TOWN CLERK'S REPORT.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, OCTOBER 12, 1918.

At the adjourned annual Town Meeting,

Clinton O. Talcott, Chairman,

Warning read by Town Clerk Frederick R. Curtis.

The following business transacted:

VOTED, That the Selectmen's Report be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the Treasurer's Report, also Treasurer of the Town Deposit and School Funds be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the Town Clerk's Report be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the Report of the Library Directors be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the Report of the Town School Committee be accepted and placed on file, also the Secretary and Superintendent's report.

VOTED, That the Report of the Auditors be accepted and placed on file, also the Health Officer's report.

VOTED, That the sum of \$80 be appropriated for Memorial Day.

VOTED, That the sum of \$200 be appropriated for use of the Green Park Association, upon the Green Park.

VOTED, That the Treasurer be authorized to borrow on the faith and credit of the Town a sum not to exceed \$40,000 to be used in paying the running expenses of the Town.

VOTED, That an appropriation of \$1,000.00 be made to the War Bureau, same to be expended under the direction of the Finance Committee of said Bureau.

VOTED, That when this meeting adjourned it be to Saturday, March 1, 1919, at 2 P. M., for the purpose of laying a Tax.

VOTED, That the Selectmen be authorized and instructed to place an electric light near the stairway, south of the bridge over Affleck Brook, so called, and leading towards the Town Hall.

VOTED, That the road leading from the residence of Fred Hoff to the residence of Fred Bogli, in the "Candle Wood Hill" section of the Fifth School District, be ordered closed as a highway.

VOTED, That the highways and bridges of the Town be left with the Selectmen to care for and maintain during the ensuing year.

Upon a motion made by John W. Purtil, that the salary of the Town Clerk be increased from \$300 to \$500 a year, discussion followed by John M. Knox and others favorable thereto, following which it was on motion

VOTED, That a committee of five be appointed, by the Chair, to look into the matter of increasing the salaries, or pay, of the Town Officers and report their recommendations to the adjourned meeting of March 1st. Said committee as appointed being: John W. Purtil, Stancliff Hale, William E. Gates, Arthur E. Bidwell and Arthur B. Goodrich.

MARCH 1, 1919, 2 P. M.

The adjourned annual Town Meeting held at Town Hall this afternoon.

Chairman Clinton O. Talcott called the meeting to order.

The fifth item in the warning,

VIZ.: "To lay a Tax sufficient to pay the running expenses of the Town for the year ensuing and to pay a part of the Town debt,"

Was taken up, and after Selectman William H. Carrier had presented his budget of estimates for the coming year, it was

VOTED, That a Tax of 17 mills on the dollar, be laid on list last completed of October, 1918, said Tax to be due and payable April 1, 1919.

The following recommendation of the committee appointed in October relative to increasing salaries of Town Officers was,

VOTED, That the Auditors receive Ten Dollars for auditing the accounts of the Town.

Acting upon a petition of 31 signers, it was

VOTED, That the matter of repairing or treating 900 feet of road on Tryon Street, with a coating of trap rock and sand, be left with the Selectmen.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING, JULY 25, 1919.

A Special Town Meeting held in compliance to warning.

Lewis W. Ripley, Chairman.

Warning read by Clerk.

The following Resolutions offered by Selectman William H. Carrier was passed.

WHEREAS, An Act of the General Assembly approved May 13, 1919, being Chapter 328 of the Special Acts of 1919, provides an appropriation for the construction of State Aid Roads for the two fiscal years ending June 30, 1921.

Be it

RESOLVED, That the Town of Glastonbury hereby declare its intention to build or improve a section or sections of public road under the provisions of Section 1483 of the General Statutes with its various amendments and in conformity with the provisions of said laws the sum of \$20,000 or so much thereof as may be required to pay the amount of the pro rata share of said Town of the cost of such construction or improvement under the provisions of said appropriation allotted to the Highway Commission is hereby appropriated for such purpose, and the Town Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to pay said amount to the State of Connecticut at the times and in the manner provided by law.

