VOTED, That the Report of the Town School Committee be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the Report of the Auditors be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the Report of the Health Officer be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That the Resolution as per item 3 of the Warning relative to Selectmen making application to State Highway Commissioner for construction of New Highway passed, and an appropriation of \$5,000 therefor, also,

Said Item 3 being as follows, "To determine whether the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application to the State Highway Commissioner in the manner provided by law for an allotment of \$20,000 for the construction or improvement of Highways in this Town under said laws and appropriations, and if so voted to appropriate the sum of \$5,000 therefor, said sum being the Towns' share of allotment."

In relation to the Budget, it was

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING, March 1, 1924.

VOTED, That the vote regarding the issuing of peddler licenses, passed at the adjourned town meeting held March 25, 1922, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

VOTED, No non-resident of the Town of Glastonbury shall sell or offer for sale, within the town of Glastonbury, any groceries, provisions, fruits or any articles of food, or any goods, wares or merchandise, unless and until he shall have obtained a license so to do from the Selectmen of the town. This vote, however, shall not apply to occupants or stores or shops within the town.

The fee for such license shall be fifteen dollars for each year, or portion thereof, in all cases and, unless so revoked, all licenses shall expire April 1st succeeding the date of issue thereof.

Each person so licensed shall, on exercising his vocation, when using, for the purpose for which he is licensed, a wagon, cart or vehicle, have plainly displayed on such wagon, cart or vehicle, a sign, designed and furnished by the Selectmen, bearing the number of his license and the year in which such license is in force, which sign shall be furnished by the Selectmen without expense to the person so licensed, other than his said license fee.

Any person who shall engage in the business aforesaid without being duly licensed, as hereinbefore provided, or who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be fined not exceeding ten dollars and his license may be revoked by any Justice of the Peace of said town upon his being convicted of a violation of the provisions of this vote.

VOTED, That the Treasurer of the Town of Glastonbury be and hereby is authorized to borrow on the faith and credit of the Town a sum not to exceed \$50,000.00 to be used in paying the Current Expenses of the Town.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.

July, 1923-July, 1924.

The Main Library, located in the Covell Block on Hebron Avenue, has been open for the distribution of books on Tuesdays and Fridays from 1:45 to 4:45 and 6:45 to 8:45 P. M., except during the summer when it is closed evenings.

The four Branch Libraries maintained are in the church at Buckingham, in care of Charles G. Strickland, in the church at East Glastonbury, in care of Miss Clara Brooks, in the office of the Glazier Manufacturing Co., at Hopewell, in care of Fred Pickford, and in the house of Mrs. Florence Curtis in South Glastonbury, in charge of Mrs. Curtis.

Ten hundred and thirty-five (1,035) persons have taken books. Of these six hundred and eighteen (618) were adults, 417 children. One hundred and fifty-six persons have joined the Library.

Sixteen thousand seven hundred and twenty-seven (16,727) volumes have been circulated during the year. The following table shows the number of volumes on each subject drawn from the Main Library and its Branches, the latter including the schools to which books have been sent.

Three hundred and fifty-eight (358) new books have been added to the Library. Three hundred (300) were purchased with Town funds and fifty eight (58) were given, 47 by the State, 11 by townspeople. The new books are divided among the following classes: Education and Sociology, 10; Science, 5; Religion, 1; Useful Arts, 8; Fine Arts, 6; Literature, 23; Travel, 15; Biography, 10; History, 43; Juvenile Fiction, 127; Adult Fiction, 110.

Four books have been lost, two hundred and two (202) books have been mended using the "Toronto" method by the Librarian, making total number of volumes in the Library 7,499.

Eighty-eight (88) books for supplementary reading have been sent to four schools of two rooms each. Addison, Buckingham, East Glastonbury, and Hopewell. The circulation in the four schools was 461 volumes taken by 79 of the pupils.

The annual grant of books to the amount of \$100 has been received from the State.

The annual report of the Health Officer must appear to some who read it a matter of routine, yet I feel that the work is not without results. The cooperation of the local physicians, school authorities and the townspeople in general is much appreciated.

