South Glastonbury, directly east over the so-called Hopewell Road to Slabgutter Brook, so-called, and that said road be built by contract, The contract to be let to the lowest bidder and that the Selectmen have the proposed road surveyed and specifications drawn up by competent Road Engineer.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.

July, 1920 — July, 1921.

The Main Library, located in the Covell Block on Hebron Avenue, has been open for the distribution of books on Tuesdays and Fridays from 1:45 to 4:45 and 6:45 to 8:45 P. M., except during the summer when it was closed evenings.

The four Branch Libraries maintained are in the church at Buckingham, in care of Charles G. Strickland; in the church at East Glastonbury, in care of Miss Clara Brooks; in the office of the Glazier Manufacturing Co., at Hopewell, in care of Fred Pickford; and in the house of Mrs. Florence Curtis in South Glastonbury, in care of Mrs. Curtis.

Nine hundred and eighty-three (983) persons have taken books, representing 483 families. Of these, 470 are adults, 513 children. Fifteen thousand three hundred and forty-three (15,343) volumes have been circulated during the year. The following table shows the number of volumes on each subject drawn from the Main Library and its Branches, the latter including the schools to which books have been sent.

Four hundred and one (401) new books have been added to the Library, 281 of which were purchased with Town funds and 120 given, 34 by the State, 81 by townspeople, and 5 by outside individuals. The new books are divided among the following classes: Reference, 1; Philosophy, 3; Religion, 5; Education and Sociology, 12; Science, 2; Useful Arts, 8; Fine Arts, 6; Literature, 10; Travel, 8; Biography, 9; History, 9; Juvenile, 22; Juvenile Fiction, 134; Adult Fiction, 172. Ninety-four (94) old favorites have been rebound.

Three hundred and ninety-nine (399) volumes have been withdrawn from circulation, 76 having been lost, 316 sold, and 7 burned on account of contagious disease, making the total number of volumes in the Library 6,713.

One hundred and twenty-five (125) books for supplementary reading have been sent to four schools of two rooms each: Addison, Buckingham, East Glastonbury and Hopewell. The circulation at the four schools was 226 volumes taken for home reading by 85 of the pupils.

The annual grant of books to the value of \$100.00 has been received from the State, also a generous gift of \$25.00 for the purchase of books from F. D. Glazier, besides 15 volumes of fiction, taken from his bookcase, not from the attic. Notice has been received from the Probate Court of a bequest of \$300.00 from Harry E. Welles.

At the annual meeting of the Directors in October, Mrs. Grace S. Penn was appointed Assistant Librarian. The steady growth of the Library can be seen in the increase in the circulation. When the present Librarian was appointed in 1908, the circulation for the year was 3,257 volumes. This year it is 15,343 volumes, an increase of more than twelve thousand, and this is nearly four thousand more than last year.

The two great needs of the Library at present are a Library Building, and an increase of funds for the purchase of books.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER.

Not in the past thirty years has there been reported to the Health Officer so few contagious and communicable diseases as during the year just closed. Only isolated cases have occurred at all. The health of the school children, as a whole, has been good.

I have received eleven complaints during the year of nuisances, all of which have been abated upon the recommendation of the Health Officer with one exception, where resort to the law brought the desired result.

The milk supply has been looked after as usual and a uniformly good supply has been furnished. Several dairymen are having their herds tested under State and Federal regulations. Soon it is hoped that all milk sold in Town will be from accredited herds — free from tuberculosis.

The schools have been visited from time to time as seemed necessary and the annual inspection of the buildings and surroundings has been made this fall. I am glad to be able to report that the buildings are in much better sanitary condition than in former years. Sanitary toilets have been installed in the first and fifth districts where they were much needed.

It is expected that the Visiting Nurse, Mrs. M. F. Johnson, with possibly some assistant, will regularly inspect the school children during the coming year and will carry on such health crusades as her time will permit.

The great need of this town is a dentist who could look after the teeth of the children in the grade schools.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Town School Committee herewith presents its twelfth annual report.

The details of the year are given in the reports of the meetings of the Committee, the statement of expenses, and the report of the Superintendent of Schools; all forming a part of this report.

The tax payers of the town should bear in mind that the children enumerated in the town have increased rapidly in recent years. Twelve years ago the number was 981; last year, 1,483.

This is made evident by the crowded conditions in some of the school houses, and by the fact that it is necessary to rent three buildings for overflow schools.

The report of the Selectmen will show that two of the old school buildings have been sold. There are at least three others that should be disposed of.

It has not seemed to be an opportune time to make a definite proposition to the voters of the town as to securing a house for the purpose of providing boarding places for teachers. It is growing more apparent, however, that such a step may soon be necessary.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Members of The Town School Committee:

I submit herewith the annual report on the condition of the public schools for the year ending August 31, 1921.

I feel that the year has been the most successful, in immediate results, of any since I have been here. Your policy of steadily improving buildings and equipment is now producing results in better class work and easier discipline. The two new buildings on Hubbard Street and in South Glastonbury have already proved their worth in the improved scholarship of most of the pupils. The buildings in the first, second, and Addison districts and the high school building are just as overcrowded as they have been, and the prospects are that conditions there will become steadily worse. It is my opinion that the only permanent and satisfactory solution of the question is for the town to purchase a suitable site near the center of Glastonbury and erect a combined high school and upper grade building which would take care of all pupils above the fourth grade in the schools mentioned. If the Glastonbury Free Academy Association were willing to turn over its funds and the present high school site to the town and if additional land could be purchased adjoining that site, and if the persons interested in building a library would take over the present second district school building it would make a very happy and economical arrangement for the town. I would respectfully suggest that the Committee take steps to bring this matter before the town before all the desirable sites for such a school are taken up. The need for such a school is urgent.

The Standard Class room tests which we used in grades five to eight last June show clearly that our system of promotion and grading has been accurate and that most of the pupils are doing good work as compared with pupils in other towns. The greatest strength was shown in the fundamentals of arithmetic and the greatest weakness in the ability to read and quickly interpret English. A good supply of supplementary readers would do much to overcome this weakness.

The results of teaching Music in the four schools, East Glastonbury, Hubbard Street, Green and South Glastonbury show that pupils and parents were well pleased with the venture and that it will be a success when it becomes established next year in all the schools.

The high school has graduated 21 pupils. Of that number four plan to enter college, two to enter normal school, five will continue some line of education and nine will enter business. The parentage of the high school pupils was tabulated this year as follows: 32% were of foreign born parentage, 60% were what we call American, 8% Slav, 9% British and 6% Italian.

There have been an unusual number of resignations among the teachers during the summer. We will start in September with 19 new teachers out of a total of 38, including the Principal of the high school. Nearly all those who left went to better paying positions. The increased supply of teachers available makes it possible for the schools to open with trained or experienced teachers in every classroom.

The statement of expenditures which follows shows a considerable increase over last year. It is however, well to recall that when salaries were raised in June, 1920, it was with the idea, which was common throughout the state, that the Legislature would probably appropriate money to meet the Average Attendance Grant Law. The amount of that Grant would have been \$5,034.00. Also the prices of fuel, textbooks and supplies, and wages of labor have been at a maximum during the school year. The change in the texts of Geography and Physiology and the replacement of books destroyed by rats at the high school added about \$1,500.00 to the usual bill for books. The heating plant at the first district school was put in working order for the first time in six years and the cost was \$500.00.

It has been customary to report only expenditures. I am including a statement of the income for schools also, so that it may be easily seen just what the schools cost the taxpayers of Glastonbury.

The average net cost for grade school pupils has been approximately \$53.50 per pupil; for high school pupils it has been \$99.50 per pupil.
