Adjourned Annual Town Meeting, adjourned from October 9th.
William H. Carrier, Chairman. Warning read by Clerk. The following business transacted:

VOTED, That Selectmen's Report be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That Treasurer's Report be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That Town Clerk's Report be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That Library Director's Report be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That Town School Committee's Report be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That Auditor's Report be accepted and placed on file.

VOTED, That Health Officer's Report be accepted and placed on file.

B. F. Turner, acting herein for the Finance Board, reported the Budget as made up by the Board for the ensuing year, and it was:

VOTED, To accept and adopt the Budget as presented, for the estimated expenses of the Town for the ensuing year.

VOTED, To authorize the Treasurer of the Town to borrow on the faith and credit of the Town a sum of money not to exceed One Hundred and Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000) for current expenses of the Town during the ensuing fiscal year, and to issue therefor the note or notes of the Town and in renewal thereof as may be needed.

The following was—

VOTED, That, first, no person except those excepted by the Statutes of the State, shall sell or offer for sale upon the public streets of the Town of Glastonbury, any goods, wares or other merchandise at public or private sale or auction. Nor shall any person, unless excepted by the Statutes of the State, vend or peddle such articles of merchandise from house to house within the limits of the Town of Glastonbury, unless he shall have obtained a license to do so from the First Selectman. This Section, however, shall not apply to occupants of stores or shops within the Town.

Second, it shall be the duty of the First Selectman to keep a record of all licenses granted under the provisions of this By-Law in a book provided for the purpose, giving the number and date of each license, name, age and residence of the person licensed, the amount of license fee paid, and also the date of revocation of all licenses revoked as hereinafter provided. Said Selectman shall further keep a detailed account of all his receipts for such licenses and make a return thereof annually to the Town Treasurer.

Third, any person who shall engage in the business aforesaid without being duly licensed as herein provided, or who shall violate any of the provisions of this By-Law, shall be fined not exceeding ten dollars, and any Justice of the Peace of the County of Hartford, holding court in

the Town of Glastonbury may in his discretion revoke the license of any person convicted of a violation of the provisions of this By-Law, or for other proper cause, upon the presentation of due evidence.

Fourth, all By-Laws of the Town inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

VOTED, That a Commission on Town Plan, consisting of the First Selectman and six electors of the Town of Glastonbury, be and the same hereby is created in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 267 of the Public Acts of 1923. The term of office of said commission shall be as follows: There shall be elected six electors of the Town of Glastonbury, who, together with the First Selectman ex-officio, shall constitute said Plan Commission, two of whom shall hold office until the next succeeding annual meeting; two until the second succeeding annual meeting; and two until the third succeeding annual meeting. At each annual Town meeting thereafter there shall be elected two members of such commission, who shall hold office for three years, all of whom shall be sworn to a faithful performance of their duties, and shall receive no compensation for their services. Such commission shall elect a chairman and secretary, and may fill any vacancy in its membership.

VOTED, That a committee be appointed to present nominations for members of the Commission on Town Plan. The chairman appointed as the committee: Willard G. Phelps, Harvey L. Thompson, John H. Roser, Frank Dixon, Miss Martha E. Kinne.

The committee presented the following nominations: for one year, Ernest V. Llewellyn, George H. Slater, for two years, Everett B. Hurlburt, Lewis O. Kinne; for three years, Herman Roser, Howard S. Bidwell.

VOTED, That the report of the Committee be accepted and the nominees elected.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

February 21, 1927

Special Town Meeting duly warned and held to provide opportunity for discussion and advice on the question of establishing the Town Court of Glastonbury.

Bill to create the Town Court of Glastonbury read.

Discussion on the proposed court.

Motion made by Henry A. Spafard:

"VOTED, That this meeting go on record as being opposed to a Town Court of Glastonbury, and request our representatives to have the bill creating such court withdrawn or indefinitely postponed."

Amendment offered by William W. Pollard:

"VOTED, That in the opinion as expressed by the voters present, we are opposed to a Town Court of Glastonbury, and request our representatives to have the bill creating such court withdrawn or indefinitely postponed."

Amended motion withdrawn.

Original motion withdrawn.

Motion by Henry H. Hunt:

"VOTED, That the entire matter be indefinitely postponed."