The work of the visiting nurse as reflected in the health of the school children cannot be too highly praised and in this connection I wish to express my appreciation of the Dental Clinic supported, in part, by the Visiting Nurse Association.

The nearest approach to an epidemic during the past year was the occurrence of Scarlet Fever during the winter and spring. Over thirty cases came to my attention; reported either by the physicians or nurse or by the parents when no physician was in attendance. I have no doubt but that many other mild cases occurred. Only one death occurred, caused by complications following Scarlet Fever.

Fifteen cases of measles were reported, mostly among young children.

Mumps were quite prevalent but only a few cases were reported. Only a few cases of Whooping Cough were reported and those for the most part were contracted out of town.

Pneumonia was not prevalent and for the most part not regularly reported. There were ten cases of Diphtheria. When asked for diphtheria antitoxin is furnished free from this office by the State. Eight cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis were reported, mostly from the State Sanitariums to which the patients had been removed.

Few cases of venereal diseases are reported, and since they are only reported by number or initial, the Health Officer can make no investigation and must rely on the attending physician giving the necessary instruction as to care and prevention.

One case of Infantile Paralysis was reported and two more cases have occurred during the present month (September).

The school houses and grounds have been inspected and found in excellent condition with the exception of one or two that ought to be replaced by modern structures.

The only new work of any size undertaken during the past year was the enlarging and deepening of the Meadow drain. Some more work remains to be done to finish the job. It has been an expensive piece of work but the results warrant the expense.

REPORT OF THE TOWN SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Town School Committee herewith presents its Fifteenth Annual Report.

All details will be found in the reports of the Secretary, and the Superintendent of Schools.

The new High School building has been in use during the entire year, and the old Academy building has been occupied by the 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grades. The congestion in the northern part of the town has thus been somewhat relieved, but the lower grades are beginning to crowd the old buildings to their capacity.

It has been found necessary to engage another teacher in South Glastonbury, and make use of the Assembly Hall for a school room.

The increasing number of children in the northeastern section has necessitated the re-opening of the so-called 15th District school house for the coming year.

A problem that faces the Committee and the taxpayers of the town is the situation in Hopewell. The old school house is inadequate and unsatisfactory. It seems necessary either to spend a considerable sum in changes and repairs, or to plan for a new school house.

To the Members of The Town School Committee,
Glastonbury, Conn.:

I submit herewith the annual report of the condition of the public schools for the year 1923-1924.

The various items of this report follow closely the report to the state. This makes it more easily compared with similar reports from other towns.

The report of the Principal of the High School and the Teacher of Vocational Agriculture are included. The Principal's report gives a clear statement, in general terms, of conditions in the High School during the past year. A building does not make a school but the new high school building has had a most stimulating effect on the school during the past year. The excellent housing accommodations and a corps of trained and loyal teachers have done much to establish a morale which has been lacking in some other years. We were unfortunate in losing two teachers during the year but were able to replace them with competent successors. The addition of Vocational Agriculture, for boys, made possible by the State, has helped to broaden the opportunities of the school. Classes in this subject have been small but there is a decided and growing interest in and respect for this work, among the farmers of the town. It should have a permanent place on the program of studies. There is evident need for developing a course in Home Making for girls. This has a beginning in the cooking which has been carried on and should be broadened with Sewing and Economics.

The course of studies in the elementary schools has changed little during the year. The work of Health Education has been given more attention and the schools are developing better programs of recreation than they formerly have had. As has often been stated, the objectives of this work are two; first definite instruction in hygiene and development of right health ideals and habits; second development of right ideals of cooperation and standards of conduct and sportsmanship. This last is becoming of greater importance as our civilization becomes more complicated. These standards are obviously developed through supervised play programs and athletic contests.

In this connection we are planning for the spring term two general exhibitions, a music festival, such as was held this past year, in May, and a general Field Day on May 29. These will serve as an objective and a culmination of the regular programs in these two subjects.