RESOLVED, That the Selectmen are authorized and directed to the Highway Commissioner in the manner provided by law for the construction or improvement of highways in this Town under said laws and application.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING, JUNE 4, 1919.

At a Special Town Meeting held this evening,

Rev. Francis A. Tate, Chairman,

On motion it was,

VOTED, That the Glastonbury Town School Committee be and hereby is authorized to purchase a site for a new school building in South Glastonbury, Connecticut, and that the committee be authorized to erect a four-room school building on said site, suitable to accommodate the school children in that part of the Town, and that they be authorized to erect a two-room school building on the old site on Hubbard Street in the Williams School District, and

VOTED, That the Town Treasurer be and hereby is authorized to borrow a sum, or sums, not to exceed Thirty-six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000), to pay for the site for the school building in South Glastonbury and the erection of a school building thereon, and a school building on the Hubbard Street site.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.
July, 1918 — July, 1919.

The main library, located in the Covell Block on Hebron Avenue, has been open for the distribution of books on Tuesdays and Fridays, from 3 to 5 and 7 to 9 P. M., except during the summer when it was closed evenings. It has also closed for three weeks, 6 library days, by order of the Health Officer, during the influenza epidemic.

The four branch libraries maintained are in the church at Buckingham, in care of Charles G. Strickland; in the church at East Glastonbury, in care of H. R. Brooks; in the office of the Glazier Manufacturing Co., at Hopewell, in care of Fred Pickford; and in the house of Mrs. Loren Curtis in South Glastonbury, in care of Mrs. Curtis.

719 persons have taken books, representing 406 families. Of these, 354 are adults, 365 children. 10,749 volumes have been circulated during the year. The following table shows the number of books on each subject drawn from the main library and its branches.

562 new books have been added to the library, 247 of which were purchased with Town funds, and 315 given, 74 by the state, and 241 by townspeople. The new books are divided among the following classes: Reference, 1; Philosophy, 2; Religion, 29; Education and Sociology, 8; Science, 8; Useful Arts, 13; Fine Arts, 5; Literature, 38; Travel, 15; Biography, 14; History, 41; Juvenile, 77; Juvenile Fiction, 160; Adult Fiction, 151.

17 volumes have been withdrawn from circulation, 10 being worn out and 7 lost, making the total number of volumes in the library 6,363.

229 books, designed for supplementary reading, have been sent to four schools: Addison, Buckingham, East Glastonbury and Hopewell.

The library has received during the year a gift of \$5.00 from the late Edward K. Biddy, and a bequest of \$500 from Mrs. John Markham. The latter has been invested in Liberty Bonds.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER.

Glastonbury in common with all other towns of the state, has suffered from a severe epidemic of influenza which started in September. The first case reported contracted the disease at Camp Devens. The number of cases reported by months were as follows: September, 20; October, 201; November, 28; December, 37; February, 11; March, 97; making a total of 394 cases reported. This number can safely be doubled as only two of the resident physicians reported their cases after the first few days and none of the physicians from neighboring towns reported any. The height of the epidemic was reached during the second week in October, sixty-six cases being reported on October 13th by two physicians.

Eight cases of diphtheria were reported; five of scarlet fever and sixty-four of measles.

Tuberculosis is a reportable disease but for the most part local physicians fail to report their cases and the Health Officer often does not hear of the existence of the disease until reported from the sanitarium to which the patient may have been taken. We believe that much might be done to prevent the spread of this disease by an early report of cases. No publicity is given of any reported case.

As in previous years the sources of the public milk supply have been examined. The milk sold in town is of exceptional purity and cleanliness.

The school houses are so much better looked after under the Town management and the efficient care of the School Superintendent, that I find but little to suggest at my inspections.

I wish to congratulate the citizens of Glastonbury upon the presence in our midst of Miss Marjorie Vail, the visiting nurse. She is ready to give advice to any young mothers or expectant mothers. She hopes to follow up the child welfare work begun last year. She is ready at all reasonable times to visit the sick, and will devote a large part of her time to inspecting the school children. I wish to bespeak for her your hearty cooperation and assistance.