Motion rejected.

Motion by Aaron W. Kinne:

"VOTED, That the meeting go on record as being in favor of the bill to establish the Town Court of Glastonbury."

Motion rejected: vote, thirty-two for motion; sixty-three against motion.

Motion by Henry H. Hunt:

"VOTED, That the chairman appoint a committee of five members, including the two representatives to investigate the matter of a Town Court of Glastonbury, and report at an adjourned meeting February 28, 1927, at 8 P. M."

Motion adopted.

Upon motion, the meeting was adjourned to February 28, 1927.

The committee appointed was: Aaron W. Kinne, Harvey L. Thompson, Charles E. Goodrich, Henry A. Spafard, and Francis G. Way.

ADJOURNED SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

February 28, 1927

Meeting called to order by James S. Williams, Chairman.

Aaron W. Kinne, chairman of the Special Committee to investigate the matter of a Town Court of Glastonbury, appointed February 21, 1927, presented the report of the committee.

Mr. Kinne has statistics of 106 justices' cases tried in 1926, and the receipts therefrom.

Henry A. Spafard, a member of the committee, opposed the establishment of a Town Court at the present time. He said that three members of the committee were in favor of the establishment of the Town Court of Glastonbury; two were opposed to its establishment, he said.

Motion by Aaron W. Kinne:

"That the vote at the meeting, February 21, 1927, against the Town Court be rescinded, so that the voting might be on the direct question of the Town Court of Glastonbury."

The vote taken February 21, 1927, against a Town Court of Glastonbury, was rescinded by nearly a unanimous vote.

Motion by Aaron W. Kinne:

"That this meeting go on record as being in favor of establishing the Town Court of Glastonbury."

Motion rejected: vote, sixty-six for motion; one hundred and eighty-six against motion.

Motion by Ernest V. Llewellyn:

"Resolved, That the question of a 'Town Court' for Town of Glastonbury be indefinitely postponed and that our representatives be requested to withdraw the bill now before the legislature."

Motion adopted unanimously.

Motion by William W. Pollard:

"That the special committee in the matter of the Town Court of Glastonbury be discharged with a vote of thanks."

Motion adopted unanimously.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

August 22, 1927

Harvey L. Thompson, Chairman.

Meeting warned and held to consider and act upon the following Resolutions:

"Be it Resolved, That the Town of Glastonbury declare its intention to build or improve a section or sections of road, or to build or improve a bridge or bridges under the provisions of Chapter 263 of the Public Acts of 1925, and the sum of Five Thousand Dollars, or so much thereof as may be required to pay the amount of the pro-rata share of said Town of the cost of such construction or improvement under the provisions of the appropriation allotted to the Highway Commissioner, is appropriated for such purpose, and the Town Treasurer is authorized and directed to pay said amount to the State at the times and in the manner provided by law.

"Resolved, That the Selectmen are authorized and directed to make application to the Highway Commissioner, in the manner provided by law, for an allotment of Twenty Thousand Dollars for the construction and improvement of roads or bridges in this Town under said laws and appropriations."

VOTED, That the Resolutions as above presented be adopted, and that it is the sense of the meeting that the entire amount so appropriated be used on the Hebron Avenue Road.

REPORT OF PUBLIC LIBRARY

July 1926—July 1927

The Main Library, located in the Covell Block on Hebron Avenue, has been open for the distribution of books on Mondays and Thursdays from 1:45 to 4:45 and 6:45 to 8:45 P. M., except during the summer, when it was closed evenings.

The four Branch Libraries maintained are in the church at Buckingham, in care of Charles G. Strickland; in the church at East Glastonbury, in care of Miss Ethel House; in the office of the Glazier Manufacturing Company, at Hopewell, in care of Fred Pickford; and in the house of Mrs. Florence Curtis in South Glastonbury, in charge of Mrs. Curtis.

Nine hundred and seventy-one (971) persons have taken books. Of these, four hundred and seventy-one (471) were children, and five hundred and twenty-six (526) were adults. One hundred and forty-three (143) new members.

Twenty thousand, one hundred and ninety-four (20,194) books have been circulated during the year. The following table shows the number of volumes on each subject drawn from the Library and its branches, the latter including the schools to which books have been sent.