You will find in the various statistical tables of this report all details of the school work which are readily reduced to that form. The real objective of public schools, viz., the development of good citizens, cannot be reduced to figures and the results obtained in that work can be judged only by the lives of the graduates of the schools. Where the schools have had the full cooperation of parents excellent results are apparent. Without that we can do little.

The teacher situation is improving. It is now possible to secure good teachers if we will pay the price. Teachers salaries are determined largely by the law of supply and demand. If we wish teachers to come here and stay, who are equal in ability to those in towns of our situation, size and wealth we must, generally speaking, pay as much as these other towns. Your action in raising the average salary for next year should result in more profitable teaching. In that direction there is evident need to establish a uniform salary schedule which will assure desirable teachers of reasonable advances, up to a known maximum. Such a schedule ought to be comparable with schedules of nearby towns of size and wealth equal to Glastonbury's.

We still have two unsatisfactory school houses; the Hopewell school plant is inadequate from every point of view. The so-called first district school does not meet the needs of that growing district, although it is much better than the Hopewell school. The Addison school needs two more rooms. The two rooms of the present building are excellent school rooms.

REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Due, in large measure, to the splendid new High School building that the citizens of Glastonbury have provided, it has been possible to improve greatly the quality of the work that is being done in secondary education. The auditorium has been an especially valuable asset. It has been used extensively for such forms of pupil activity as public speaking, singing, debates, and dramatics; there, throughout the year, a number of outside speakers have addressed assemblies; and it provided a very acceptable setting for the various commencement exercises. The completely equipped kitchen and lunch room have simplified instruction in cooking, and the serving of a hot noon-hour lunch. The science laboratories, too, have made possible experimental work for which there were formerly no facilities. Unfortunately the small number of class rooms has necessitated the use for that purpose of the library and of the basement rooms intended for shop-work and laboratories.

A new Program of Studies was put into effect in order to keep the High School abreast of present day educational standards. The school day was lengthened, as were also the recitative periods, to provide for the introduction of supervised study. The study of agriculture, under Federal Vocational control, has assumed an important place not only in the school but also in the community at large. The State requirements for Physical Education have been met, and the pupils, particularly the boys, have been manifestly benefitted therefrom. Throughout the year the pupils have prepared and circulated several issues of a school newspaper that has served to keep parents informed of the various activities in which they might be interested.

The school has been exceptionally fortunate in having a strong corps of experienced teachers, nearly all of whom have served in the Town in previous years. It is a pleasant duty to pay a tribute to their professional zeal, and especially to their readiness to supervise extra-curricula activities.

The material improvement in housing the school and the modernized methods of instruction have resulted in a very real improvement of the scholastic achievements of the pupils. A study of the marks for the year shows a definite increase in the percentage of the higher grades together with a very gratifying reduction in the number of failures. This has been especially true in the case of the entering class which has hitherto been the source of most of the losses.

A second important advance is the increased holding power of the High School. Past experience has led to the expectation of a discouragingly large number of enrollment losses due to lack of interest. Such cases

during the past year have been reduced to a minimum, practically all of the comparatively small number of losses that occurred having been due either to economic necessity or to removal from town.

Diplomas were granted to twenty-two members of the Senior Class. Those who are to continue their education and who have pursued the proper studies experienced no difficulty with the entrance requirements of the institutions of their choice. Graduates of the Commercial curriculum were in demand and were promptly and advantageously placed. During the year the School was "approved" by the State Board of Education and received a renewal of the College Entrance Certification privileges.

REPORT OF THE TEACHER OF AGRICULTURE

For the Year July 1, 1923 to June 30, 1924.

The preliminary steps in organizing the agriculture curriculum for the Glastonbury High School was delayed until September 1, 1923 because a teacher did not seem to be available. This delay made it impossible for me to make as thorough a survey of the community as is desired. During part of September, I spent my time ordering supplies, visiting prospective students and making farm surveys throughout the town. Nineteen farms were visited and definite information obtained on each. The data gained from these farms indicated that the most important farm enterprises in the town are tobacco growing, fruit growing, dairying, poultry raising and vegetable gardening. After conferring with the State Supervisor of Vocational Education, I decided that the work of the first year would consist of a careful study of five enterprises, apple production, peach production, tobacco production, potato production and corn production. For most students in this high school this work probable over-emphasizes fruit culture and pays too little attention to tobacco.