REPORT OF THE TOWN SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

In presenting this the tenth annual report, for the year 1918-1919, ending in July,

We realize that to improve the schools of the Town, we must have better school buildings and larger, and also pay our teachers wages sufficient to secure good ones, to conduct and keep up and improve the standard which is to be desired.

The Special Town Meeting held June 4th, gave the committee authority to build two new school houses and an architect was secured and plans have been perfected and bids are being received, for building the same, and it is hoped that another year we will be better equipped and much better results obtained.

The congestion in many of the districts continues, and the problem of finding room for all the pupils in town is yet unsolved. The Kindergarten School opened in the Masonic Hall of the Second District last year, to relieve the Second District School, is over-crowded this fall term, there being an attendance of 62. The condition of the schools in the Fifth District has necessitated the committee to take steps towards relieving the over-crowded conditions there, to the end, that they have been fortunate in securing the Addison Chapel, which will for the present bring some relief to that section when fitted up and a new teacher installed there.

Other schools are more or less in crowded condition, and more more means will have to be obtained. Notably the Second District school building has all rooms filled.

The need is increasing fast for providing boarding places for the teachers, a boarding-house will soon have to be provided.

Reference is made to the details of the expense of maintaining the schools the past year, which follows.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

Glastonbury, Conn., Sept. 16, 1919.

TOWN SCHOOL COMMITTEE,
Town of Glastonbury.

Gentlemen:

I submit herewith the annual report of the public schools for the school year ending July 14, 1919.

The schools have suffered this past year from repeated epidemics of disease. Three schools have been in session less than 180 days due to the influenza. It has been possible to cover the work outlined in all cases although there has doubtless been loss to pupils.

During the period of the war and until the spring term of 1919, the schools regularly carried on Junior Red Cross work. All children joined the organization. The boys finished wooden splints while the girls knitted face cloths and made ambulance pillows, comfort bags and gun wipes. Thirty minutes per week regularly were given to this work. The interest in this hand work was very marked and suggests the idea that we might do well to make industrial work a part of our regular program. To make this really effective would require the services of a special teacher.

We made an attempt last year to have every teacher give regular instruction in music. In the few schools where the teachers were trained to do this work it was a success but there is need for a special teacher of music.

The financial statement shows a decided increase in the total cost of the schools due largely to the increases in salaries and cost of fuel and supplies.

The item for rent is high but will be cut in half when the new school buildings are opened.

The report on the cost of the motor bus for a period of twelve months, from May 1, 1918, to May 1, 1919, shows that motor transportation is practical and, considering the kind of service rendered more economical than the old method.

The year 1918-1919 began with the teaching force organized as follows:

Mr. H. W. Pease, Principal — Mathematics and Science.
Miss Ruth Welles — Latin and French.
Miss Sarah O. Wheeler — English.
Miss Margaret B. Riddell — Typewriting, Stenography, Book-keeping, Commercial Arithmetic.
Miss Helen L. Bryan — History, French and Reading in the Eighth Grade.

In February Miss Sarah O. Wheeler resigned to accept a similar position in the New Britain High School, Miss Helen L. Bryan was made her successor in the English department, Miss Clark was placed in charge of the History department. This change unifying the work in History under a competent head has had an excellent effect upon the spirit of the work in the History classes. Miss Clark's place as teacher of the eighth grade was filled by Miss Vera Hawkins.

The ten students of the fourth year class were graduated in June. Three of this class are to continue their education at college, being admitted upon certificate from this school.

Miss Rheta A. Clark at Connecticut College for Women, New London, Conn.

Mr. John S. Hale at Massachusetts Agricultural College, Amherst, Mass.

Mr. Philip H. Hubbard at Wesleyan University, Middletown, Conn.

From the figures of the enrollment, 27 in the college preparatory and 72 in the commercial, the outstanding fact is the increasing popularity of the Commercial Course. It also shows the need, in the near future of extending the administration of this course to two teachers, thus making it possible to make the work in the branches already included, viz.: Bookkeeping, Commercial Arithmetic, Typewriting, Stenography, Penmanship and Office Training more intensive and to add to it a course in Filing, Commercial Law, Commercial Geography and possibly Political Economy.

