**Re: Town Manager's Report**

Dear Council Members:

The following will keep you up to date on various topics.

**1. Welcome Signs**

Per previous discussion, welcome signs are being installed at town parks and open spaces. An example of the sign at the Cotton Hollow Preserve is attached.

**2. House Decorating**

The annual Holiday House Decorating Contest attracted thirteen participants. Based on review by judges, including Councilmembers Wang and McChesney, properties were recognized for fan favorite, most traditional, merry & bright, best special effects and most festive. There were 2500 views on the festive driving tour map.

**3. Minnechaug Golf Course**

Despite a relatively wet 2021 season, golf rounds totaled 22,315 at Minnechaug. This compares to 27,257 in 2020. Combined approximately 50,000 rounds over the past 2 seasons. A nice job by all.

# COTTON HOLLOW PRESERVE



This nature preserve is open [redacted] from sunrise to sunset.

The preserve may also be used [redacted] between and including the 3rd Saturday of April and June 15th for fishing purposes only.

To ensure an enjoyable visit, while protecting the preserve's natural state, the following regulations have been adopted:

- Picnicking, cookouts, alcoholic beverages, camping, vehicles and open fires are not permitted.
- Dogs must be leashed or tethered.
- Deposited "Dog Litter" must be removed before leaving the preserve.
- Acts causing injury to plants or wildlife are prohibited.
- The preserve is for "passive" recreation opportunities such as hiking or fishing.
- The preserve is a natural environment and conditions may change without notice; including but not limited to steep slopes, slippery conditions, ROCKY CLIFFS and challenging terrain. Visitors should be aware of their capabilities as it relates to these conditions.
- The natural bodies of water may have slippery conditions and HIDDEN DANGERS, in addition to strong currents. Currents can cause changing conditions and can unexpectedly cause dangers to those who enter the water. It is not recommended to swim or ENTER THE WATER FOR ANY REASON in these areas, and any WATER ENTRY is done with the participants understanding of these potential risks.