Five hundred and three (503) new books have been added to the Library. Four hundred and twenty-two (422) bought with Town funds, eighty-two (82) were given, fifty-two (52) by the State and twenty-nine (29) by townspeople. The new books were divided among the following classes: Juvenile Fiction, 166; Adult Fiction, 161; Education and Sociology, 4; Science, 17; Religion, 2. Useful Arts, 19; Fine Arts, 9; Literature, 11; Travel, 8; Biography, 10; History, 2; Juvenile Non-fiction, 90.

Five hundred and eighty (580) books have been discarded, and twenty (20) lost, making a total of six hundred (600), and the total number of volumes in the Library, 8,046.

Ninety-one books for supplementary reading have been sent to four schools—Addison, Buckingham, East Glastonbury, and Hopewell. The circulation in the four schools was 486, taken by thirty-nine (39) pupils.

Two hundred and eighty-six books were taken to the High School, as the Library room was too small to handle this service. These books were circulated 886 times.

The annual grant of books to the amount of \$100 has been received from the State.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

The work of the Health Officer has been more with the school children than heretofore. A routine examination was made in the fall of all children attending the grade schools, and a more superficial examination was made in June. Over one thousand were examined at each time, and I wish to acknowledge the very efficient assistance of Mrs. McKean, the Visiting Nurse, and the unfailing co-operation of all the teachers. During the second examination we were enabled to find much improvement, in many that were under weight, in others that had had glasses fitted where needed, and in the condition of the teeth that had received the attention of the dentist employed by the Visiting Nurse Association. In addition to the regular examinations I have made eighteen visits to various schools at the request of the teachers or for some other definite reason. I have made sixty-three examinations of school children sent to me by the nearby teachers or referred to me by the Visiting Nurse.

Two hundred and sixty-four school children were vaccinated by me during the year, either at the schools or at my office.

I assisted, as did the other physicians, at the "general round-up" conducted by the Motherhood Club, of the children about to enter the schools for the first time this year. Many of the parents took advantage of the recommendations made at that time to have their children better prepared to begin their school life.

At my annual inspection of the schoolhouses I was pleased to find that some of the sanitary suggestions I had made to the School Board had been carried out, and that the buildings and grounds were in excellent condition.

With the opening of the schools the examination of the children will be carried on as before, except that much of the routine work and minor details will be looked after by the School Nurse, Mrs. John S. Hale, who will begin her work at the opening of the Fall term.

The only approach to an epidemic during the year was the occurrence of numerous cases of whooping cough and mumps during the latter part of the winter and early spring. There were but few other contagious diseases. There was one case of sleeping sickness and one of infantile paralysis; the origin of neither of these could be determined. Two cases of tuberculosis that especially aroused our sympathy were those of young brothers. They are now being cared for at Undercliff Sanitarium in Meriden, where there is reason to expect they may be cured.

There was one fatal case of lockjaw (tetanus.) I mention this to call attention to the fact that all punctured wounds, especially of the hands and feet, should be treated with anti-tetanic serum, which is a sure preventative of this practically fatal disease. Your Health Officer has this serum on hand at all times. Wounds that would not ordinarily need a doctor's care should receive the treatment.

REPORT OF THE TOWN SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The year has again rolled around, and a call comes for our Eighteenth Annual Report, which is hereby given. The detailed report of the Superintendent, of the expenses incurred, in supporting and carrying on our schools for the past year, follows. Again the Committee calls attention to the fact, that of having kept within the budget as prepared one year ago.

The general condition of our schools is encouraging, and on the whole quite satisfactory. The conditions existing in the Center and Naubuc Districts have not improved; there is great need for a new building to accommodate the increased number of pupils in these districts. The Masonic Hall Building, at Station 33, has been used during the past year, and has afforded only temporary relief, being used only for the lower grades.

The Addison District has not improved; it is yet necessary to make use of the Addison Chapel to accommodate the large number of pupils in that district. A pleasant change has been made by replacing of single seats in the school buildings for the old style and dilapidated double seats, which have been in use ever since the building was built—a good many years.

Owing to the increased number of pupils now in the Taylortown District, the Committee have found it necessary to re-open the school in that District, which will relieve some of the congestion in the High Street schools.

