED, That the Superintendent be given a salary of \$2,000.00 for ensuing year.

SEVENTH MEETING

June 13, 1918.

At the meeting held this afternoon, all members present but Mr. Hills.

VOTED, That we authorize the Superintendent to procure supplies for "Physics Apparatus" for High School by expending a sum not to exceed \$116.29.

VOTED, That a committee, consisting of Messrs. Williams and Bidwell, be appointed to investigate the matter of a school house for the 18th District and report at next meeting.

EIGHTH MEETING.

July 6, 1918.

At this meeting only three members were present, namely, Williams, Bidwell and Curtis.

Owing to the absence of one-half of the Committee, only the following business was transacted,

VOTED, That at the next meeting we consider, and if thought best, adopt the Elson Readers for all grades above the First.

NINTH MEETING

July 13, 1918.

At this, the last meeting of the Committee, all members but Mr. Purtill, were present.

On motion it was

VOTED, That we adopt the Elson series of Readers for all grades above the 1st Reader, as desired, in exchange for the Readers that have been in use.

On motion of Mr. Howe,

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to make the necessary repairs to the several School Houses at an expense not to exceed one thousand (\$1,000) dollars.

On motion

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to engage the Polish Hall located on Concord Street, for use of the first grade pupils of the 1st and 2nd Districts.

The Superintendent reported that *he* had received the resignation of Thomas H. Ford, as Principal of the High School, reason assigned being that of being drafted.

On motion of Mr. Hills

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to engage a Principal for the High School at a salary not to exceed \$1,800.00.

On motion of Mr. Howe,

VOTED, That the Fall Term of Schools of the Town open on Monday, Sept. 9, 1918.

On motion of Mr. Bidwell,

VOTED, That the rooms, which have been used for the two schools in Mr. Williams' house, in the 18th District, be re-engaged for the ensuing year.

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to arrange for a Garage for the keeping of the new Motor Bus, in the 14th District.

VOTED, That the matter of arranging for the four 8th grade pupils residing in the 12th District, be left with the Superintendent.