When school opened it seemed difficult to enroll boys in the course but finally the class settled down to a group of eight boys, seven of whom continued to the end of the year. At present, the boys are interested in the development of some agriculture enterprise on the home farm and will continue to work until the completion of their marketing this fall.

In addition to the class in the High School, I met with a group of fruit growers in the Matson Hill school house, one night each week during October, November, December, January and part of February. There were seventeen meetings of that group. The average attendance at these meetings was twenty-one. Interest seemed to be keen.

During the year, I made more than one hundred and fifty visits to the boys of the class and the farmers of the town. These visits covered a mileage of 1,360 miles.

A considerable amount of community work was done by the agriculture teacher and the class. The class tested milk, pruned trees and sprayed trees on a number of different farms. They also spent two days dynamiting stumps on one farm. In addition to the regular class work in which community services were rendered, I have attempted to assist different farmers in some of the following ways: treating cows for milk fever, inspecting orchards for insects and diseases, recommending pruning and spraying schedules, demonstration of pruning and recommending fertilizers for orchards.

As a side issue, four of the boys were taken to the agricultural contest at Storrs, May 24, 1924. We planned to have five boys on the trip but one

of them could not go because of unexpected farm conditions at home. Each of the boys was entered in a contest where he judged in competition with boys from the other agriculture departments in the State. Glastonbury High School was represented in the poultry contest, farm managing contest, dairy cattle judging contest, and the farm crops contest. One of the boys, Pelton Ferry, took first place. At present, I do not know how the other boys placed. We do know, however, that New Milford won the prize. That evening, the boys attended a banquet which was given by the agricultural club. This proved to be a very interesting part of the day's events. When it came to eating, Glastonbury took second place to none. All of the boys seemed to enjoy the trip very much and expressed a desire to enter the contest this fall.

For the summer, my work will consist of following up the members of the class as they carry out their individual farm enterprises, making a further study of the agricultural conditions of the community, attending the yearly conference of Vocational Teachers of the State and drawing up plans for the coming year, during which we hope to make the work more effective and to have a larger class in the High School.

The work of inspection and follow-up was carried on by the Visiting Nurse, the first of the year at the call of the teacher and during the spring term systematically. The dental clinics were held as during the last year, by the Visiting Nurse Association. It was noticeable that the teeth of the children were in much better shape than they were when this work was started.

The daily program of each school carried not less than twenty minutes of systematic exercise and supervised play.

REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE.

In the Town Report of 1923 a statement was printed showing expenses and commitments up to Sept. 1, 1923.

Herewith is a complete financial statement showing an unexpended balance of \$323.89. This amount is now in the Town treasury.

In order to secure the required amount of land and to provide for proper sewage disposal, it was necessary to buy quite a large tract of land, extending to the river. This provides however all the land that will be needed for playground purposes for many years to come. The land not thus used is rented at a figure that represents an income on more than \$10,000.

The building contains eight class rooms with a seating capacity of 250, and an auditorium that will seat over 500.

There is a physics-chemistry laboratory accommodating 16 that can be expanded to care for 20. There is a lunch room and equipment for 75.

Rooms are provided for a principal's office and a teachers' room.

Lockers for 175 have been installed, with room left to expand to 300, and there is toilet room accommodation for 300.

Whenever it is necessary to enlarge the building, this can be done without increasing the toilet accommodations or the heating plant.

The building is of semi-fireproof construction with fireproof stairways.

An up-to-date, convenient building has thus been provided for the needs of the Town for several years.

It was ready for use in September, 1923. The formal opening was held June 11, 1924, when the building was presented to the Town and accepted by the First Selectman, C. F. Handel.

The Committee presents this its final report, and asks to be discharged.