The new addition, built one year ago, to the High School building, and used in part during the year, is now used to its capacity, by the increased attendance at the opening of the fall term of school.

It will be noticed that there are many new teachers employed in our schools this season, which is accounted for by the fact that some have retired from the profession; others have sought other positions elsewhere. All the new teachers engaged come well recommended, and it is believed good work will be accomplished.

The item of transportation is an important factor in the expense of running our schools. But how can it be dispensed with? It makes a large item to the expense account, and so long as it becomes a necessity to provide for it there does not appear any relief. Twelve thousand dollars is a large amount to pay out for this idea alone.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Meetings of the Town School Committee

FIRST MEETING, October 12, 1926

At the meeting of the Town School Committee held at the High School Building, at which the following members were present:

Mrs. Laura H. Gorton, Louis H. Moseley, J. W. Purtill, Samuel H. Williams, and Albert L. Taylor; and Superintendent Knox. Absent, F. R. Curtis.

Officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows:

President, Samuel H. Williams.

Secretary, Fred R. Curtis.

President Williams appointed the following members to the several Districts:

Naubuc, Weirtown, John Tom Hill and North East to L. H. Moseley, Center and Buckingham to Mr. Curtis; Green, Hale and Hubbard Street to Mr. Williams; Taylortown, Matson Hill and Naog to Mrs. L. H. Gorton; High Street, Hopewell, Wassuc and Neipsic to Mr. Purtill; Addison and Hurlburt to Mr. Taylor.

On motion, J. W. Purtill, Jr., was elected member of the Governing Board of the Williams Memorial Building Association for ensuing year.

It was

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox be authorized to provide transportation from the end of the trolley line for pupils living in Taylortown District.

SECOND MEETING, November 24, 1926

At the meeting held this afternoon all members except Mr. Taylor were present.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox be authorized to have electric lights installed in the Matson Hill Schoolhouse.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox be authorized to offer Santo Mantenera the sum of \$335 per year to transport his children to Neipsic School.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox be authorized to get the new boiler at the High School insured for \$10,000.

VOTED, That the Committee favors plan of insurance of teachers, as outlined by the Connecticut General Life Insurance Company.

THIRD MEETING, February 21, 1927

All members present; also Superintendent Knox.

It was

VOTED, That the Committee appreciate the suggestion of the Alumni Association towards adding to the reference books for the use of pupils at High School.

VOTED, That the Committee acknowledge receipt of a suggestion from Mr. Thompson relative to physical examination of pupils at High School.

VOTED, That the members of the Finance Board of the Williams Memorial Building Association be invited to attend the next meeting of the Committee, in consultation relative to the idea of an increase of rental for use of the Memorial Building for High School pupils.

FOURTH MEETING, March 31, 1927

At the meeting of the Committee held this evening there were present: Messrs. Williams, Taylor, Purtil and Curtis; and Superintendent Knox.

Superintendent Knox presented a list of teachers which he recommended for re-election, with salaries to be paid, and same was approved, being an increase of \$50 per year to grade teachers and the Music Supervisor, and \$100 per year to High School teachers.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox be authorized to expend the \$200 already appropriated on the tennis court on High School grounds.

FIFTH MEETING, April 7, 1927

At the meeting this evening all members were present; also Arthur B. Goodrich and Charles E. Goodrich, members of Finance Board of the Williams Memorial Building Association, were present, and spoke for the association relative to increasing the rental of the Memorial Building for the use of High School pupils, from one dollar per pupil to two dollars per pupil, for ensuing year; making a possible change to Town of about \$800 per year.

Following a lengthy discussion, on motion of Mr. Taylor, it was

VOTED, That we offer the Williams Memorial Building Association for the ensuing year \$1.25 per pupil, for rental.

VOTED, That beginning Monday, April 25th, the morning session of the schools of the Town open at 8 A. M. instead of 9 A. M.

SIXTH MEETING, May 25, 1927

Those present at the meeting this afternoon were Mrs. Gorton, Mr. Williams, Mr. Taylor, and Mr. Curtis; and Superintendent Knox.

VOTED, That Mrs. Frances D. Quick be re-engaged as teacher in the First District, upon petition requesting same.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox be authorized to make necessary arrangements for installing of gas to High School building.

