With several automotive manufacturers already announcing that they will stop production of gasoline-powered vehicles, some as soon as 2025, electric vehicles are coming quickly, and it is in our best interest to be prepared. I have been driving an electric vehicle for several years now, but do not have a place to charge the battery at home (no garage). As EVs become more widespread, I am fearful that the few public charging stations in town will be less and less available. I am hopeful that any new EV charging stations would be made available for the general public and not limited to "Town operations."

Gail	Tomala	29 Fawn Run	Please DO NOT vote today to spend Glastonbury's ARPA money to install public water in the Chestnut Hill area in response to uranium found in well water. Those people who cannot afford the necessary homeowner expenses, or who do not want to, or have already paid for uranium remediation themselves will not benefit from what would end up being a very costly and possibly dead end project. Surely such an expensive project should first involve a complete neighborhood survey including informing, updating and educating all homeowners in the area --including the expenses that would also need to be incurred by each household to access public water. Important, detailed data should be made available to the public and the neighborhood before a vote. This is the only responsible way to proceed and I would expect nothing less from the Town Council manager and the Town Council members whom we have entrusted to make informed and responsible decisions about our budget and about allocated federal monies.
