Re: Town Manager's Report

Dear Council Members:

The following will keep you up to date on various topics.

1. COVID Report

The most recent report is attached.

2. Energy Star Award – Town Hall

Town Hall has received the US EPA Energy Star Award with a score of 99 out of 100. This signifies Town Hall is more energy efficient than 99 percent of similar buildings nationwide.

3. Open Space and Forest Management

After a formal RFQ process, GZA is selected to work with the Town on Open Space/Forest Management planning for select open space parcels. The selection was assisted by Anna Gault Galjan representing the Conservation Commission and Michael Corcoran, President of Land Heritage Coalition. The capital budget allocates \$70,000 to begin this process which is anticipated over a multi-year phased approach. The thought is to start with the 5 parcels totaling 542± acres off Hebron Avenue, Keeney Street and Howe Road and proceed to other locations (e.g., J.B. Williams Park, Blackledge Falls, etc.). Since the concept of this process is often misunderstood, I suggest a presentation and discussion at the September 27th or October 11th meetings. In the meantime, Council direction on the initial study parcel will be appreciated.

4. Land Acquisition - Botticello

By action at the June 28th meeting, Council approved purchase of 2 parcels located off Meadow Road totaling 8± acres. These parcels located within the Glastonbury Meadows include river frontage. The purchase was for \$3,200 per acre. Based on survey, the actual acreage totals 9 acres which requires an additional \$3,200 from originally approved. The purchase is funded through the Capital Projects – Land Acquisition account. Given previous Council action based on 8 acres, I wanted to confirm this with you.

5. Opioid Settlement

Council will recall action some months ago to join the National Opioid Settlement process. The Town has received a payment of \$16,531.70. These funds will be available for substance abuse prevention activities in accordance with requirements of the overall opioid settlement.

6. Sanitation Superintendent

Michael Manfre is appointed to the position of Sanitation Superintendent effective September 26th to succeed Mike Bisi who will retire this year after some 49 years of service to the Town. Michael is a graduate of the University of Maine and holds a CT DEEP Class IV Operator Certification. He now serves as Operations Manager for the Mattabassett Wastewater Treatment Facility serving New Britain, Middletown, Berlin and Cromwell. Michael has 18 years of experience in the wastewater treatment profession. Mike Bisi has agreed to remain active on a limited part-time basis to assist Michael in his learning curve for refuse and recycling operations, also the responsibility of the Sanitation Superintendent. I'm confident Michael will have a successful tenure and be well received by the organization.

7. Staff Retirements

Two long-term members of Town staff recently announced plans to retire by calendar year end. Barbara Bailey, whose career at Welles-Turner Memorial Library spans 42 years including the past 22 as Director, will retire this December. Fire Marshal, Chris Siwy, who has served the Fire Marshal's office for 37 years including 35 years as Fire Marshal will retire at the end of September.

Barbara and Chris are thanked and recognized for their many contributions to the Town organization and Glastonbury community throughout their successful tenures.

8. Capital Projects - Pickleball Courts

The cost of town projects continues to be influenced by supply chain and inflationary factors. This is generally experienced across the board for a variety of goods and services. The bid process is complete for the four pickleball courts at the Riverfront Park and, not unexpectedly, the low bid (from a well-established constructor of such facilities) is above budget. At the same time, there are other capital projects under the Cultural/Parks & Recreation category that have available balances. The proposal is to transfer \$50,000 - \$60,000 from these available balances to the pickleball project so that the contract can be executed and meaningful construction completed this calendar year. Unless advised otherwise, I will proceed accordingly.

9. Town-Wide Community Tag Sale

The annual town-wide tag sale will be held on Saturday, September 24th at 8:00 a.m., behind the Academy Complex. Rain date is September 25th.

10. Flu Clinic

Seasonal flu shot clinics are scheduled at the RCC on Tuesdays, October 11th and November 1st from 2:00-5:00 p.m. and on Wednesday, October 19th from 3:00-6:00 p.m.

11. Newsletter

12. Trending Topics – Town Website

A new feature entitled "Trending Topics" is added to the Town website. This is designed for users to easily and timely access updates and new information. Marketing/Communications Manager Kathryn Paquette will manage this process as with other website related matters.

13. ARPA - Small Business Assistance Program

50 applications are received through this program offering a grant of up to \$5,000 to qualifying small businesses. The Council approved a \$150,000 allocation of ARPA monies for this purpose. Applications are under review and requests for additional information returned to a number of the applicants. I would expect to have the list of approved applications over the next several weeks. These will be considered in the order applications were received to include those meeting program requirements.