A ballot being ordered for the election of a Superintendent resulted in the choice of Francis S. Knox, at a salary of \$3,600.

SEVENTH MEETING, June 13, 1927

At this meeting there were present, Mrs. Gorton, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Purtil, and Mr. Curtis; also Superintendent Knox.

A committee from the Visiting Nurse Association were present and asked that the School Committee co-operate with the Association in supporting a School Nurse.

Upon motion of Mrs. Gorton, it was

VOTED, That the Town School Committee consider the employment of a School Nurse, to be under their entire control.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox carry out the instructions of the Health Board relative to the toilets, etc., at Wassuc School.

VOTED, That appropriation be made of \$25 towards graduation expenses.

VOTED, That the Committee approve of the list of graduates as presented by Principal Robert W. Sawin.

VOTED, That the Committee approve of the contract with the State Board of Education relating to Vocational Home Making.

VOTED, That the Committee does not think they are obligated in any way, and therefore do not approve payment of a certain bill for damages to the Matson Hill bus.

On account of the inability of President Williams, by reason of illness, to present the Diplomas as usual, to the graduation class of the High School on Friday evening, June 17th, then it was

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox be delegated to present the Diplomas on that evening.

VOTED, That Mrs. Gorton and Superintendent Knox investigate and ascertain what the expense of a School Nurse would be.

EIGHTH MEETING, July 7, 1927

At the meeting this afternoon there were present, Mrs. Gorton, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Purtil, Mr. Curtis, and Superintendent Knox.

VOTED, That the Town School Committee employ a School Nurse on Part time.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox be granted leave of absence for six weeks to attend summer school at Columbia University, New York.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox have necessary repairs made to heater and blackboards at Buckingham School.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox install single seats in the Addison School to replace the double seats heretofore in use, at a cost not to exceed \$900.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox have new toilets installed at Center School and other necessary repairs, at best possible prices.

VOTED, Approval of calendar as prepared by the Superintendent for 1927-1928.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox request a Domestic Science teacher from the State, and that he be authorized to procure proper equipment for same according to plans as prepared.

VOTED, That we consider a change in Text Books at next meeting of the following books, viz.: Arithmetic, English Grammar, and History.

VOTED, That Superintendent Knox be authorized to re-open the Taylortown School for next year.

NINTH MEETING, August 5, 1927

At the meeting this afternoon, all present save Mr. Williams.

VOTED, That Mrs. Alice B. Hale be engaged for part time School Nurse, at a salary of \$750 plus eight cents a mile for expenses.

VOTED, That the Secretary communicate with the committee of the Williams Memorial Building Association, making offer of \$1.25 per pupil for the use of their building, as may be desired, for gymnasium purposes for High School pupils for coming year, and request an early reply.

VOTED, That authority be given Superintendent Knox to make a change in Text Books as desired, as follows: Arithmetic, to the Thorndike series, 5 in series; and English Grammar, Oral and Written English, 5 in series; History, Old Europe and Young America; and seventh and eighth grade Our Nations History.

VOTED, That the vote passed October 15, 1923, relative to renting the auditorium at High School building, be rescinded.

VOTED, That the consent to allow the use of the auditorium of the High School be only by a vote of the Town School Committee.

VOTED, That we grant the use of the High School auditorium to the Woman's Club of the Town for bi-monthly meetings until further notice.

VOTED, That the Committee hold regular monthly meetings, on the first Monday of each month beginning October 1st.

TENTH MEETING, August 19, 1927

At said meeting there were present, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Purtill, and Mr. Curtis; and Superintendent Knox.

Superintendent Knox gave a digest of the School Budget as prepared by him. It was deemed best to wait for a larger attendance of the members before approving, hence meeting adjourned to August 25th.

ELEVENTH MEETING, August 25, 1927

All members but Mr. Williams present at this meeting.

Superintendent Knox explained the several items of the Budget, as prepared by him, and

VOTED, That we approve of said School Budget for 1927-28.

Mr. Purtill reported a conversation had with R. S. Williams relative to the use of the Williams Memorial Building, and it was

VOTED, That we offer the Williams Memorial Building Association the sum of \$1.50 per pupil for the use of this building for those pupils who make use of same for the purposes desired, for year 1927-28.