Another phase of the work that should receive increased attention is the development of the Science department. I feel that if this were made a larger factor in our work we should be better able to hold the pupils.

While the work of the school was somewhat hindered by the epidemic of influenza, on the whole it progressed quietly and successfully.

Meetings of the Committee.

FIRST MEETING.

OCTOBER 19, 1918.

At the meeting of the Town School Committee held this afternoon, all members were present, namely: Messrs. John W. Purtill, Samuel H. Williams, Louis W. Howe, Arthur E. Bidwell, William A. Hills and Frederick R. Curtis, also Superintendent Francis S. Knox.

An organization was effected by the election of
Samuel H. Williams, President,
Frederick R. Curtis, Secretary.

President Williams made the following assignments of members:

Districts 1 and 11 — Arthur E. Bidwell.
Districts 2 and 5 — Frederick R. Curtis.
Districts 3-4 and 18 — Samuel H. Williams.
Districts 6-7-8 and 10 — Louis W. Howe.
Districts 9-12 and 17 — John W. Purtill.
Districts 13-14-15 and 16 — William A. Hills.

On motion the matter of enumeration be left with the Secretary to perfect and tabulate. So voted. It was

VOTED, That as to the petition presented, asking for transportation for the pupils residing in the Eighth School District to the trolley at Station 58, of those attending the High School, that the Superintendent investigate and report at the next meeting of the Committee. It was

VOTED, That we adopt the course of study for the High School as recommended by Supt. Knox. It was

VOTED, That the matter of increase of salary of teachers of the Grade Schools, as per petition, be postponed until next meeting and the Superintendent be asked to investigate and report his recommendations relative thereto. It was

VOTED, That the sum of \$105.00 be appropriated for maps, etc., in conjunction with the State Aid for same amount.

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to purchase 30 copies of "Plan for Progress" for teachers use.

VOTED, That Arthur E. Bidwell be appointed member of the Governing Board of the Williams Memorial Building Association for the ensuing year.

The Secretary reported the result of tabulating and perfecting of the enumeration lists. Whole number of persons enumerated between the ages of 4 and 16 years was 1,342, a gain of 62 from that of one year ago. Whole number attending school, 1,103. Number not attending school, 239, of which 115 were under 5 years of age and 39 between 14 and 16 years of age.

SECOND MEETING.

NOVEMBER 7, 1918.

At the meeting of the Committee this afternoon, four members were present: Messrs. Williams, Bidwell, Purtill and Curtis, also Supt. Knox. It was

VOTED, That Supt. Knox arrange to transport High School pupils from the Eighth and Ninth Districts to trolley Station 58, using his judgment as to when to begin. On motion of Mr. Purtill it was

VOTED, That the teachers in the Grade Schools from the beginning of the school year, be paid \$2.00 more per week.

VOTED, That the sum of \$100.00 be paid to the Williams Memorial Building Association, for rent or use of the building for High School the past year.

THIRD MEETING.

APRIL 10, 1919.

At the meeting this afternoon there were present: Messrs. Williams, Bidwell, Howe and Curtis, also Supt. Knox. On motion of Mr. Howe it was

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to purchase supplies needed for the ensuing year of 1919-20 for all schools of the Town. It was

VOTED, That the Superintendent be authorized to purchase basins and soap for use in the Grade Schools where needed, at an expense not to exceed One Hundred Dollars.

FOURTH MEETING.

APRIL 28, 1919.

At the meeting of the Committee held this evening all members were present, also Supt. Knox.