14. Main Street Sidewalks

The project to install sidewalks along the east side of Main Street between Overlook Road and Buttonball Lane is under way. This will include a new crosswalk between Main Street and Buttonball Lane.

State DOT is reviewing the Town proposal for sidewalks along the west side of Main Street between the Cider Mill and Red Hill Drive. Town staff have asked for final comments and I expect to have this for the next Council meeting.


Re: COVID-19 update

Connecticut Department of Public Health (CT DPH) has recently revised how COVID-19 data is presented. Publicly available datasets previously used to populate charts and graphs for Glastonbury's weekly COVID-19 reports are no longer available, and data from the new systems are not directly comparable to old systems. An archive of DPH data can be found here. Previous Glastonbury reports can be found on the Town website here.


This report contains data from laboratory-confirmed results. At home tests are not included in this data, so information and graphs demonstrate trends rather than a full accounting of cases. Numbers in (parentheses) indicate change from the previous week.

As per CT Department of Public Health data collected 9/7/22:

- A total of 130,190 tests have been administered to Glastonbury residents. (+355)
- Of the 130,190 tests administered, 7,137 were laboratory positive NAAT cases. (+48)
- No additional deaths were recorded this week. The loss of Glastonbury residents remains at 119. (+0)



Test positivity is calculated as a rolling 7-day test positivity by specimen collection date; all positive molecular (PCR/NAAT) test results are divided by all molecular (PCR/NAAT) test results (positive and negative) for the last 7 days and multiplied by 100 to reach a percentage. Results are shown below for Glastonbury, Hartford County, and the state of Connecticut overall.



COVID-19 Vaccine update

Last week, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention endorsed the use of updated COVID-19 booster shots that are specifically tailored to combat the two most prevalent omicron subvariants, BA.4 and BA.5. A person is eligible for a booster if it has been at least two months since their last COVID-19 vaccine. The Moderna booster shot is approved for people ages 18 years and older and the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine is authorized for people ages 12 years and older.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION FOR VETERANS - FILING DUE SEPT 30

Honorably discharged veterans who have served a minimum of 90 days during wartime may be eligible for a Veteran's exemption, which would be applied to their real estate or to a motor vehicle (if no real estate is owned). Proof of military service (original DD214 discharge document) must be filed with the Town Clerk's Office on or before Sept. 30, 2022 for application on the July 2023 tax bills. Disabled Veterans who submit proof of disability to the Assessor's Office may receive an increased exemption.

Low income Veterans receiving a Veteran's exemption may be eligible to receive increased benefits by applying for the Additional Veterans Program. The income levels are \$38,100/single and \$46,400/married. The application is available at glastonburyct.gov/vet.

Sign-up for the Glastonbury Alert system and receive updates regarding community emergencies and public safety matters. Through the Everbridge system, Glastonbury will provide residents with critical information regarding severe weather, missing persons, evacuations, and other emergencies affecting the local community. When there is a potential health/safety hazard or concern in the Glastonbury area, system subscribers will receive a message through their registered communication device(s) - e.g. mobile app, landline, cell phone, text, email, etc. If requested for the notification, you can confirm message receipt and you will not be contacted by any subsequent methods regarding that particular update. If you do NOT confirm, the system will continue to attempt to reach you via all of the contact paths provided upon your registration. To subscribe, visit glastonburyct.gov/alert.



BEAR SAFETY

Bear sightings in Glastonbury have been steadily increasing since 2016. Removing food sources such as bird feeders and garbage cans will help prevent conflicts with bears. They may wander through the area, but will have no reason to stay! The Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) web page, "the basics of Living with Black bears", has a number of useful resources.

Decisions on relocating wildlife are determined by DEEP. Please report any bear sightings to DEEP by using the **Bear sighting report form**. Glastonbury Animal Control is interested in where the bears are sighted too, as it assists in determining the number of bears in town and the routes they're traveling. AFTER submitting the DEEP form, residents are welcome to inform Animal Control of a bear siting by leaving a voicemail message at **(860) 633-7227**.

DROUGHT CONDITIONS & WATER CONSERVATION

As of this writing, Windham and New London Counties are in Stage 3 (Moderate Drought) as declared by the Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection. As drying conditions continue, residents are encouraged to conserve water as possible at their residential and business properties. The CT Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) suggests turning off water while shaving or brushing teeth, taking shorter showers, watering the lawn/garden during the earliest part of the day (or during the lowest temperatures), and running only full loads of laundry and dishes. 