VOTED, That authority be given Superintendent Knox to purchase a Reo School Truck, complete, for a sum not to exceed \$2,637.90, for use in transporting pupils to the schools.

VOTED, That we authorize Superintendent Knox to present a copy of the School Budget, as prepared, to the Finance Board.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Town School Committee, Glastonbury, Conn.:

I submit herewith the annual report of the condition of the public schools for the year 1926-1927.

The report varies little in character from former reports. You will note by comparison with other reports that per pupil costs have risen in the elementary schools and dropped in the high school. The rise in elementary costs is due to increased transportation and increased teacher salaries. In the high school the lowered costs are due to a large enrollment, with the same number of teachers, and the same overhead cost in buildings operation.

Our teacher salary schedule is now nearly on a par with that of towns of our size and ability to support schools. If the schedule in use at present is adhered to we should begin to see its effect in holding teachers. We have been going through a regular three year cycle of teacher change. Beginners have come, stayed three years and gone on to better paid positions. With the better salaries and better teaching conditions which our buildings now offer, in nearly all sections of the town, we should hold teachers longer and profit thereby. The excellent standard of teaching which we have had in some schools, on the part of self-sacrificing resident teachers, cannot be cited as an argument to the contrary. We should never trade on the fact that some good teachers prefer to live in Glastonbury. We were unfortunate this year in being forced to fill over one-third of our positions with new teachers, but in 1927-1928 we will again reap the results of this year's experience from those who began this year.

The interruption and distraction at the high school caused by the building operations were a real drawback to that school. However, the building is now complete, and will accommodate 300 pupils. The school offers a varied curricula to meet the needs of all. Those who wish to do so may prepare to enter any college in the East. We have the certificate privilege at fourteen colleges. Very few of those whom we have certified have failed to become a credit to the school.

We may draw one lesson from our experiences connected with planning and building the high school which the citizens of the town would do well to remember, and that is that it is wiser and more economical to meet the needs for school facilities before they arise. To that end I wish to submit the recommendation that during 1927-1928 we make a careful study of the probable school needs of Addison, Naubuc and the Center districts and prepare careful plans and specifications for the building which those districts will demand in a few years. This should be a problem in which all serious citizens of the town should be interested. If this is undertaken in advance of the actual demand we shall arrive at

a better solution than if it is put off until there are no seats for the children.

We have maintained in nearly all of our schools a rate of pupil progress through the grades which compares well with the rate for other good school systems. But we are not satisfied with the failures which have seemed necessary, and our chief object in the year 1927-1928 will be to so study the individual and his needs that we shall be able to adjust his school experiences to his abilities and interests, and thereby eliminate failure on the part of the pupils. This closer study should be possible this year because, as the Committee knows, this promises to be the first year in some time when the Superintendent will not have to devote a large part of his attention to some building construction or equipment. I feel that 1927-1928 should be the best year in a decade for the school children of Glastonbury.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The High School opened September 13 with an enrollment as follows:

Of the class of 1927, twenty-five are working, two studying to be nurses, two applied for college, and nine are unknown. We lost twenty-six of the total enrollment during the year. Eighteen left school to work, one left because of sickness, and seven moved out of town.

The attendance for the year was exceptionally good.

Two changes were made in the school curricula. Biology was placed in the College Curriculum and Physics was placed in the Business Curriculum.

Social parties were held in the school auditorium at different times throughout the year under the able supervision of Miss Maud Clark. The parties were largely attended and enjoyed, and were marked by an increase in natural and unaffected conduct by the boys and girls in the presence of one another.

Several clubs were formed, which met after school hours and accomplished much good. The Senior Girls' Club made decorations for graduation; scrap books for the Newington Home; and helped furnish the High School Club Room. They also contributed to the Mississippi Relief Fund.

The Girls' Glee Club won the Glee Club contest at Bloomfield, and received a silver cup.

The Freshman Girls' Club and the Junior and Sophomore Clubs helped furnish the Club Room. The Hi-Y Club raised money for the Athletic Association.

Athletics were conducted for the whole student body rather than for the selected few. Good sportsmanship was emphasized. In addition to regular school teams, class teams were organized for both boys and girls. All candidates for teams were examined by a doctor before they were allowed to play.