Supt. Knox reviewed the work of the teachers and the salaries as paid them, and recommended increases for many of the teachers for the ensuing year of 1919-20. On motion of Mr. Howe it was

VOTED, That all increases in salaries to the Grade teachers for the ensuing year as recommended by Supt. Knox be allowed. On motion of Mr. Howe it was

VOTED, That the course of study for the High School as recommended by Supt. Knox be adopted and an additional teacher be engaged to carry on the work. It was

VOTED, That the recommendation as made by Supt. Knox, as to salaries for the High School teachers for the ensuing year be adopted. On motion of Mr. Hills it was

VOTED, That Messrs. Williams, Bidwell and Knox be a committee to look up a site and submit their ideas, for a new school house for the Eighteenth School District, and report at a Special Meeting of the Committee. It was

VOTED, That Messrs. Howe, Purtill and Supt. Knox be a committee to look up a site and submit their ideas for a new school building for the Sixth District, and report at a Special Meeting. It was

VOTED, That Supt. Knox be given power to close the schools of the Town on Wednesday, April 30, if he thinks best, to attend the reception tendered to the returning soldiers at Hartford.

FIFTH MEETING.

MAY 8, 1919.

At the meeting this evening there were present all members, also Supt. Knox.

VOTED. That we appropriate the sum of \$25.00 towards defraying the expenses of the graduation exercises for June 20 at the High School.

A petition was received and read by Mr. Williams, from 21 Grade teachers, asking for increases of \$100 to their salaries for the coming year, from what they had been offered. On motion of Mr. Howe it was

VOTED, That said petition be laid on the table.

Mr. Bidwell, of the committee appointed to recommend a site for the Eighteenth District school house, reported that the committee had decided that the site of the former school house on Hubbard Street as best site for a new school building.

A ballot being taken for the position of Superintendent of Schools, Francis S. Knox receiving all ballots cast, was declared elected, and on motion of Mr. Howe it was

VOTED, That Supt. Knox be offered a salary of \$2,000.00 same to be paid in 12 monthly payments.

VOTED, That Messrs. Williams, Curtis and Supt. Knox secure plans, if possible, of 2 and 4 room school buildings. It was

VOTED, That Messrs. Bidwell, Curtis, Williams and Supt. Knox be a committee on a site for a new school building in the Second District.

SIXTH MEETING.

MAY 21, 1919.

At the meeting this afternoon all members were present but Mr. Hills; Supt. Knox was also present. It was

VOTED, That the Secretary ask the Selectmen to call a Special Town Meeting within two weeks for the following purposes:

FIRST, To authorize the Town School Committee to obtain by purchase a site for a new school building at South Glastonbury, and erect thereon a four-room building, suitable for the schools in that part of the town.

SECOND, To authorize said Committee to erect a new two-room school building upon the old site on Hubbard Street, in the Williams District.

THIRD, To authorize the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums as needed, not to exceed \$36,000 for said purposes. It was

VOTED, That Supt. Knox be authorized to offer the teacher of the Commercial Department at the High School a salary of \$900.00

SEVENTH MEETING.

JUNE 9, 1919.

At the meeting of the Committee all members present but Mr. Hills; Supt. Knox present.

VOTED, That Mr. Purtill and Supt. Knox be authorized to procure estimates for repairs needed to Hopewell School.

NINTH MEETING.

JUNE 21, 1919.

VOTED, That the Town School Committee of Glastonbury engage Mr. W. H. McLean of Boston as architect, to plan and supervise the building of a two-room school building with hall, on Hubbard Street, and a four-room school building with hall, in South Glastonbury as offered by him. It was

VOTED, That Supt. Knox be authorized to arrange for two sessions of the school at the Masonic Hall building in the Second District, owing to crowded conditions, and until better arrangements can be made.

VOTED, That Supt. Knox be authorized to purchase three made-over typewriting machines for use in the Commercial Department at the High School.

VOTED, That Supt. Knox be authorized to arrange for electric lights at the High School.

FIFTEENTH MEETING.

SEPTEMBER 10, 1919.

All members were present at the adjourned meeting this afternoon, also the Architect and Supt. Knox.

VOTED, That advertisements be inserted in the Hartford Times and Hartford Courant for bids on new school buildings.

VOTED, That we appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for use in grading the grounds in front of the Buckingham school house under the supervision of Mr. Hills.
